3	you please rise, we are going to start
4	off with the Pledge of Allegiance and
5	then remain standing.
6	(Whereupon, the Pledge of
7	Allegiance is recited.)
8	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: We are having our
9	fourth meeting. A number of people in
10	the audience have been to meetings
11	before, so excuse me when you hear some
12	of the words I'm going to use because I
13	try to read this at every one of these
14	hearings just to get the idea of what we
15	are here for, why we're here, and what we
16	need to do in order to proceed as a
17	commission.
18	This is the fourth hearing held by
19	the Temporary Temporary Districting
20	Advisory Commission. We are here to
21	fulfill our obligation under the Nassau
22	County Charter. As stated in the 1995
23	Final Report of the Commission of
24	Government Revision, the function of the
25	Commission is to recommend one or more

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2	plans to the County Legislature for
3	dividing the county into legislative
4	districts.
5	The commission consists of 11
6	members with one nonvoting party, that's
7	me, appointed by the County Executive.
8	There are five members appointed by the
9	presiding officer and five appointed by
10	the minority leader.
11	The Commission permits, but does not
12	require public hearings. Prior
13	reapportionments processes established
14	the tradition that permissive meetings
15	seeking public input should held. The
16	proceedings have been open, fair, and
17	transparent to the public.
18	The County Legislature allocated
19	\$985,000 to fund the work of the
20	Commission. The allocation is divided
21	equally between the commissioners
22	appointed by the Presiding Officer and
23	the Minority Leader. However, a portion
24	of the \$985,000 is set aside for
25	stenographic services, American Sign

2	Language interpreters, and other shared
3	costs of the commissioners for each
4	delegation.
5	Each delegation of appointees
6	divides the balance of the money to
7	purchase the mapping technology,
8	software, hiring experts, counsel and
9	other staff, as they deem necessary.
10	In developing a map or maps, the
11	Commission must comply with both Federal
12	and State Laws. If and when a map or
13	maps are drawn, they should be released
14	to the public before being submitted to
15	the Full Legislature for its
16	consideration.
17	I point out the fact that we are an
18	advisory commission. We don't make the
19	decisions. We give recommendations based
20	upon the recommendations that you all
21	have for us.
22	The release should be on a date
23	certain with ample time to hear public
24	comment after a final hearing. The County
25	Legislature will also conduct a hearing

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2	on a map or maps sent to it for
3	consideration.
4	The County Legislature may reject,
5	adopt, revise or amend the redistricting
6	plan or plans recommended by this
7	Commission or adopt any other
8	redistricting plan that it deems
9	constitutional, legal, and following
10	those requirements.
11	Transparency is achieved by the
12	significant outreach to the public and
13	calling public hearings on any maps or
14	plans for redistricting submitted by the
15	commission members.
16	Additionally, we have meetings
17	scheduled after tonight in Freeport on
18	October 13; in Glen Cove on October 18;
19	in Oyster Bay on October 20th that is
20	something we are going to have to discuss
21	between ourselves, between the two
22	delegations at some point tonight
23	Elmont on 26th of October, and the last
24	hearing on a date, time, and location
25	that is yet to be determined. One of the

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2	recommendations that was made, the room
3	was not available.
4	In an effort to achieve
5	transparency, will be in public and
6	streaming live over the internet.
7	Furthermore, there is ASL signing

11	participate in these proceedings.
12	The Legislative Clerk will preserve
13	all of those records. The Legislative
14	Clerk is sitting here right in front of
15	me; Michael Pulitzer. Further, the
16	record will be kept open for a period of
17	time after completion of the public
18	hearings and it will include these
19	submissions including any e-mails
20	received prior to the date of the record
21	of the commission. Any correspondence,
22	e-mail,or information received after that
23	date, will still be forwarded to the Full
24	Legislature for its consideration.
25	In preparation for this hearing, a
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notice of this hearing, and others, were sent to the following:

Counsel to the Minority Commission, Members of the Minority Commission Delegation; County Executive Office, Nassau County League of Women Voters; The City of Glen Cove; The City of Long Beach; The Town of Hempstead; The Town of North Hempstead; The Town of Oyster Bay; 22 villages in the Town of Hempstead; 30 villages in the Town of North Hempstead; 16 villages in the Town of Oyster Bay; 55 libraries; 57 school districts; 67 civic associations; 50 chambers of commerce; and 150 news and media outlets that service Nassau County. In addition, there are a series of people who have asked to be put on a mailing list. I don't have that exact number, but they, likewise, have received notice. The notice also goes to all members of the County Legislation as well as the members sitting up here and their staff. That is my statement. Do you have a

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2	statement, Mr. Kasshcau?
3	COMMISSIONER KASSCHAU: I do. Thank
4	you, Chairman Moroney. Thank you, all
5	and to the City of Long Beach who knows
6	better than most what it means to go
7	through a terrible super storm hurricane.
8	We appreciate your participating in the
9	redistricting process this evening.
10	As you all well know, this is a
11	critical process insofar as it's going to
12	define who your elected officials are for
13	the next ten years in terms of the
14	County.
15	This, as the chairman pointed out,
16	is our fourth meeting. However, I,
17	unfortunately, cannot agree with what the
18	chairman said with respect to the
19	fairness and transparency that has not
20	manifest itself during the course of this
21	process. In fact, I'm sitting here
22	before you today as the Chairman of the
23	Democratic Delegate to this Commission.
24	We believe we continue to have grave
25	concerns with the lack of transparency of

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2	this Commission and the lack of fairness
3	in this process.
4	For example, we have on repeated
5	occasions, attempted to introduce
6	resolutions to this body that would
7	suffice to provide website transparency
8	by way of resolution. The updates to the
9	website over the last week that were
10	promised that were supposed to excuse the
11	need for that resolution are grossly
12	insufficient.
13	We have asked for substantial
14	information to be posted publicly and it
15	hasn't been. For example, we have asked
16	that resolutions submitted by the
17	democratic delegation and voted on by
18	this committee be posted for public
19	consumption; that information does not
20	appear on the County's website.
21	We have asked that public notices
22	submitted by Democratic Delegation be
23	posted on the County website; that
24	information still has not been posted.
25	We've also asked that agendas

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2	submitted by the Democratic Delegation be
3	posted; that information hasn't been
4	posted by them. Minutes and transcripts
5	from all previous hearings; we're still
6	not currently up to date on that.
7	We've asked that items submitted
8	into the record of the three preceding
9	hearings be submitted to the website so
10	that you all can view them and have
11	meaningful public participation; that
12	information has not been posted.
13	We have also asked that
14	correspondence between Democratic
15	Delegation and Chairman Moroney and my
16	other colleagues on this committee be
17	posted; that information has not been
18	posted for your consumption.
19	We've also asked that the current
20	map, data, and shapefiles be provided to
21	the public. That is incredibly important
22	information to this process; that, too,
23	has not been posted.
24	Finally, we've asked that relevant
25	legal resources and reference materials

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2	be needed as that the public can have
	be posted so that the public can have
3	informed comments and questions with
4	respect to what laws apply to this board
5	and this process; that has not been
6	posted.
7	All of this information is essential
8	to meaningful public participation.
9	There is no reason why this information
10	has not been posted to the County's
11	website.
12	So that being the case, we have
13	released a public shared drive last week,
14	which was mentioned at our last meeting
15	at the Town of Hempstead, which contains
16	in one central location any information
17	that we were able to get for members of
18	the public including information on the
19	current maps; information about our
20	meetings; background on the redistricting
21	process; each of the resolutions
22	presented to this body and voted on by
23	this body; written submissions from the
24	public and more. We urge you to take a
25	look at that information so that you can

3	you can attend future meetings and ask
4	questions about that important
5	information. You can access that shared
6	drive by scanning the QR code on the code

10	has the opportunity to take it down:

13	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Good evening,
14	everyone. My name is Michael Pernick.
15	I'd like to first and foremost echo the
16	comments made by my colleague,
17	Commissioner Kasschau. I share the
18	significant concerns with transparency
19	and fairness that were just addressed and
20	I would like to add two additional
21	points.
22	First, earlier today I and I believe
23	my fellow democratic appointed
24	commissioners received an e-mail with
25	eight written comments that had been
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2	submitted to this body. Some of the
3	comments were a month old and we hadn't
4	seen them. One of them was 28 days old.
5	Several of them were 14 days old, and
6	this was the first opportunity we had to
7	view these comments. I was surprised and
8	concerned these hadn't provided to us.
9	It seems unfair and deeply biased if the
10	republican appointees have access to the
11	submissions from the public but the
12	democratic appointees don't get access to
13	the submissions, in some cases for weeks.
14	And these were important submissions.
15	Submissions from highly respected
16	organizations that have done work like
17	this across the state, across the
18	country; submissions from The League of
19	Women Voters, Common Cause, Make the Road
20	NY. Serious organizations and
21	submissions from members of the public
22	with equally important insights,
23	perspectives, and advice for us to take
24	into account.
25	So I was surprised and concerned

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2	that these comments had not been provided
3	in some cases for as long as 28 days
4	after they had been provided to this
5	commission.
6	It was especially concerning because
7	we had asked at the outset of this
8	process for an e-mail address, a
9	mechanism, for members of the public to
10	submit comments that could automatically
11	be provided to everybody or an e-mail
12	address that everybody would have access
13	to. That proposal was rejected. Now it's
14	clear why. Because we don't have access
15	to these important submissions. We
16	shouldn't have a structure where only one
17	side could hear from the public and the
18	other side has a delay sometimes a
19	substantial delay before getting
20	access to these comments.
21	Again, I would once again ask that
22	an e-mail address be set up specifically
23	for this commission that everyone has
24	access to. There are different ways we
25	could do it. We could have the e-mail
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2	automatically forward every submission to
3	every commissioner. We can have a staff
4	of both delegations have access to these
5	submissions. But it shouldn't be the
6	case that we should have to wait weeks on
7	end to hear from the public, after the
8	public provides very important feedback
9	to this process. That's the first point
10	that I think needs to be said very
11	clearly today.
12	Second, I'd like to take a few
13	minutes to revisit a submission that I
14	made into the record at our previous
15	meeting. A submission that contained a
16	preliminary analysis of our current
17	County Legislative maps that was
18	performed by a a political science
19	professor, Dr. Daniel Magleby, who is a
20	political scientist at the University of
21	Binghamton and is a leader in the field
22	of redistricting. His work has been
23	relied on by courts across the country
24	and he has published extensively on
25	redistricting.

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2	Dr. Magleby did an analysis of our
3	current County Legislative map. His
4	conclusion was clear, simple, and
5	extremely important: The current map and
6	any new map that might be adopted by the
7	County that might be similar to the
8	current map, would be an illegal partisan
9	gerrymander. The results of his analysis
10	leave no room for doubt.
11	To provide some context, last year
12	the State amended the Municipal Home Rule
13	Law to provide new requirements for
14	redistricting. One of the new
15	requirements is extremely important for
16	us. It says, "districts shall not be
17	drawn to discourage competition or to
18	favor or disfavor an incumbent or other
19	particular candidate or political
20	parties. In a case called Harkenrider v.
21	Hochul the New York Court of Appeals
22	recently adopted a standard for the type
23	of violation of law and concluded that an
24	expert can proved that a map violates the
25	standard using what's called an ensemble
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2	analysis. A particular methodology for
3	assessing maps. The way it works is
4	pretty simple. The expert generates
5	thousands and thousands of random maps
6	and measures the map that's at issue
7	against these randomly simulated maps and
8	are generated by computer simulation. If
9	the map that's at issue is more extreme
10	from a partisan bias perspective, then
11	most of those maps of course will
12	conclude that the map at issue is an
13	illegal partisan gerrymander. Dr.
14	Magleby did just that analysis for the
15	current County Legislative map. He
16	generated a simulation of 10,000 random
17	neutral maps and he concluded that our
18	County Legislative map is more extreme,
19	more biased in favor of republicans than
20	all 10,000 of those maps.
21	So this isn't just a partisan
22	gerrymander, this is an extreme partisan
23	gerrymander. The chances of arriving at a
24	map that's this extreme through a neutral
25	process would be less than one in 10,000.
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It's a very extreme gerrymander. We know that. It's virtually statistically impossible.

He provided a preliminary analysis, we submitted it into the record. It is not posted on the County website, it is posted on our shared drive that we've made public. I would encourage the public to take a look. We also have some copies of it. If you speak to Gabbi who is in the back, she can provide you with a copy of that preliminary analysis.

It places this Commission and the Legislature on clear notice that the current map is illegal and we need to start from scratch. We cannot use the current County Legislative map. We need to start from scratch and draw a map that's legal from the ground up. My democratic appointees are taking this very seriously. I know that we would only ever vote for a map that clearly complies with the Municipal Home Rule Law and every other statute. I haven't heard

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2	any response from the republican
3	appointees up to this point, but I hope
4	they are taking this extremely seriously
5	as well. I would like to make a
6	commitment to all of my colleagues,
7	including my Republican appointed
8	colleagues. If there is a draft map that
9	anybody in this Commission is
10	considering, a draft map that they're
11	working and considering presenting at
12	some point, it's important to understand
13	whether that map complies with these new
14	statutes. I would offer if anybody has a
15	map that you're working with, we can do
16	that analysis for you. We can provide
17	you with the same neutral nonpartisan
18	analysis of whether the map complies with
19	the statute. That's a standing offer for
20	the rest of this process. If anybody has
21	a map, send it along. Let us know. We
22	can facilitate getting that map reviewed
23	through the ensemble analysis, so we can
24	be confident that any map that is
25	presented to the public and any map that
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	is voted on is legal and complies with
3	the law. There should be no excuse to
4	have not done this analysis now that we
5	have these new important provisions in
6	the Municipal Home Rule Law. That's a
7	standing offer.
8	We're on notice that the current map
9	is illegal, similar maps will be illegal,
10	and there is an opportunity that is
11	available to every member of this
12	commission to ensure that all maps moving
13	forward comply with the law.
14	That's all I have.
15	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you.
16	COMMISSIONER BEE: Mr. Chairman, I
17	don't want to go back and forth. I do
18	not intend to engage in partisan
19	mudslinging or anything of that nature,
20	but I do want to note that the Republican
21	Delegation has repeatedly said that
22	intends to comply with the law. I'd like
23	to think that we start with the
24	presumption of integrity until proven
25	otherwise; whereas, it appears that my
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	fellow commissioners on the other side of
3	the table seem to be presuming a lack of
4	integrity until proven otherwise. So on
5	behalf of the Republican Delegation, I
6	can assure you it is our intention to be
7	guided by our counsel by the law and to
8	see if we can find a map that does comply
9	with the law. Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: If I may, Mr.
11	Pernick creates a very dark, dark image
12	of what's going on. It's not even
13	anywhere near that. It's hyperbole.
14	It's designed to create a record so that
15	you can sue afterwards if they get
16	something that they don't like, perhaps.
17	But it's not that way. It really is not
18	that way. We've got nothing to hide.
19	For the record, the map that was
20	just put out by our Executive
21	Administrator for our side of the table,
22	the Republicans, for the record, no map,
23	including the map she put out there, has
24	ever been held to be inappropriate. No
25	map since 1984, when this was created,
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1	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
2	has ever been challenged since then and
3	that continues to be the case. I'm just
4	trying to shed some light from the dark
5	image presented by Mr. Pernick.
6	If I could also point out something
7	that I think is dramatically,
8	dramatically important to the people of
9	this community, especially Long Beach.
10	Remember those words: Start from
11	scratch. It took three times, three times
12	to get the full barrier island into one
13	district. Starting from scratch, where
14	is it gonna be? You have to look at the
15	details.
16	The information honestly looked at
17	that they received today in the e-mail,
18	they'll see on it when I forwarded it to
19	them that I had got it this afternoon.
20	That includes some information that
21	needed to be checked to make sure that we
22	weren't violating anybody's personal
23	information that may have been included
24	on those items, number one.
25	Number two, every single resolution
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that has been submitted to this board has
been dealt with openly in public, not
ignored, but openly in public.
It is significant, if I may, that
all the laws are going to be complied
with. They have always been complied
with from the day this legislature was
approved by Federal Court Judge Arthur
Spatt. This is not a map that even
resembles a map that the Courts threw out
that the Democrats created in New York
State. It doesn't even resemble anything
trashy like that. This is an honest
process.
I think everyone of these people on
the democratic side are good, solid
citizens, but they gotta stick to the
facta I think averybody over here

facts. I think everybody over here
(indicating) is a good, solid citizen and
they will I'm sure stick to the facts.

Now, unless somebody has anything else to say, I'd like to call on Harvey

COMMISSIONER KASSCHAU: Mr.

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Chairman; forgive me, Assemblyman. Just to pick up on those few comments.

First off, I don't think characterizing what Mr. Pernick or I have said is an unreasonably dark picture of what has been going on at the last three meetings. In fact, you could look at the transcripts of the proceedings that have been held to date, all the issues that we discussed, Mr. Pernick and me, were raised by individuals who appeared before this body. There is, by virtue of those comments, a fundamental lack of trust in this process. I want the commission -- I think all of us -- and I thank you, Mr. Chairman, for pointing out that we're all good citizens and we're going to do what is appropriate -- I think it's incumbent upon us, this body, to reestablish that trust and I think the resolutions and the information that we're hoping to be made public will reestablish that trust. Because there are plenty of people, plenty of people who have appeared over

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2	the last three meetings that have
3	commented that this process has been less
4	than transparent, that they have a
5	fundamental distrust in the process, and
6	that they think this is a charade and I
7	don't want to be part of that. So I will
8	do everything, and this body I hope, will
9	do everything possible to reestablish the
10	trust and ensure that we comply with the
11	law.
12	With respect to what Mr. Pernick
13	said, vis-à-vis the study done by our
14	expert, Mr. Magleby's, report makes it
15	even more important that we have a
16	process that actually takes public
17	feedback into account. Unfortunately, the
18	current process is designed to make it
19	impossible for members of the public to
20	provide this commission with feedback in
21	the proposed manner.
22	Under the current schedule proposed
23	by Chairman Moroney, this commission
24	would release proposed maps on November
25	10th and would vote on those proposed
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2	maps the same day with just one hour in
3	between the meetings where they are
4	released and the meeting when they
5	receive a vote. This proposed schedule,
6	I submit, is absurd. The public has no
7	opportunity to review and comment on
8	those maps and our commission has no
9	opportunity to try to negotiate a map
10	that can earn six votes that will be
11	submitted to the County Legislature. The
12	schedule makes our entire process a sham.
13	The Democratic appointed
14	commissioners have tried over and over
15	again to address this issue, but we have
16	been blocked by the Republican appointees
17	at every turn. On August 31, we
18	introduced a resolution providing for
19	seven hearings after the draft maps were
20	released. That was rejected on a partisan
21	basis, unfortunately.
22	On September 21, we introduced a
23	resolution providing for three weeks for
24	public comment on actual maps with at
25	least hearing. That too was rejected on

2	a partisan basis.
3	I will now make a final plea to my
4	colleagues: Please, please don't make
5	this process a sham. As a last resort I
6	will ask this Commission to commit to
7	give the public at least two weeks to
8	review draft maps before they are
9	approved rather than just an hour. This
10	means that if we plan to hold a vote on
11	maps on November 10th, drafts of those
12	proposed maps must be released on
13	November 3rd. This motion, even if
14	granted, will not solve the problem. Two
15	weeks is not enough time to review draft
16	maps and is not enough time for us as a
17	Commission to try to negotiate a
18	compromised plan that can earn six votes.
19	This approach doesn't even provide for
20	public hearings. Every other effort to
21	fix this issue and I am pleading with my
22	colleagues to give the public at least 14
23	days, a reasonable amount of time, to
24	weigh in.
25	With that, I will now make a motion

3	considered by this Commission at least
4	two weeks prior to their commission and I
5	ask for a roll call vote on the motion.
6	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: I'll second

9	Chairman, I will first note, I think we
10	have usually done a roll call to
11	establish attendance, but, perhaps, the
12	record can reflect that all of our
13	presence, with the exception of Mr.
14	Mejias.
15	With that note on the record, my
16	comment on the motion is the same as it
17	was the last time which is that it is
18	simply premature to establish an
19	arbitrary schedule of what we're going to
20	do at the point and time that we are
21	ready to suggest a map to the
22	Legislature, other than to add on to that
23	that the Legislature itself, the decision
24	making body, is certainly in the position
25	to hear comments from the public on

10	in stone. They're under discussion and

15	an unnecessary effort to create an
16	obstacle.

24	enough. It's not enough. We have seen
25	throughout this entire process that

9	showing up and they're expressing that
10	they're angry and they are disillusioned
11	by this process.
12	And it was also brought to my
13	attention that there are many members of
14	the community who said they will not
15	testify until they actually see a map
16	that they can comment on; otherwise, what
17	is the point.
18	With that said, two weeks is not
19	enough time; however, it is better than
20	nothing so I will support the motion.
21	Yes.
22	CLERK PULITZER: Thank you.
23	Commissioner James Magin, Jr.?
24	COMMISSIONER MAGIN: Yes.

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COMMISSIONER PERNICK: I'd like to expand for a moment on a comment made by my colleague, Commissioner Bee. He pointed out that he did not want to vote for this motion because it would set an arbitrary schedule. Well, we have an arbitrary schedule right now. We have a schedule that provides members of the public a grand total of one hour to review a proposal and comment on it. We the schedule that gives us one hour as a Commission to try to negotiate a compromise in good faith that we could recommend to the Legislature. How are we going to be able to come to an agreement with one hour? That shouldn't be our starting point; that shouldn't be our placeholder. If we're going to have a placeholder, let's at least use a placeholder that gives the public an opportunity to weigh in, that gives us an opportunity to try to collaborate and work together in good faith to reach a

2	compromise. Two weeks, I agree with
3	Commissioner Wyatt, it's not enough time,
4	but it's better than nothing. Let's use
5	that as our placeholder and if we want to

9	six votes and giving the public an
10	opportunity to comment on a map before
11	this Commission. It's our job to receive
12	public comments and recommend something
13	to the Legislature that incorporates and

18	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: I don't vote.

24	that says no action can be taken on a

5	call our 66th person to testify in front

11	I come here because people in the
12	community have asked me to speak. When
13	politics takes over government, there is
14	no government. I have a few years of
15	experience. I'm an elected official for
16	38 years; 13 in Long Beach as a
17	Councilman, 25 in Albany as a Deputy
18	Speaker for the State Assembly. Isn't it
19	interesting that Long Beach doesn't have
20	an elected official this year.
21	The purpose that all of us serve,
22	and I say this very sincerely, and I had
23	a lot of success in Albany because
24	politics was not the issue with me.
25	You're here to serve the needs of your

9	All of you here, you here, you have
10	a conscience, and I'm here because the
11	people asked me to speak. I'm the voice
12	of those who have no voice. The answer
13	really is that we are all here to try to
14	make this a better world without the
15	anger and the violence, with love and
16	caring.
17	I want to talk to you about Long
18	Beach. A small city. We have 32,000
19	people, approximately and 100,000 in the
20	summer. I will tell you we are a small
21	city of love. The world is changing.
22	Good people are hesitant to become
23	involved in government. I want to share
24	with you my own life experience that the
25	rewards of being an elected official, a
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public servant, isn't for power or money, it's the thank you you get for helping people.

Today we are all here and we are listening and we're saying to you, and I'm saying to you my purpose, because people from my community asked me to speak because they're afraid that nobody's gonna care. I'm saying to you all here, I really want you to think about my purpose here is to make you aware that we have a small community, it's a small city -- it's not a small city any more as you can see. You have the needs of people and people are desperate. These are desperate times. This is a time for everybody to really think about what's really important. What's important is loving and caring and trying to make good. We have devastation in our world today, we don't need the anger and the violence that is taking place. What we learn and we can show people -- and I thank you for being here.

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2	You all have a role. Everybody's voice
3	has to be heard, but you know, really
4	think. Take a step back and prioritize
5	what's important.
6	I'm here. We got a minority
7	community that is growing and we have a
8	wonderful city (buzzer). It's a city of
9	love. People here work together, care
10	about each other. With politics, they
11	serve in government. Tonight I'm here to
12	say thank you for being here and I
13	really, really want you to understand
14	that everybody's in trouble. It's a tough
15	a society to live in, it's a tough world.
16	But, you know, I'd like for you to take a
17	step back and talk to each other and
18	say you know, I understand the
19	politics and I know most people from both
20	parties and all parties I know who they
21	are. They're good people. Everyone of
22	them is a good person, but you just have
23	to really take a step back and say and
24	here's what I'm here to say: I want the
25	people in my community to be able to get

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2	the resources that are necessary to have
3	a quality of life and they're not going
4	to work politically.
5	I saw what happened. I saw people
6	they changed their district. They
7	didn't live in their own district.

12	So tonight, again, I'm saying thank
13	you for what you do, and I really hope
14	that you really sit and think about
15	getting it together and doing what's the

17	team. Be a team, because that's the only
18	way you have success. You see what's
19	going on at every level in our
20	government. It's sad. It's terrible.
21	People in Albany are calling me, Tom
22	DiNapoli asked me to run for congress,
23	run for senate. We need people. I said,
24	Tom, you know and Tom is one person
25	that anybody on any side knows is a

15	you, sir.
16	Next is Sara Nicholas. League of
17	Woman Voters, Long Beach.
18	MS. NICHOLAS: My name is Sarah
19	Nicholas. I'm the president of the
20	League of Women Voters in Long Beach.
21	Thank you for this opportunity to comment
22	tonight.
23	The League of Women Voters
24	encourages informed and active
25	participation in government. We work to

5	The League is an organization fully
6	committed to diversity, equity and
7	inclusion in principle and in practice.
8	The League is nonpartisan and does not
9	support or opposed any candidate or
10	political party at any level of
11	government.
12	The League is here tonight, as we
13	have done at earlier meetings, to
14	advocate for a fair, inclusive, and
15	transparent redistricting process. Part
16	of that is easy access to all
17	information, documentation,
18	notifications, disclosures of all
19	expenses of taxpayer monies, current maps
20	at all the working sessions, all the
21	agendas, all the motions. This should be
22	at one place.
23	Streaming meetings is not the same
24	as virtual meetings. Part of the Covid
25	experience for many people was conducting

2	business through Zoom meetings. Many
3	people are aware of that process. This
4	could provide an opportunity for
5	community members that cannot attend in
6	person whether it's due to a physical
7	disability, location or schedule, to give
8	their oral comments to this commission.
9	There is ample time for this
10	Commission to release the draft maps and
11	provide time for public comment. Then
12	they can consider any revisions to
13	address the public's concerns before it
14	is submitted to the Legislature.
15	It's been mentioned before, but this
16	bears repeating, the New York State's
17	recently amended Home Rule Law and the
18	John R. Lewis Voting Rights Act of New
19	York says: "Districts shall be drawn to
20	discourage competition or for the
21	purposes of favoring or disfavoring
22	incumbents of any other political
23	candidate or party."
24	We know that redistricting is a
25	highly partisan process and, perhaps,

4	recognize the responsibility of this
5	Commission is not an easy one.

10	I'd just like to ask. Are all the
11	October meetings posted on the website?
12	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: We only agreed to
13	the days last week, so they will
14	MS. NICHOLAS: So they're currently
15	not on the website? You've agreed to
16	these meetings and locations, but you
17	haven't posted them yet?
18	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: We post them
19	seven days ahead of time in accordance
20	with the local meetings law. They will,
21	likewise, be posted. We didn't have them
22	all together. You'll have fair
23	opportunity to see.
24	I do want to address one thing you
25	said. You said a very important thing.

4	Home Rule Law which you cited, that is
5	sixth priority as far as the law is
6	concerned. Let me tell you why. You
7	gotta fill in the blanks.
8	He's correct; you are correct. You
9	both did it perfectly. But the statute
10	says, "reapportionment of members of
11	legislative bodies, shall be subject to
12	Federal and State Constitution
13	requirements and shall be comply with the
14	following standards which shall have
15	priority in the order herein set forth:
16	1. Only single member districts,
17	such districts shall have nearly equal
18	population. It's 5%. It was 10%, they
19	knocked it down. This is the first most
20	important thing is the right size.
21	Population and geography drive the making
22	of the maps.
23	2. Districts shall not be drawn
24	with the intent or result of denying
25	equal opportunity of racial or language

2	minority groups to participate in the
3	political process or to diminish their
4	ability to elect representatives of their
5	own choice. That means that means that
6	we have to obey the Voting Rights Act.
7	We have to make sure that
8	minority/majority districts, whether they
9	can be fulfilled, will be fulfilled.
10	3. Districts shall be contiguous in
11	territory. That means they can touch
12	each other.
13	4. Districts shall be compact in
14	form as practicable. A very important
15	word. Very interesting word.
16	5. The section that you quoted.
17	6. Last is the districts shall be
18	formed so as to promote an orderly and
19	efficient administration of elections. In
20	other words, we want to make sure the
21	people have enough places to go and vote.
22	The issue that comes to mind, to me
23	anyway, is geography and population.
24	When this Legislature was first prepared,
25	there were roughly 67,000 people per
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2	district. There are now 73,000 people
3	per district, but they're not equally
4	spread out. They are in different places.
5	They're in different clusters. You take
6	the population, which is very important,
7	and you take the geography, which is also
8	important, and you have to mix them
9	together. What happens sometimes are
10	things that look ugly that other people
11	may accuse of being gerrymandered, and
12	they're not, because you have to look at
13	the context. You have to look at all of
14	it. All of the creations, including
15	making sure the minority population is
16	taken care of.
17	MS. NICHOLAS: Thank you for those
18	clarifications, Mr. Chairman. I hope
19	that this Commission reviews that and
20	adheres to all those requirements of the
21	Municipal Law. I think the emphasis was
22	when you've done that and you come up
23	with what you think is the best job you
24	can to and adhere to those, that you
25	release it to the public and let the

2	public say, but wait a minute. This is
3	what I think, this is my community. Then
4	you take that input and then you work as
5	a Commission to come up with something
6	that could address those issues and then
7	present it to the Legislature.
8	Thank you for your time (applause.)
9	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: I would like
10	you to first thank you for coming, and I
11	want to thank everyone from the League
12	for all of their engagement in this
13	process, providing us with testimony at
14	each of our hearings. Unfortunately, I
15	just saw some of the written testimony
16	that had been submitted a few weeks ago
17	from the League, just earlier today. I
18	do appreciate all of the engagement in
19	the process.
20	I also appreciate our Chair
21	identifying some of the other provisions
22	of the Municipal Home Rule Law that are
23	applicable. I need to make some
24	corrections here.
25	The Municipal Home Rule Law does
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2	provide a series of obligations that we
3	as a Commission must follow. Of course
4	we need to comply with the Voting Rights
5	Act. We need to comply with the State
6	Voting Rights Act, that's the new law.
7	It says, districts shall be in as compact
8	form as practicable, of course. But
9	here's the way these sorts of statutes
10	with tiered priorities are interpreted,
11	and applied, it's very simple: If there's
12	a map that's presented that seems to
13	violate one of those priorities and
14	there's an alternate map or an alternate
15	set of maps that does a better job of
16	adhering to all of the preliminary
17	priorities, then the map that's at issue
18	is likely going to be struck down.
19	So that's the situation that we have
20	here. The Magleby report, which I hope
21	that you read it, it makes that very
22	clear. What Dr. Magleby did, is he used
23	a computer simulation that went through
24	each of those priorities that came first
25	before the requirement of not drawing a

2	nexticen genermander and he goded the
	partisan gerrymander, and he coded the
3	simulation to ensure that all of the
4	randomly generated maps complied and did
5	a better job of complying than the
6	current map.
7	So let's go through it:
8	Equal population. All 10,000 maps
9	that he randomly generated have better
10	population equality than the current map.
11	I think the current map, the deviation,
12	if you look at 2010, I believe it's a
13	little over 4% I think. All of the
14	randomly simulated maps have less
15	population deviation.
16	Second, the language intent or
17	result of denying equal opportunity of
18	racial or language minority groups. Now,
19	there are several statutes that cover
20	this. But for the purpose of the
21	simulations that Dr. Magleby ran, he
22	ensured there was at least as many
23	majority/minority districts as the
24	current map.
25	Next. Districts have to be

2	contiguous. All the districts in the
3	simulated maps are contiguous.
4	Next. Districts have to be in
5	compact in form as practicable. The
6	current map is one of the least compact
7	maps in the country. I do this work
8	across the country. Some of these
9	districts are just horribly, horribly
10	uncompact (sic). Dr. Magleby ensured
11	that the simulated maps were all more
12	compact on every measure whether you look
13	at the map as a whole or individual
14	districts, more compact than the current
15	map.
16	So then what he did, once he rolled
17	of those other factors in the Municipal
18	Home Rule Law, then he ran simulations
19	and you see the partisan outcome. Ten
20	thousand maps that are more compact than
21	the current one. Ten thousand maps that
22	do a better job of ensuring minority
23	representation than the current map. And
24	what did he find? This map that we have
25	right now is more biased in favor of

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2	voters who like Republicans and against
3	voters who vote for Democrats than any of
4	the 10,000 randomly simulated maps.
5	It's clearcut. These are facts.
6	Our chairman accused me of painting
7	a dark picture. I'm not painting a dark
8	picture. I'm laying out the facts as
9	provided to us by one of the leading
10	experts in our country doing precisely
11	this work who concluded this is an
12	extreme partisan gerrymander that we have
13	today. No evidence has been submitted by
14	anyone saying otherwise. If there is
15	other evidence, I'd love to see it. I'm
16	not optimistic that it exists. This is
17	really clear, this is undeniable that we
18	have an extreme partisan gerrymander.
19	And it is clear, even though there are
20	some other criteria that come first in
21	the Municipal Home Rule Law, you can hold
22	those constant and satisfy them and still
23	have 10,000 maps and all 10,000 are less
24	extreme than we have today. It's not
25	legal and it's not a good starting point.

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2	The chairman also noted earlier,
3	well, and paraphrasing, correct me, I
4	don't mean to misparaphrase (sic).
5	Please correct me if I'm not quoting you
6	correctly, Mr. Chairman. My
7	understanding is he pointed out that the
8	fact that the current map hadn't been
9	struck down is evidence that it's a good
10	map. Well, this provision of the
11	Municipal Home Rule Law, we just got it
12	last year. It wasn't around when this
13	map was passed. This is a new law that
14	we need to comply with.
15	We also have the new State Voting
16	Rights Act that we need to comply with.
17	There are new provisions. When we look
18	at this current map and assess it under
19	these new provisions of law, we know it's
20	not going to hold up. We know it's not
21	an okay starting point. We know it's an
22	illegal starting point.
23	Again, I want to thank the League
24	for being involved in this process. I
25	want to thank the League for pointing out

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2	the law and I hope that clarification was
3	helpful.
4	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: If I may call on
5	Eileen Lilly.
6	MS. LILLY: Hello. My name is
7	Eileen Lilly with the League of Women
8	Voters. It's a pleasure to speak to you
9	this evening and to work together for the
10	best interests for Nassau County
11	Residents.
12	The League is nonpartisan grassroots
13	non-profit dedicated to empowering to
14	fully participate in our democracy.
15	While the league takes positions on a
16	variety of public issues, it never
17	supports or opposes any political party
18	or candidate. The League is here to
19	advocate on behalf of a fair and
20	transparent process.
21	I'd like to go off my script for a
22	minute and say that this map that came
23	through ten years ago, I attended the
24	redistricting meetings ten years ago. I
25	remember what was being proposed. I

2	remember the different iterations. One
3	iteration drew a line around a
4	legislator's residence and put that
5	legislator in another district. I
6	remember they drew a line around Long
7	Beach and hooked us over to Merrick.
8	Those iterations didn't pass, but those
9	were the ideas that were being brought
10	forward.
11	So, for me, trust is an important
12	factor and that's why I'm here tonight.
13	I take great heart in hearing that there
14	are computer programs that can assist us
15	in drawing more fair lines. That, to me,
16	what was spoken about last week, Dr.
17	Magleby's research into the redistricting
18	lines, it was very enlightening. Our
19	awareness has been raised and I thank you
20	for that, Mr. Pernick.
21	Another thing that I find very
22	difficult is, it's wonderful that we have
23	a translator here for the deaf. Our
24	community has a large Spanish population.
25	There should be interpreters here in

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2	their language after it's being said.
3	They're entitled to that. They represent
4	us and they are entitled to that.
5	We are also a community with many
6	disabled. Zoom would allow them to speak
7	and be heard. They are being eliminated
8	at this meeting. There is no way they can
9	address the issue.
10	Thank you and have a good evening.
11	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you very
12	much, Ms. Lilly.
13	If there are any people that are non
14	English speaking, check with the
15	gentleman in the back there (indicating),
16	please stand up (complies). If you don't
17	speak English, he has in front of him the
18	software and a tablet that can help you
19	through and understand what's going on
20	here. Thank you very much.
21	Michael Turi.
22	MR. TURI: Thank you very much. My
23	name is Michael Turi. I am a resident of
24	Long Beach. I live at 23 Indiana Avenue.
25	Esteemed Commissioners, thank you
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very much. Commissioner Fitzgerald, my condolences.

So one of the first things that got me involved in local politics was the redistricting effort that took place ten years ago. It's amazing how little has changed watching this here in front of As it stands right now, if no me. action, nothing were to happen from this body moving forward, and hours, the amount of time, to look at the maps that could be produced, we need at least two or three weeks to look at something. I don't know how you could expect a regular person of the public to digest and understand what this Commission has been tasked to create if they don't have the proper amount of time to judge it. So I urge everyone here to adopt at least a two week time period to view it. I don't see how that's arbitrary. I think an hour is arbitrary and I think it limits the public to be able to engage this Commission in a way in which the Charter

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2	had envisioned. That's number one.
3	I am from the Five Towns. That is
4	where I was born, it's where I went to
5	high school, that is where my parents
6	live now. Something that I saw happen in
7	the 2013 redistricting effort was the
8	Five Towns was ripped apart into four
9	different Legislative Districts. You have
10	the Third District, which has Inwood and
11	North Lawrence; you have the Fourth
12	District which hugs Long Beach and comes
13	up from the south; you have the Seventh
14	which goes from the corner of Lawrence
15	all the way to the high corner, like a
16	snake, all the way to Rockville Centre.
17	The people of Rockville Centre and an
18	entirely different community than the
19	folks of the Five Towns. In fact, the
20	folks of the Five Towns, I'm sure you
21	know, are quite a cohesive community.
22	Their religion and other ethnic things
23	bring them together. It tore their
24	influence apart by not giving them a
25	single legislator that they could go to

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2	to discuss their issues. Now if someone
3	lives here, they gotta go to this one.
4	You live a mile north, you have to go to
5	another one. You live a mile south, you
6	have to go to another legislator. How is
7	someone supposed to be able to receive
8	proper representation when they have a
9	different person who has to become
10	stakeholder of their issues and those
11	people have issues that matter for who
12	knows where.
13	I hope that this Commission takes
14	seriously there idea to keep like
15	communities together and most importantly
16	according to the Voting Rights Act for
17	the people who have had their power most
18	torn apart. That's, in my opinion,
19	what's the most important of all. I hope
20	this Commission takes that into affect.
21	Let me ask you one more question,
22	Mr. Moroney. You just read that list of
23	what the (buzzer).
24	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: You can finish.
25	MR. TURI: You just read the list of

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2	the criteria for the new Municipal Law.
3	Did the law specify specifically I was
4	just looking at it it didn't say one
5	was more important than it said, here
6	are the six things that you or seven,
7	I think that you should use to judge
8	this; am I wrong?
9	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Yes. It says in
10	this innate priority which are listed
11	below. So the top priority to the lowest
12	priority.
13	MR. TURI: Does it say anywhere
14	that's just a list?
15	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: It says,
16	reapportionment members of the local
17	legislative body shall be subject to this
18	Federal and State Constitution
19	requirements and shall comply with the
20	following standards which shall have
21	priority in the order herein set forth
22	the the extent applicable. Then they
23	list them A-F; highest to lowest
24	priority.
25	MR. TURI: Okay. Maybe I

2	misunderstood. Well, I was hoping
3	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: I understand.
4	Writing laws is difficult; understanding
5	them is even more difficult.
6	MR. TURI: Thank you (applause.)
7	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Stephanie Chase,
8	from Rockville Centre.
9	MS. CHASE: Good evening. I'm
10	Stephanie Chase. I'm from Rockville
11	Centre, the Lakeview section. I'm very
12	concerned about these maps. I don't even
13	know what this is that you just put up
14	here. I'm concerned because I saw the
15	map before and Lakeview is a small
16	hamlet. We don't have really half is
17	Rockville Centre and the other half is
18	part of West Hempstead. We can't get
19	commuter parking permits because we're
20	not really Rockville Centre and we can't
21	get parking permits for West Hempstead
22	because we're not really. So we are in
23	the middle of nowhere. I'm afraid of
24	being further disenfranchised for what's
25	going on.

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2	This is a whole different kind of
3	climate. I have attended three other
4	meetings. This is the third one. It's
5	been different. I don't know. You guys
6	are totally different over here than
7	you've been at the last meetings. You
8	guys have stayed the same, I'm sorry.
9	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: So are the
10	members of the audience.
11	MS. CHASE: Well, yeah. But they
12	have valid points. It was very
13	insightful. I learned a lot. This side
14	(indicating, Democratic side) seems to be
15	more for the people. If we don't agree
16	on these maps when you finally decide,
17	what happens? What happens? Do we have
18	a say? What happens if you cut right
19	through Lakeview and totally wipe us out?
20	What happens then? Where do we go to?
21	Where do we go? What happens? This is
22	gerrymandering. It really is. I've never
23	seen anything like it. This is crazy.
24	This is like what's happening in Georgia.
25	COMMISSIONER BEE: If I may. This
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2	Body, as I think has been said a couple
3	of times, gives its advice, nonbinding
4	advice, which we hope the County
5	Legislature will take seriously, but it
6	is only advice. The product of this
7	Body, goes to the Nassau County
8	Legislature and they can say we like your
9	advice, we're adopting it or we don't
10	like your advice, we're not adopting it.
11	They can ignore us. They can create
12	their own map. It's the County
13	Legislature that adopts the new maps.
14	All they're doing is asking for our
15	advice as to what we thing would be the
16	right map.
17	MS. CHASE: Well, then your advice
18	should be I've attended the three
19	meetings. Well, there's four, but I've
20	attended three. Everyone is against it.
21	Everyone. Every person that got up here.
22	In Mineola, there was over 150 people.
23	They got up and were all against it.
24	COMMISSIONER BEE: Against what?
25	MS. CHASE: Against redrawing of the
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	lines and messing everything up.
3	COMMISSIONER BEE: No
4	MS. CHASE: They want transparency.
5	I don't even understand (buzzer). I
6	don't understand it. I'm a layperson. I
7	don't understand it.
8	COMMISSIONER BEE: Right now, Nassau
9	County is divided into 19 separate
10	districts and every ten years is a census
11	that tells us 5,000 people moved out of
12	this district, 6,000 people moved into
13	this district. And in order to get
14	approximately the same number of people
15	in each district, the lines have to be
16	redrawn. One district if they lost 5,000,
17	they have to pick up 5,000 people from
18	some neighboring district and you have to
19	move the numbers around and the lines
20	around in order to accommodate getting to
21	approximately the same number of people
22	using the priority that was read into the
23	record before. The goal, which we must
24	do, or the County Legislature must do
25	eventually is to redraw the lines so you

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have the 19 districts of approximately	
equal population and with all of those	
various criteria that were read into the	
record. The County Legislature has asked	
this Body to see if it can draft a map,	
or maps, that comply with the law and	
recommend those maps to the Legislature.	

So far, there is no new map. Ιt doesn't exist. There's no new map that has been put forth by either the Democratic Delegation or the Republican Delegation. The first step is to hear from the public, what would you like to see in a new map; which district do you think should be added to, subtracted from; where should the line be moved to if a district is short on population; where should the new population come from? These are those hearings at which you tell us what your advice is to us; after which, we form an opinion and give our advice to the County Legislature. Does that help?

MS. CHASE: Yes. So that means

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1	
2	you're going to be working with them.
3	Because they have our hearts in
4	they're more in line with what we're
5	thinking. And everyone else at all the
6	other meetings that I've gone to. So
7	you will listen and work with them. I
8	mean really work. I would also say that
9	we need to see these maps before. Two
10	weeks is nothing to get a map. I just
11	found out about this meeting and I came
12	tearing over here. We need more time.
13	COMMISSIONER BEE: Thank you very
14	much for your comments. We appreciate
15	them.
16	COMMISSIONER WYATT: Ms. Chase, I
17	want to say thank you again for your
18	comments and coming out tonight. I'm
19	sorry you're just finding out about the
20	meeting.
21	I just want to be clear, as much as
22	the comment was made that all we do is
23	give advice, but there is also a
24	decisions that this board of
25	commissioners can make. For example,

3	
	areas so that more people from the public
4	can know about this. You just found out
5	about this tonight. Imagine how many
6	people don't know or didn't have the
7	opportunity. For example, more time for
8	the public to view a map once it's
9	proposed. There are decisions that this
10	panel or this board of commissioners can
11	make. It's not just to give advice. We
12	do have the power to make certain
13	decisions if we could just all agree on
14	making those decisions.
15	MS. CHASE: That's exactly what I'm
16	saying. Thank you.
17	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you.
18	MR. LANPARTER: First, I'd like to
19	start by pushing back a little bit on
20	what was said earlier by Chairman
21	Moroney. While I understand that Long
22	Beach barrier in Legislative District 4
23	was put together, I understand that. But
24	there are other districts as well that I
25	came to tell you about. About what was
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2	heard earlier by Mr. Turi, about the Five
3	Towns divided into four different
4	districts. The Village of Rockville
5	Centre, a rather large village, three
6	different legislative districts.
7	Oceanside, three different legislative
8	districts. These are all communities
9	who've had their representation diluted
10	by the previous hard gerrymander. From
11	what I've seen tonight, I feel like I'm
12	seeing 2013 all over again. The partisan
13	nature of this process that I've seen
14	since the inception of this commission to
15	the legislation forthcoming gives
16	credence to that. I think, honestly
17	speaking, speaking for myself, that it's
18	very difficult to overcome the partisan
19	nature of the process as it stands.
20	What I propose, obviously, you do
21	have to draw the lines somewhere, I think
22	drawing the lines somewhere means taking
23	the politics out of it all together. I
24	think the Commission should appoint a
25	special master of sorts. Similar to the

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2	ones that the party elected for the
3	Senate and Congress. I feel like taking
4	it out of the hands of the political
5	process is the only way to really ensure
6	we have faith in what's going on with the
7	County Legislature.
8	Thank you (applause).
9	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you.
10	Steven Edmenton, Oceanside Civic
11	Association.
12	MR. EDMENTON: I will say hello to
13	Peter Bee. I think he's the same Peter
14	Bee who's the attorney who I worked with
15	(inaudible). Long time no see.
16	I heard about this from Kevin
17	McKenna. Yes. Kevin McKenna. Democrats
18	hate him; Republicans hate him. But he
19	gets the news out there. He does get the
20	news out there. It's amazing. My
21	girlfriend's Republican, I'm a Democrat
22	and it's amazing that not one county
23	legislator on the Republican side
24	because I know everybody. As George
25	Maragos said, who don't you know? I know

2	everybody. I mean no Republican sent
3	out a Facebook about this meeting. Debra
4	Mule sent about the meeting, a little
5	part in Newsday about the meeting. I
6	called the League of Women Voters at
7	least they're here. They don't answer
8	their phone too well.
9	People come in to the Board of
10	Elections. I work the polls. My
11	girlfriend's the chairwoman. She's the
12	Republican, I'm the Democrat. We're at
13	the same table. We don't kill each
14	other. People come in during the
15	Democratic primary and they think they
16	can vote. No, they can't vote in the
17	Democratic primary in the state of New
18	York. It's amazing how as Democrats, you
19	can't get people out to vote and
20	Republicans can't get people to work the
21	polls. You're supposed to do it
22	bipartisan. Look at the maps from
23	Congress and Senate. We're gonna have two
24	Senate Districts in Oceanside.
25	I mean, I remember it was split with

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2	Harvey Weisenberg and we had two assembly
3	districts and now we have one. What
4	happened to the Board of Supervisors?
5	Nobody wanted them. They wanted 19
6	legislators. Thank God we don't do like
7	upstate and give them cars. Thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: James Hoge.
9	MR. HOGE: (Handing) Commissioner,
10	can that be handed out? That was the
11	movie I mentioned, "Thirteen".
12	I just wanted to say again as I said
13	before, it seems like we're talking about
14	good people. I'm tired of hearing about
15	good people. Good people decided that
16	women couldn't vote. Good people also
17	said that slavery was right. I'm tired
18	about hearing about good people. I want
19	to know what is and what do you think is
20	right.
21	So I have, (perusing). Sorry. I
22	wanted to be able to recite, again, for
23	the record words from Dr. Martin Luther
24	King.
25	""However difficult the moment,
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	however frustrating the hour, it will not
3	be long, because "truth crushed to earth
4	will rise again".
5	How long? Not long, because "no lie
6	can live forever".
7	How long? Not long, because "you
8	shall reap what you sow".
9	How long? Not long: Truth forever
10	on the scaffold, Wrong forever on the
11	throne, yet that scaffold sways the
12	future and, behind the dim unknown,
13	standeth God within the shadow, keeping
14	watch above his own.
15	How long? Not long, because the arc
16	of the moral universe is long, but it
17	bends toward justice.
18	How long? Not long, because mine
19	eyes have seen the glory of the coming of
20	the Lord; He is trampling out the vintage
21	where the grapes of wrath are stored; He
22	has loosed the fateful lightning of his
23	terrible swift sword; His truth is
24	marching on.
25	He has sounded forth the trumpet

10	I say to you, Commissioner, Martin
11	Luther King speeches are still being
12	recited because some of the same things
13	are still going on before Martin Luther
14	King was born. I say to you,
15	Commissioner, when you say I believe
16	there's good people on this side and that
17	side, it's not about good people, it's
18	about (buzzer) what we see already.
19	Again, you said there's nothing wrong
20	with these maps and there's nothing wrong
21	already again. What you have said has
22	been stated and pointed out time and time
23	again.
24	In my conclusion, I say what you
25	said is right. It is totally and been

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2	proven by documented and statistical data
3	that people stated here. Like Mr. Fred
4	Brewington said, he's watching, and he's
5	watching it now live. So you probably
6	will have a lawsuit if you go by what
7	you're saying is right. Because it is
8	wrong. God is watching most of all. God
9	Bless.
10	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you, James.
11	I appreciate it.
12	MS. LAKE: Good evening everyone.
13	First, I would like to say I am a
14	layperson in regards to these matters.
15	However, what fair representation means
16	to me is not being underserved, not being
17	disproportionately burdened, having equal
18	and fair meaningful involvement via
19	citizen participation. Having the
20	ability to have information disseminated
21	in a timely fashion. I am a reader.
22	Make no mistake. But I would like to be
23	given the opportunity to have an
24	opportunity to have a better
25	understanding and true knowledge of what

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2	is about to occur.
3	Living in a community that is, and
4	has been, underserved and
5	disproportioned, even though there are
6	State and Federal Laws on the books that
7	are supposed to protect communities of
8	color, communities that are low/moderate
9	income, many other types of disparities
10	as well.
11	Federal laws, Presidential Executive
12	Order 12898, Environmental Justice.
13	Federal Actions, to protect the
14	underserved, the disproportionately
15	burdened. All of the Federal agencies.
16	So some of this information should fall
17	into one of those Federal agencies as
18	well.
19	I can tell you for a fact, voicing
20	my opinion, my concerns and a plethora of
21	supporting documentation that for decades
22	have still not been fully addressed.
23	When matters such as these are occurring,
24	it is of the utmost importance that each
25	and every one of you understand that our
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2	home should be built strong from the
3	foundation up.
4	Just because I don't know if it's
5	based on population, geography, whatever
6	the case may be, it is of great potential
7	that a community that is already
8	underserved and disproportionately
9	burdened would be swallowed up by the
10	greater majority and our needs would not
11	be met.
12	I'm truly asking each and every one
13	of you to hear each and everyone's
14	concerns. We are all God's children and
15	we all deserve the right to have equal,
16	fair opportunities. If one chooses not
17	to walk through the doors of opportunity,
18	then that's on them. But I believe
19	everyone has the ability here (buzzer) to
20	have a better Nassau County moving
21	forward.
22	Thank you for your time, ladies and
23	gentlemen.
24	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Thank you for
25	your testimony.
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2	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Ms. Lake, I
3	have a question for you.
4	First, thank you so much for coming
5	and testifying. We really do appreciate
6	all the testimony that we have been
7	receiving. I am moved and appreciate
8	specifically that you said that your
9	community has been underserved and
10	disproportionately burdened.
11	MS. LAKE: North Park community.
12	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: North Park
13	community. We have heard a lot about
14	certain communities, communities of color
15	in particular, that have been underserved
16	and disproportionately burdened
17	throughout the process. I would love to
18	hear from you if you're able to share
19	with this Commission any of the ways in
20	which your community, North Park, has
21	been disproportionately burdened,
22	underserved, some examples. If you're
23	comfortable sharing, I'd be very
24	grateful.
25	MS. LAKE: Of course. I can
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2	remember from approximately about the age
3	of four or five, I resided at 56 East
4	Harrison Street within the North Park
5	community. That was my first family
6	home. Within I would say approximately
7	several years, that street was closed via
8	Urban Renewal. Slum clearance, negro
9	remover. The project number was R23,
10	Change Order 72497, City Block 277 Street
11	Closed, East Harrison Street. If you try
12	to obtain the records now, it's I do
13	have copies; I do. It's very difficult to
14	see that that street ever existed.
15	That's part of our history.
16	The second gentrification occurred,
17	there was the Walbaum's shopping mall.
18	East Chester Street, Section Block and
19	Lot 5996210. If you look at that
20	section, block and lot online, Nassau
21	County Land Viewer, you will see the
22	unfortunate mom and pop stores that were
23	demolished on Park Avenue with the
24	apartments above. But there's no record
25	of East Chester Street, all the homes

2	that were demolished. That was the
3	second gentrification, residential
4	displacement.
5	Okay. You can read the City of Long
6	Beach's Technical Memorandum May 2005,
7	VI-III specifically states that bay front
8	redevelopment could create secondary
9	gentrification within the North Park
10	area; however, that statement is
11	partially correct, but the numeric value
12	is not. That would be three.
13	On the ocean side. Super block. It
14	was 80 Riverside, 59115, lots 1-10, 40
15	units via Urban Renewal.
16	So when we're moving forward, and
17	we're not even speaking of the two
18	incinerator sites, you have two major
19	utilities there. I can give you the
20	section, block, and lot, but I won't.
21	The magnitude of what my community,
22	myself, and my family endured via
23	exposure to carcinogens. Dioxin three
24	times BPA standard at that time. I do
25	have all the supporting documentation

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2	that I did obtain from state, local, and
3	federal entities. Because when I heard
4	of the second gentrification, it truly
5	bothered me. I knew what it felt like to
6	be displaced, and my family, and the
7	heartbreak. I'm lucky to be standing
8	here to tell a small portion of the
9	entire story.
10	Moving forward, this is what happens
11	oh, right now, we are waiting on the
12	north shore critical infrastructure,
13	which is supposed to protect the North
14	Park community as well as the City's
15	critical infrastructure from flooding.
16	Nine years later, this hasn't occurred
17	and we are the only area within the City
18	of Long Beach that does not have any
19	flood protection measures in place
20	(applause).
21	I don't want to take up any more
22	time. Thank you, sir. Thank you,
23	everyone.
24	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: I really
25	appreciate that background. Thank you
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	for sharing your expertise with this
3	Commission.
4	I know Long Beach well. I know the
5	North Park Community well. Not everybody
6	on the Commission may. When you refer to
7	the North Park community, you're
8	referring to a primarily Black and Latino
9	community; is that correct?
10	MS. LAKE: Correct.
11	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Do you feel
12	as if the 19 member County Legislature
13	that's been elected under that map has
14	been responsive to the needs of the North
15	Park community?
16	MS. LAKE: Honestly, I could say not
17	that I'm aware of. Because we would have
18	flood protection at this point and time.
19	That's my opinion. I don't want anyone
20	to take it personally, but I think it is
21	a known fact. Okay.
22	At this point and time, being priced
23	out, flood out, I don't know, ladies and
24	gentlemen, we have to go somewhere.
25	We're truly in need of this process and
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	any other process to work across the
3	board for all. Thank you (applause).
4	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Crystal, who is
5	your Legislator?
6	MS. LAKE: Denise Ford.
7	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Okay. I'll make
8	sure she hears that.
9	Ms. Kathy Williams.
10	MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening. Thank
11	you for coming out with more bad news.
12	In this country, gerrymandering goes
13	way back. Are you familiar with the word
14	gerrymandering?
15	(Whereupon, no response.)
16	MS. WILLIAMS: Study your history
17	books, because what you're doing now is
18	what they done in the old days swapping
19	sections and districts around for
20	political purposes. This country has
21	always been involved in gerrymandering.
22	I don't know why you don't know about. I
23	heard about it in the sixth grade.
24	Gerrymandering, it's to disassemble (sic)
25	people and as usual, those who have get
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	TEMPORARY DISTRICTING ADVISORY COMMISSION 09.28.2022
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2	more and the ones who don't have, get
3	less. I've never seen anything good that
4	came out of gerrymandering, especially
5	for minority groups. The communities
6	lose.
7	Nassau County has always been
8	jealous of Long Beach; it's true.
9	Because the people out here are running
10	our business and they didn't like it.
11	They want to be in control of everything.
12	So now they've come up with we are
13	dealing with our own gentrification out
14	here in the first place. Right here in
15	Long Beach. All accountable ways to get
16	rid of and do this and do that to you.
17	The bottom line is, bye.
18	When you're dealing with this type
19	of situation, it's very hard on
20	individuals who are constantly faced with
21	gentrification. If it doesn't come in one
22	form, it comes in another form. It's
23	still gentrification.
24	I say to you, these maps need to go
25	back where they come from and redone, or

18	the room. You understand? I'm here
19	representing these people. I take this
20	very, very seriously. We were the
21	essential workers during Covid. We were
22	the ones in the hospitals without
23	insurance. We were the ones saving all
24	of your butts for months, and months, and
25	months and you can't even have the

9	paperwork so people can take it home.
10	They're gonna have folks with headsets
11	that you could interpret to the
12	individual. Please, don't be lazy. This
13	is for us taxation without
14	representation.
15	(Spanish). I am begging you to
16	please do the right thing. We get
17	ignored. We are invisible. Our people
18	are afraid to come out because they're
19	afraid to get deported even if they're
20	here legally. We're good neighbors and
21	hard workers. We're taking care of your
22	grandparents, your parents. We're taking
23	care of your children. We're taking are
24	of your gardens and your backyards.
25	We're cleaning your windows, cleaning

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inside of houses. I'm done with this.		
Don't ignore us. We've crossed boarders		
to be here. It's the best country in the		
world.		

6 My father came from communist Cuba and my mother from Puerto Rico. Both 7 8 those countries when people this land 9 they can get to stay, right? Puerto 10 Ricans are Americans. But the people 11 coming from El Salvador, Honduras, 12 Guatemala, Nicaragua, Venezuela, I can 13 list them all. They're here. And you 14 gotta pony up. You have to pony up. 15 COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Ms. Alessi, 16 can I ask you a quick question? 17 MS. ALESSI: Yup. 18 COMMISSIONER PERNICK: First, I just 19 want to thank you from the bottom of my 20 heart for being here, for making your 21 voice heard, and for testing the Language 22 Line. Thank you for doing that. It's 23 especially concerning that we don't have 24 proper translation services, that we 25 don't have people here, we don't have a

4	decade. You talked about Long Beach,
5	it's really important information. You
6	may know, I think the Latino population
7	in Nassau County has grown something like
8	30% in the last 10 years. It's a dramatic

12	believe have any candidates from those
