21	In the meanwhile, in each of these
22	proceedings, I have taken the opportunity
23	to put some thoughts on paper. Those of
24	you who've been here upon multiple
25	occasions, and there are a few of you
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1 2 that I recognize, will recognize a few of 3 the things that I'm saying so we can all work from the same page. 4 5 First, I want to thank Tom Alfano 6 for subbing for me last week. He did a 7 heck of a job under difficult circumstances. 8 9 I'd like to welcome you to the sixth 10 public hearing of the Temporary 11 Redistricting Advisory Commission. This 12 is an opportunity for the residents and 13 taxpayers to suggest and to tell the 14 commissioners what they want to have and 15 what they want to see in their maps. 16 There will be additional 17 opportunities for the public to have 18 input into this process. To date, the 19 members of both the Republican and 20 Democratic delegations have heard from 21 approximately 95 speakers with varying 22 requests to keep various communities 23 together. 24 I trust that the public attendees 25 and those streaming this, watching this

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2	from stream, are free to share your
3	ideas. We are open to receiving e-mails
4	and the like.
5	(Whereupon, there was an
6	un-mic'd unidentified speaker
7	from the audience.)
8	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: The Commission
9	Mr. McKenna, you're out of order. You're
10	out of order. You're out of order.
11	(Whereupon, unidentified
12	audience member continues to
13	speak.)
14	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: If I could, the
15	Commission consists of 11 members with a
16	non-voting chair being appointed by the
17	county executives. There are five
18	members appointed by the Presiding
19	Officer and five by the Minority Leader.
20	The Commission permits but does not
21	require public hearings. The priory
22	apportionment processes established the
23	tradition that these hearings will be
24	happening on a regular basis.
25	The County Legislature has allocated
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\$985,000 to fund the work of the
Commission. The allocation is divided
equally between the commissioners, both
appointed by the Presiding Officer and
the Minority Leader; however, a portion
of the \$985,000 is set aside for services
such as stenographic services, American
Sign Language interpreters and
Spanish-speaking interpreters and other
shared costs of the Commission.
Each delegation of appointees shares
the balance equally for the purchases of
the needed mapping technology, software,
the hiring of experts, counsel and other
staff as they may deem necessary to this
process.
In developing the map or maps, the
Commission must comply with both federal
and state law. The proceedings have to
be fair and transparent to the public.
The transparency is achieved by
significant outreach to the public and
holding public hearings on any map or
maps or plans for redistricting that may

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2	be submitted to the County Legislature by
3	these commissioners or others.
4	Once maps or plans are drawn, there
5	will be an opportunity for the public to
6	see and give an opinion as to the work
7	product.
8	We are looking forward to a full
9	hearing in early November at a date to be
10	determined.
11	The updated website will have a link
12	to any and all maps that may be presented
13	by any commissioner or anyone else.
14	Thereafter, any map or maps are turned
15	over to the legislature. Likewise, all
16	the transcripts from the public and
17	public comment that are generated by
18	these hearings from the TDAC will also be
19	sent over.
20	There'll also be an opportunity
21	after these hearings close for input, and
22	that date will be announced as and when
23	we get to the last hearing.
24	The full legislature will conduct
25	public hearings on submissions by an
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appropriate legislative committee, then the entire legislation. Te goal of the temporary Redistricting Commission is to have our process complete and complete its hearings so that the legislature has adequate time to review any submissions of maps and conduct its hearings.

The County Legislation may reject, adopt, revise or amend the redistricting plan or plans recommended by the Temporary District Advisory Commission or adopt any other redistricting plan that meets all constitutional, federal and state statutory requirements.

In an effort to achieve transparency, all of the meetings and hearings will be in public and streamed live over the internet, which I believe I said earlier, and the Legislative Clerk will preserve those records. Further, this commission will stream the hearings and keep the record open for a period of time once these are completed which has also been referenced. It will include

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2	the submissions including e-mails and
3	correspondence received prior to the date
4	that the Commission record is closed.
5	Nonetheless, any correspondence or e-mail
6	or information received after that date
7	will also be forwarded to the full
8	legislature for its consideration.
9	In preparation for this hearing, a
10	notice of this meeting and others was
11	sent to the following:
12	- the Office of the County
13	Executive; all the County Legislators;
14	members of the Minority Commission
15	Delegation; members of the Majority
16	Commission Delegation; Nassau County
17	League of Women Voters; the City of Glen
18	Cove; the City of Long Beach; the Town of
19	Hempstead; the Town of North Hempstead;
20	the Town of Oyster Bay; 22 villages in
21	the Town of Hempstead; 30 villages in the
22	Town of North Hempstead; 16 villages in
23	the Town of Oyster Bay; 55 libraries,
24	like the one we're in tonight; 57 school
25	districts; 67 civic associations; 50

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2	chambers of commerce; and, approximately,
3	150 members of news and other media
4	outlets that serve Nassau County.
5	There are additional hearings
6	scheduled for October 20 at the Albany
7	Avenue Community Center and the Elmont
8	Memorial Library on the 26th of October.
9	With that, I'm going to call upon
10	our first speaker.
11	COMMISSIONER MEJIAS: Mr. Chairman,
12	if I may.
13	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Sure.
14	COMMISSIONER MEJIAS: We do have
15	serious concerns at the silence of the
16	Republican Delegation and the disregard
17	they've had they've demonstrated for
18	the integrity of this process.
19	First, at the last meeting, we
20	proposed that in the spirit of
21	transparency that both delegations
22	disclose any experts they have contracted
23	to analyze and develop maps. The
24	Republican delegation, to date, still
25	claims they have not contracted any
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experts and have no one working to analyze or develop maps. Assuming that they are being transparent in that claim, this is even more concerning as it shows that they are either counting on the Republican control legislature to develop the maps and choose their voters rather than their voters choosing them and choose what district lines they want to run in, or it's a clear neglect of their responsibilities to the public. The Democratic Delegation has disclosed their experts and initial findings to the public and we've put our initial reports and findings into the record from both Dr. Daniel Magleby and our expert on demography, Dr. Megan Gall. Secondly, as it is now October 18, at the onset of this process, the Democratic delegation had proposed a resolution that both delegations put forth their proposed maps by October 14, four days ago. Not only did the Republican delegation vote down the

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2	resolution but they continue to propose
3	the maps are released the same day that
4	they would be submitted to the Nassau
5	County Legislature. This is unacceptable
6	and an insult to the process and the
7	people as it gives the people of Nassau
8	County zero time to review the maps and
9	put any concerns or questions they may
10	have on the record.
11	Our experts, Dr. Magleby and
12	Dr. Gall, in their reports had two key
13	findings that should cause alarm and show
14	the seriousness of the redistricting
15	process and the threat of the current
16	maps.
17	Our first expert, Dr. Daniel
18	Magleby, has determined that the current
19	county legislative map is an extreme
20	partisan gerrymander which violates New
21	York State law. In other words, we need
22	to start from scratch with our new maps.
23	Moreover, our demographer and
24	expert, Dr. Megan Gall, has made a
25	preliminary determination that there is
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substantial evidence that the current map and any new map adapted by Nassau County that is similar to the current map violates both Federal and State Voting Rights Acts and illegally dilutes the voting rights of members of the minority community.

What does this mean? The current maps are completely, legally invalid and must be scrapped. We must start fresh with completely new maps. If we do not, the maps we propose to the County Legislature will be illegal and the Commission will violate its duty under the County Charter to properly propose legally compliant maps.

18 At the last meeting we attempted to 19 show a PowerPoint to the public in order 20 to educate the public better on the 21 redistricting process. We were thwarted 22 and not allowed to present our 23 PowerPoint; however, we did hand out the 24 PowerPoint deck to the public and we do 25 have copies of that deck tonight, which

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we'll hand out to the public and was already put into the record. So I'll ask our Democratic staff to hand out to the public, anybody that wants a copy of the PowerPoint which talks about what the redistricting process is and what our responsibilities here of this Commission are.

Since the current maps are illegal and must be scrapped, we must start fresh with completely new maps. If we do not, there is a serious threat that the maps and new legislative districts will not only be illegal but members of minority communities will be under represented in government.

So I would ask you to look at the PowerPoint that we presented last week in Freeport because redistricting can be confusing. Naturally, many of the people in this room tonight are not familiar with the legal process of redrawing legislative districts. I'll ask that if you have any questions, we'd be glad to

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answer them.

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3 When we did try to present the PowerPoint at the meeting last week, the 4 5 five Democratic commissioners all walked 6 out on the public in an illegal recess. 7 The five Republican commissioners all walked out in an illegal recess despite 8 9 the public's outcry to see the 10 presentation. What you're going to have 11 here today is a copy of the presentation. 12 I'm still not really sure why the 13 Republican delegation didn't want to 14 provide the public with as much 15 information as possible, but I will draw 16 your attention to the PowerPoint that 17 we've handed out today so that you can 18 familiarize yourselves a little bit more 19 with what the process is. 20 Having said that I'll turn it over 21 to Jared Kasschau, my fellow 22 commissioner. 23 COMMISSIONER KASSCHAU: Good evening 24 everyone. 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2	much of what Commissioner Mejias said,
3	but the one thing that stands out in my
4	mind that bears repeating and it's
5	something that I've repeated at every
6	meeting to date is with respect to the
7	opportunity for the public to review
8	draft proposed maps that are put together
9	by this body.
10	As it stands now, as the Chairman
11	had mentioned, they're planning on having
12	the maps put together and as it stands a
13	matter of hours between the time that
14	those maps were published and the times
15	that they're transmitted to the County
16	Legislature.
17	As Commissioner Mejias had just
18	mentioned, redistricting is a very
19	complex process. It requires expert
20	analysis. There's absolutely no way that
21	the public can have an opportunity to
22	meaningfully review those maps and
23	experts have an opportunity to review
24	those maps before they're transmitted to
25	the Legislature.
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	Temporary Districting Advisory Commission 10.18.22
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2	I've gone on multiple occasions
3	about our efforts to have the agreement
4	with my colleagues on the other side of
5	the table with respect to producing maps
6	at least one week in advance of those
7	maps being transmitted to the Legislature
8	to no avail and it's extremely
9	frustrating. I think we're doing the
10	public a great disservice by trying to
11	compress the amount of time within which
12	the maps are transmitted, published and
13	then transmitted to the Legislature. I
14	strongly believe as my colleagues do,
15	that those maps should be vetted
16	carefully by not only this Commission and
17	the experts that we've engaged, but also
18	by all of you.
19	With that, I'll pass my time over to
20	Commissioner Pernick.
21	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Thank you
22	very much.
23	As Commissioner Mejias referenced in
24	his initial comments, the members of the
25	Democratic Delegation have retained two
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2	experts who have been doing objective,
3	non-partisan analysis of the current map
4	to inform our process. They've prepared
5	preliminary reports which we've submitted
6	into the record and you can find them
7	online. They are not on the official
8	website, but they are on a shared drive
9	that the Democratic members have made
10	available to the public. A link to that
11	shared drive is included in the
12	PowerPoint presentation. So you can go
13	ahead and look at the two expert reports
14	that have been submitted to this
15	Commission by the Democratic members.
16	The takeaway from the first report,
17	submitted by Dr. Daniel Magleby, is
18	extremely important. As Commissioner
19	Mejias said, he concluded that the
20	current map and any new map adopted by
21	Nassau County that is similar to the
22	current map is an illegal partisan
23	gerrymander. The results of his analysis
24	leave no room for doubt on that point.
25	And this is important because the laws
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have changed over the last ten years. The Municipal Home Rule Law now has a provision that provides, "Districts shall not be drawn to discourage competition or to favor or disfavor incumbents or other particular candidates for political parties."

We know the methodologies the courts will look at when evaluating whether that standard has been met, has been complied with, and we know that the current map fails and any map that bears significant resemblance to the current map would fail.

> How did Dr. Magleby do this? Well, it's pretty simple. He uses a computer simulation to generate 10,000 random maps that comply with the requirements into the law, and he measures the outcome of the map that's being evaluated against those 10,000 maps. What did he conclude? The current Nassau County legislative map has more bias in favor of Republicans and against Democrats than all 10,000 random

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simulated maps. That's evidence that courts across the country would look to. The map is an illegal partisan gerrymander.

His report officially places this Commission, officially places Nassau County on notice that if we don't start from scratch, if we use that map as a starting point, we will be in violation of the Municipal Home Rule Law's prohibition on partisan gerrymandering.

The second report, submitted by Dr. Megan Gall, is a preliminary assessment of whether the map complies with the Federal Voting Rights Act and the State Voting Rights Act. These are incredibly important laws designed to protect communities of color against racial discrimination in voting. The takeaway from her assessment is also really simple and incredibly important. There's substantial evidence that the current map and any map adopted by Nassau County that is similar to the current map

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would violate the Federal and the State Voting Rights Act.

How did she do this analysis? Well, it's, again, pretty straight forward. She walked through the preconditions, the standards laid out by the United States Supreme Court. She walked through the methodology that is in the New York State Voting Rights Act and concluded that there's an obligation that it's possible to draw a map with five majority/minority districts and there's, therefore, an obligation to draw a map in which voters of color have an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice in at least five districts. The current map was drawn with only three majority/minority districts.

In the last ten years because of the growth of the minority community in Nassau County, there are now four districts. She has confirmed that it's possible and, in fact, required to draw five. So any map that doesn't achieve

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that goal we're concerned would very likely violate the Federal Voting Rights Act and the State Voting Rights Act.

So what does this mean? This also puts us on notice. It puts this Commission and it puts Nassau County on notice that we have an obligation to comply with the Federal and State Voting Rights Act, and if we have a map that looks anything like the current map, we're probably going to violate those statutes.

So we have an opportunity to fix those violations now. I know that my colleagues on the Democratic side are committed to doing so and I hope we can work collaboratively with our colleagues on the Republican side to work together to develop a map that complies with all of these requirements that can earn six votes so we can send that to the legislature for a recommendation. Thank you. Dave? COMMISSIONER MEJIAS: We've

11	COMMISSIONER BEE: Mr. Chairman?
12	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Yes, Mr. Bee.
13	COMMISSIONER BEE: I'd just like to
14	note that I do agree that we seem to have
15	different approaches to the process. My
16	understanding is that we are here to hear
17	from the public. Thus far, we have now
18	spent 20 minutes hearing from the
19	Democratic Delegation that their lawyer
20	has told them that a 10-year old map is
21	illegal. We're here to draw a new map.
22	The first step in that process, we think,
23	is to hear from the public as to how they
24	would like the new map to look. That
25	being said, I request that you call upon

4	Moskowitz.
5	MS. MOSKOWITZ: Good evening. My
6	name is Karen Moskowitz, Co-Chair of the
7	Nassau League of Women Voters
8	Redistricting Committee.
9	The League's a non-partisan grass
10	roots non-profit encouraging informed and
11	active participation in our democracy.
12	The League takes position on a
13	variety of public policy issues, but
14	never supports or opposes any political
15	party or candidate. As it has at all
16	earlier public meetings of the
17	Commission, we're here to advocate on
18	behalf of the transparent and inclusive
19	redistricting process. Once again we
20	remind you that redistricting is
21	foundational to the right to vote and
22	that the public must be able to observe
23	the work of the commission, but to date
24	what we lived with is an opaque
25	procedure.

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2	Firstly, with respect to the current
3	process, repeated requests for an
4	inclusive process in statements to the
5	Commission made by both the League and
6	the public have fallen on deaf ears.
7	There are a few public meetings and
8	working and mapping meetings, if there
9	are any, are held outside the public
10	view.
11	An expanded calendar of public
12	meetings could easily continue into
13	December and still allow the Commission
14	ample time to draw its proposed maps and
15	meet the submission deadline to the
16	Legislature.
17	Despite claims that public meetings
18	are broadly publicized, the public must
19	work to find meeting details. On the
20	official Commission website, details of
21	future meetings aren't posted in a timely
22	manner or require layers of click-through
23	to access. Full meeting information is,
24	however, readily available on the
25	Democratic Delegation's shared drive.
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2 Dates and venues must be publicized with 3 ample notice and the County Clerk's officially designated newspapers. 4 5 Provisions still have not been made 6 for those who are physically challenged 7 despite that County Legislature and Commission meeting notices clearly state, 8 9 "The Nassau County Legislature is 10 committed to making its public meetings 11 accessible to individuals with 12 disabilities and every reasonable 13 accommodation will be made so that they 14 can participate." By holding no meetings 15 virtually, the physically challenged 16 aren't able to participate in real time 17 with live oral statements or by 18 responding to questions posed by 19 commissioners. 20 Secondly, the current plan is for 21 the Commission to introduce proposed maps 22 at 5:00 p.m. on November 10 and submit 23 them to the legislature three-and-a-half 24 hours later. This effectively eliminates 25 the public's ability to analyze and

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2	respond to the maps prior to their
3	submission to the Legislature. It also
4	means the Commission has no intention of
5	holding public hearings to enable the
6	community to express whether the maps
7	meet their expectations.
8	The State Independent Redistricting
9	Commission held a second round of public
10	hearings after the release of its
11	proposed maps and the court, hearing the
12	Harkenrider v. Hochul litigation allowed
13	a window of public comment on the
14	congressional and New York Senate maps
15	proposed by it's court-appointed Special
16	Master.
17	The County Charter gives the
18	Commission until January 7, 2023 to
19	submit their mapping plan. The
20	accelerated November 10 timing
21	demonstrates gross disrespect for the
22	public and is an obvious attempt to
23	bypass community input.
24	The County's redistricting process
25	has been opaque and the lack of
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	Temporary Districting Advisory Commission 10.18.22
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2	responsiveness from the Commission on
3	concerns raised show little regard for
4	interest of its residents.
5	The League has suggested remedies so
6	that communities of interest can be
7	fairly served by the Commission's mapping
8	plan. Let's make the efforts necessary
9	for a fair redistricting process. Thank
10	you.
11	COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Ms. Moskowitz,
12	if I may, I first want to thank you for
13	coming. I know that you and other
14	leaders in the League have been deeply
15	involved in this process. I am grateful
16	for that
17	MS. MOSKOWITZ: Thank you.
18	COMMISSIONER BEE: and I know
19	some of the individuals up here are truly
20	grateful for the involvement, the
21	guidance, the testimony from the League
22	throughout this process.
23	I want to elevate two of the points
24	that you have raised. First, virtual
25	meetings. I think you make a very
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important point that virtual meetings
would be essential for many members of
our community who cannot come out on a
weekday evening to participate in person,
who may not be able to come to in-person
meetings at all and having virtual
meetings is a critical step.

I introduced a resolution at the outset of this process calling for at least two virtual meetings, one before maps were introduced and one after maps were introduced so the members of the public would have that opportunity. I do hope that's something that we can reconsider in light of the advocacy from the League on that point.

Second, I think it's worth elevating the important point you raised overlooking what's happened in the State process even with the compressed timeline; even with the litigation; even with all of the challenges that have plagued the State redistricting process, they were still able to have not only a

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2	full set of hearings of the Commission
3	after draft maps had been introduced, but
4	a set of hearings in an extremely
5	compressed judicial schedule where there
6	is a week for members of the public to
7	weigh in and participate on proposed maps
8	and have their voices heard.
9	So I think it's really important,
10	the point that you raised, that there's
11	no good excuse for denying the public
12	this opportunity to comment, to weigh in
13	on proposed maps
14	MS. MOSKOWITZ: And then as you say
15	with respect to Harkenrider v. Hochul,
16	the public was given a mere three days to
17	respond. They either had to
18	send e-mail something or drive up or
19	fly up to Bath, New York.
20	In that short amount of time, 3,000
21	public comments were received and the
22	Special Master actually took them into
23	account and a point of fact did respond
24	to something the Nassau League of Women
25	Voters had suggested with respect to how
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Long Island is oriented, but 3,000 comments in three days. COMMISSIONER PERNICK: Absolutely.

Well that, again, speaks to the role of and the impact that something like that can have.

Based on your testimony to this Commission, I would, at this point, like to make a motion for this Commission to hold at least one fully virtual hearing in addition to any other hearings that are scheduled for us to hold that after draft maps are released but before a vote is held so that members of the public will have that opportunity to do exactly what the media's been recommending, to participate virtually and have their voices heard in that mechanism.

I'll make that motion at this time, and if it's unclear, I'm happy to restate it.

COMMISSIONER MEJIAS: Second. CHAIRMAN MORONEY: On the motion --COMMISSIONER PERNICK: And I'll make

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a motion for a roll call vote.

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3 CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Mr. Pernick, on 4 that issue, at least two weeks ago, Mr. 5 Mejias was sent an e-mail together with 6 Mr. Clines and I don't know who else was 7 on it, requesting whether or not we could set up a virtual hearing. So there's no 8 9 reason that I can see why we can't agree 10 to that. That is something that has been 11 on the table. We have not been answered. 12 We don't know where you stand on it. We 13 know where you stand on it, and I'm 14 assuming that this is going to get a 15 positive vote on the part of Mr. Mejias. 16 I don't think there's any objection to that; however -- That's all I have to 17 18 say. 19 COMMISSIONER PERNICK: My 20 understanding is that the proposal was 21 not to hold a virtual meeting after maps 22 were released. My motion is for us to 23 commit as a Commission to hold one 24 virtual meeting after maps are released 25 and not have that replace another

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meeting, but have a stand alone, additional virtual meeting that we schedule after maps are released. That's the motion that's on the table. CHAIRMAN MORONEY: As to the motion, I don't know why you're afraid to turn this over to the County Legislature? There's certainly competent people, competent people in this audience who can figure out how to do that. You guys just

> want this thing to go on forever. I don't know why, but that's the reality that makes no sense whatsoever.

We have time right now to do a virtual meeting. It's been requested by the League of Women Voters. You have not agreed to send anything back to us. It's laid out there as frequently happens.

On another issue -- this issue. It seems that at every one of these meetings, instead of listening to people, a little ambush takes place. Two meetings ago the day before the meeting was held, we received a request for a

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2	resolution the following day. That's not
3	providing anybody with a lot of notice.
4	That's an ambush. Last week, PowerPoint,
5	and all that was asked was tell us what's
6	in it. Show it. We have no idea what
7	you had in it. Yet, the second ambush
8	accounts, and here we are today, a third
9	ambush. We keep on upping the ante to
10	keep this party going. When it's time to
11	finish up, we're going to finish up. So
12	that's all I have to say on it.
13	COMMISSIONER MEJIAS: First of all,
14	just to make the record clear, my
15	understanding is you wanted to make the
16	last meeting virtual, which we want a
17	virtual meeting in addition to the
18	meeting's that are already scheduled.
19	Second of all, I think it's ironic that
20	you think it's an ambush that you didn't
21	get our PowerPoint in time for the
22	meeting a day or two before, but you want
23	to give the entire county an hour to
24	consider the maps that could determine
25	who represents them for the next ten

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years. So the only ambush happening here is coming from the Republican Delegation on the people of Nassau County.

I don't understand why we can't give the people a week or two to look at the maps. Everybody works hard. Maybe you can't take off of work on November 10 to looks at the maps in the hour and quickly tell us what you think. Why can't we give people time to look at these maps, to analyze what we've come up with? Why you can't tell us who's drawing your maps?

I'm sure you have a lot of faith in the Nassau County Legislature when you look at how gerrymandered the Presiding Officer's own district is. The Presiding Officer's district is illegal. It's illegal, and he is in charge of the redistricting process, and he will determine what the maps look like. He's going to determine what his district looks like so he can preserve his own power and he's going to determine who his

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2	voters are, not that the voters are going
3	to determine who their elected official
4	is.
5	If it's too much to ask to give the
6	people more than an hour, don't complain
7	that we didn't give you your PowerPoint a
8	few days in advance, and the PowerPoint
9	was just informing the public about the
10	process. So if you want to talk about
11	ambushes, maybe we should stop ambushing
12	the people of Nassau County.
13	CHAIRMAN MORONEY: Call the roll on
14	the motion.
15	CLERK PULITZER: Yes, sir.
16	Commissioner Peter Bee?
17	COMMISSIONER BEE: Mr. Chairman,
18	it's my understanding the motion calls
19	for an additional hearing post map to be
20	done by Zoom, and while I would encourage

24	to do so, I'm going to vote against this
