Welcome to the Legislative meeting. We have several orders of business before we get into the public comment portion. As we always do, we start things off with the Top Cops. We then have a presentation in recognition of Italian Heritage month, and then lastly, we are going to be recognizing a couple of baseball and softball teams that have achieved tremendous things, which we will be recognizing.

After that, we will have the public comment portion of our meeting. If you have not already done so, and you intend to speak, please fill out a slip and give it to our Clerk's Office down here and we will put you in line to speak when the public comment portion starts.

Let's get started with Top Cops. Id' like to invite Nassau County PBA First Vice President Kevin Mullick for the purposes of a presentation.

MR. MULLICK: Good afternoon,

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everybody. I want to thank everybody for the opportunity for me to speak and present our Top Cops and heroes today. Did a very excellent job. So here are our Top Cops for October 2022.

On September 22nd at approximately 18:35 hours Second Precinct and police officer Jason Ziegler and Salvatore Mangano were on patrol in the Syosset, Woodbury area. These officers heard a radio assignment for a stolen Mercedes-Benz in Woodbury. The officers began canvassing as soon as they heard the description of the vehicle. Officer Ziegler spotted the vehicle eastbound on Jericho Turnpike. He then transmitted the vehicle's location over the radio. The vehicle then entered the turning lane of Jericho Turnpike to make a left turn to head south on South Oyster Bay Road toward the Long Island Expressway. Officer Ziegler stopped in the turning lane, a few cars back, keeping an eye on the stolen vehicle until more patrol cars

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arrived. He didn't want to alert the subject that he was there until more cars were on scene, so he refrained from using his lights and sirens.

Officer Mangano arrived on scene as traffic proceeded left on South Oyster Bay Road. Officers Ziegler and Mangano activated their lights and sirens. As officers proceeded southbound, trying to stop the subject in the stolen vehicle, a Mutton Town unit coming northbound put his RMP in the southbound lane to stop traffic.

Officers used the stopped traffic to box in the stolen vehicle. The officers tried to open the door, but it was locked. The officers gave the subject numerous verbal commands to exit the vehicle. The subject refused to open the door and continue to try to get away. The subject rammed another vehicle to get away.

Ultimately, the subject could not get away and unlocked the door, at which

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time officers gained entry into the vehicle and placed the subject under arrest. The guick thinking and teamwork of these heroes led to the recovered stolen car and closed out multiple stolen car cases out of Nassau and Suffolk County.

This is why we're proud to announce them as the top legislative cops for October 2022. (Applause.)

POLICE COMMISSIONER RYDER: Good afternoon.

First of all, you know what we're up against out there when it comes to fighting crime and there are certain rules that we've put in place. We change the game that we can make it fit. And they changed the game that day. They put themselves at risk and not to involve any of the public. The individual jumped up, tried to ram through another car to get away. They did a great job and I'm very proud of both of them. But make no doubt with what we're dealing with here, two

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young cops that have done outstanding work.

Salvatore Mangano, we all know the last name. The kid could have went and hid and did nothing. But every single day, Sal, along with Officer Ziegler, go out there and do their job. Sal went through more scrutiny than anybody else that ever came on this job. We had to put it at the level of supervision to make sure he gets through the applicant process. Then he goes out and he gets in a bad accident and busts his arm in half. He comes back to work as fast as he can. He does his job. He goes out there every single day, and I couldn't be more proud of him and his father, who was a friend of mine. So I stand by him and his loyalty to him and his family.

Before I came up and I took that little side angle, I made sure Officer Ziegler was okay with it, and obviously he was.

So, again, I just want to say I'm

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proud of all my young cops. I take a little exception for this young man. I'm very proud of him.

Thank you. Hello, OFFICER MANGANO: everybody. I just want to say on behalf of me and my partner, Jason Ziegler, thank you to the County Legislature for bestowing us with this honor. Thank you to our great police commissioner and thank you to the entire PBA. Thank you very much.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Legislator Walker.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: We couldn't be more proud of our two officers today. Jason and Sal, you put yourselves in harm's way to protect all of us. Commissioner Ryder has said many times, we don't chase after after cars. We don't want to put the rest of the public in danger where, God forbid, another car's hit, an accident occurs because you're trying to zigzag in and out of traffic. You followed what you thought was the

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right procedure, and certainly it was.

You kept an eye on this vehicle. You waited for backup to come. And once you had everyone in place, you stopped that vehicle. The vehicle had no place to go yet, still tried to get away. And you managed to take this person off the road. This car returned, hopefully -- I don't know what shape it was in to get back to its owner, but you were there to do that for the owner of that car and certainly for each and every one of us. So commend both of you tremendously for this, how

Sal has a special place in my heart, too, since I've known him since he was a baby. And here he is, one of our fine police officers today. So but for our young officers to perform the way they do is really a tribute to the entire police force and all the training that they get, which, thank God for this Legislature, we make sure that you do have the training that you need. Thank you.

proud your families are of you.

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LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Legislator Drucker.

LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you, Presiding Officer.

Congratulations, Police Officers Ziegler and Mangano for a job well done.

This is just another shining example of how the residents of Nassau County are protected by the finest police department in this country. No one can contest that at all.

But what particularly stands out to me is how your instincts and your training kicked in at a moment's notice. And I've been particularly proud and involved with the Second Precinct. It's where I live. And you've been protecting the people of my district for so many years. And the Second Precinct is hyper vigilant now because we've all seen this uptick in car burglaries and car thefts with the catalytic converters, and the Second Precinct has been interacting. They've attended many, many town halls

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and meetings that we've arranged for them

to advise the public on what's going on.

And this is just another example of how

you guys and gals are so in tune to

what's going on. And you're focused on

reducing this epidemic of crime in our

county and then in that precinct. And I

particularly am so proud of you as we all

are.

So thank you so much for your

service. Thank you so much for your

bravery and what you accomplish day in

and day out.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Well, I think

we can all agree with Arnie that this is

the finest police force anywhere in this

nation. So I think it's unanimous among

the legislators.

You know, we have noticed that over

the last several years, our police force,

our men and women on the streets have

gotten remarkably younger because there's

been hiring and because of turnover and

things of that nature.

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So this is very reassuring to all of us that our young police officers are following in the great tradition. They have the same skill, the same professionalism, same courage that those who have served this county for years. So congratulations to you two. We are honored to honor you today. Thank you (applause).

So we're going to have you come up in a couple of minutes to present citations, but we'll do the DAI in the meantime.

On behalf of the detectives, I'd like to invite up the president of the DAI, Jeff Gross.

MR. JEFF GROSS: Good afternoon and thanks for having us again. I'd like to thank the Presiding Officer Rich Nicolello and the Minority Leader Kevan Abrahams, and the Full Legislative Body for taking the time out to honor the Third Squad, Detectives Michael Echevarria and Thomas Daly.

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This is a recent case, September the fourth of this year, slightly after midnight, these detectives were in the Hempstead, Uniondale area, an unrelated investigation. They monitored both frequencies, both the Third and the Sixth, as well as the First and the Seventh precinct. They heard a call come over for a burglary in progress. They both knew the first precinct fairly well. They responded. They were the first ones at the scene. They got the suspect coming out of the backyard. They attempted to stop him. It turned into a violent struggle. They were actually able to

During the investigation, they found out that he had an open warrant in Poughkeepsie. He had a history of burglaries, forcible touching and sexual crimes. He also had an open case for robbery in the third degree from the First Precinct.

subdue him and apprehend him.

I'd like to commend these officers.

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It's not something that we normally expect, to monitor both radios and respond to a different precinct. But they took the opportunity, they used their knowledge, and they had a successful conclusion and protected the members of Nassau County. So we'd like to congratulate them. (Applause.)

POLICE COMMISSIONER RYDER: you can see, they're not only young cops, they're young detectives, too, and they're still out there doing their job. They're given the best tools by the best legislative body anybody can ask for. You always support the men and women of law enforcement, and we thank you for that.

Again, I want to congratulate both of them and the DAI for continuing to put up such great quality. We still need more detectives if anybody wants a job. Thank you.

DETECTIVE ECHAVARRIA: On behalf of myself and my partner Daly, who couldn't be here today, I'd like to thank the

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Legislature for this opportunity to recognize our work, as well as the Command Staff for the Police Department and the DAI. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Minority Leader Abrahams.

LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you, Presiding Officer.

I just want to commend you, Detective, for your outstanding work that you were able to perform, you and Detective Daly. It speaks volumes always when we hear these stories of when we're able to take violent or in this case, burglary, individuals off the street. We want to continue to strive to make our streets safer. And obviously, if there was a radio call, I'm thinking that someone saw something and they notified the police, which is great. And then from there it was in your hands with your partner, and that even speaks to the volume of the work that you have to do on a daily basis.

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And I mean, again, this person was there trying to burglarize a home, but they also committed crimes in Poughkeepsie. So Poughkeepsie gives you a round of applause as well by taking somebody off their streets as well, that can very well go back there and commit the same types of crimes.

But it goes without saying that we in Nassau County, especially now in the First Legislative District, appreciate your service, your commitment, not just to the Department but to the residents. Thank you again. And please express our well wishes and our thank you to your partner as well, Detective Daly. Thank you again, Commissioner, and all of the members of the DAI.

MR. JEFF GROSS: I should just say real quickly that I left it out of the story. But there was three women in the house. Two of them were special needs people, and they were trying to kick in or push in an air conditioning unit to

So to make a presentation, we have with us a special quest, Joe Sciame, past president of the National Sons and Daughters of Italy and America, the current president of the Foundation for the National Sons and Daughters of Italy in America and active members since 1968, a member of the greatest Lodge around the Cellini Lodge and Vice President of Community Relations at Saint John's University. Mr. Sciame.

MR. SCIAME: Good afternoon. Brother

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Richard, member of the Cellini Lodge at New Hyde Park and Presiding Legislator and all of you, my sisters and brothers of this great county that I've lived in since 1955 as a young kid.

I must say that I'm speechless for a variety of reasons. I've been battling a throat problem that the doctor says I shouldn't speak for ten days, which is impossible in my life. But in any case, standing here in this room with all the people that are behind me, what a moment. What a moment to be surrounded by heroes. So I think another round of applause for all the people that were here. I mean, those -- incredible (applause).

I'm here today, really to pay my respects to all of you for recognizing us with this special citation that was placed in the middle of our annual booklet of all the activities this year. As many of you may have known from reading about it this year, the Italian Heritage and Culture Committee of New

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York selected as its theme something very different. We decided to honor the 26 Italian and Italian American Nobel Prize laureates. This has never been done before. This required a great deal of permission from Wikipedia and everybody else, because you can't use their names because they're so honored. But we got all the permission that we needed and obviously did that.

In the middle of this, about two weeks ago, we learned that a woman from Stanford University became the 27th Italian American to achieve laureate status in chemistry. So it couldn't be a better year to honor them.

At the same time, I'm here wearing many hats, but I would say that the National Order of Sons and Daughters of Italy in America just returned from a trip abroad in Italy, where we established, strangely enough, a chapter of the Order of Sons and Daughters of Italy in Italy itself. And another group

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flew in from Palermo. And the reason is that they're modeling themselves after where we have been since 1905, one of the oldest Italian-American organizations, if not the only one. We model ourselves on charity and scholarship and benevolent good works. And so as a result, these two different groups decided that they needed to do such in Italy. I think, of course, with the political climate in Italy and with the new prime minister who was just installed within the last 24 hours, I believe, hopefully these two new chapters and lodges will continue the level of

And again, on behalf of the Italian-Americans, the tens of thousands of Italian-Americans in Nassau County, I want to convey to you the best wishes of our leadership for all that you do for us. I have a special framed poster to present to all of you. Thank you.

generosity that we have here in America.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Sir, before you, can I just make one comment?

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I'm Delia Deriggi-Whitton. And I've been a member of your lodge in Glen Cove for I have to share that one of the vears. highest honors which I have yet to get over, was I was their queen in 1985. The only time I've ever had a tiara and that anyone ever called me Queen. It hasn't happened since then.

But anyway, I want to thank you also, because although you mentioned that you do some work, you didn't give yourselves enough credit. I mean, the work that you do, not only for sickle cell anemia and with different, I guess you'd call it seeing impaired groups, the seeing eye dogs and everything else that you do. You do a tremendous effort and it really pays off. And I've been honored to be part of it. I'm the third generation in Glen Cove. And I think I'm the only Italian woman up here still. We have some men, but I'm proud to represent you as an Italian-American. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: I think we're

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LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Legislator Kennedy.

LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Thank you, Presiding Officer. Before I get started, first of all, thank you, everyone, for coming today. I'd like to thank, before I forget, Craig Garland and Joe Pinto, who cannot be here today. I know both of them very well and they have done incredible things with Massapequa Coast Little League and Massapequa International Little League. So I don't want to forget.

I'd like to thank manager Roland Clark and the coaches for the Massapequa Coast Little League, 12-year-old Williamsport team. I would also like to thank Chris Brooks, the president of Massapequa International Little League, and vice president of softball, Tom Dorsa, and the manager, Rich Eaton, and all the coaches of Massapequa International Little League team that won the New York State title for the 12U girl's softball.

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So, you know, as far back as I can remember into my childhood, baseball has been a central part of my life. I took a liking early on, even though my parents were both immigrants and knew more about hurling and rugby than they knew about baseball. But they knew it was the American game and they came along.

But now softball is becoming part of our household at home because my daughter Emma, who's seven, is developing an interest. She really liked it. Then she said she didn't. She wants to do more. But she's only seven, I have to bring her down to watch some of the older girls so I think that she'll be mesmerized and want to go moving forward.

Anyway, many of my memories are connected to baseball, and I'm sure many of you can relate in in in this entire room. I can still remember vividly yelling at the television at 1:30 in the morning back in 1986, when the Mets were about to clinch the NLCS against the

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Astros. We know we had a good year that year, and it's been a while since then.

Now I spend many of my nights and weekends coaching my son Logan's South South Shore Chiefs baseball team. And this past weekend, as a matter of fact, I was losing my voice again, this time yelling because he hit an extra inning homerun to put our team ahead and went into the championship and eventually won that championship.

So I just wanted to mention that because these are the kinds of things that we want for our children. These opportunities are available all over the place. But where we live in Massapequa, I love how the sports are such a key component of everything. The community gets so involved in everything. But right now I'm talking about baseball and softball.

So there are two teams here today from Massapequa and their parents, coaches, whole community is so proud of

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you guys, what you've done. So first of all, the Massapequa Coast Little League state champs who are not here right now, they made history when they won the New York State Championships in back-to-back years in 2021 and 2022. Now the Massapequa International Little League softball team 12-year-old Division won the New York State championship, which is something no Massapequa team or any other team in any local town has done. It's an incredible accomplishment. And Massapequa Coast Little League 12-year-old team went on to win the New York State Championship, the Metro Region Championship, and was the first Long Island team to make it to the Little League World Series since Rockville

In our town, we saw signs popping up all over the place in support of our Massapequa teams. Massapequa Coast Little League was going to the Little League World Series, so it took on a life of its

Centre did it back in 1978 (applause).

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own. Signs in shops, rallies, watch parties became the norm, and everyone in Massapequa, as well as the rest of Long Island, it seemed like got behind this baseball team and we were treated to a no hitter by Joey Lionetti to get Coast into the Little League World Series, which was another incredible accomplishment.

I will say sports in general teach us about how to handle winning and about how to handle losing. And these teams showed themselves to be supportive teammates and they demonstrated good sportsmanship throughout their respective competitions as well.

It's an honor for me to be able to say to all of you out there that what you've done is an incredible accomplishment. But you guys are so young and you're going to go on to do incredible things, reach new heights every year. Just keep striving for something better, because you managed to -- both the girls softball team and the

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Boys Little League World Series team -managed to do what you've done, and that is that is saying a tremendous amount about you and all your coaches and your parents.

Thank you for coming today and good luck to all the teams. And I hope that in the future, life in sports is great. Thank you for coming.

Would the kids like to come up to the mic. Anybody or the coaches like to say a few words. Anyone?

MR. EATON: Hi. I'm the manager, Rich Eaton. I want to thank Mr. Kennedy for inviting us here and for everyone else having us here. We appreciate that.

Through this run, the support we've gotten from Nassau County has blown my mind. I mean, these kids are just playing a game. But I will tell you, for as hard as they've worked, all the life lessons they're going to get out of this, knowing that if they work hard at anything they do, that people are going

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to recognize it and they're going to get opportunities. So I just want to thank everyone up here. I want to thank my team for making this summer the best summer of my life. So thank you.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: Before you step away, I just want to congratulate you, too. I represent not all of Massapequa like James does, but I represent up as far as North Massapequa. So I think some of the girls live in the North Massapequa area. But I could tell you that all of your teams, once you kept advancing all of Nassau County, all of of Long Island, was cheering for each and every one of you. And I played softball when I was growing up. I was a catcher, so I didn't know who your catcher is out there. But, you not only learn about your sport, but you learn about teamwork and getting together. And no one has to be the star. Today it might be your catcher or your pitcher, but it could be anyone on the team who really made everything gel that

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day. So I congratulate each and every one of you, as Legislator Kennedy said, we know you're going to go on and do more and more exciting things in your lives and not just about your sport, but about many things because you've learned so much life lessons while playing this.

So again, thank you to the coaches and to the parents and to the grandparents, because I know you all play a big role because I go back and forth and run all over with my grandkids now. So it's great. And some of you I get to see out there on the field. So again, good luck in your future.

LEGISLATOR KENNEDY: Would any of the baseball players or coaches like to come up?

MR. CLARK: Good afternoon. I'm the manager, Roland Clark. It's a pleasure to be here. Thank you to Legislator Kennedy for inviting us and the rest of the chamber for having us.

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Boys couldn't be more proud of their accomplishments this summer. One of the things that myself and the coaching staff, outside of their athletic accomplishments, we always talk about giving back. You know, what makes a true community member is the ability to give back. And at 12 years old, we can never give back maybe the way that some of the top cops were represented here today or how some adults are. But they did make a community, they did make Nassau County, and even an entire state very proud of their accomplishments this summer, and it was a real feel good story. MR. DIAMOND: Yeah. Uh, I'd like

this on the record, if possible. I am one

of the 842 property owners who were

affected by the recent egregious error

within the Department of Assessment.

I have several issues with the

explanations that have been given in

reference to this issue. I will also note

that I personally have yet to receive any

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explanation other than a vague letter that accompanied my corrected bill as to what actually happened here. Most of what I've been able to glean with watching the budget hearings from two weeks ago.

I want to know why my property was included in the 842. The TPP law states that changes to the base exemption should only be made in cases of demolition, destruction or fire. This was also confirmed at the budget hearings. My house has had has incurred no physical changes since the 1990s. No demolition, no destruction, no fire. Yet my base exemption was lowered for inexplicable reasons.

I also want to know why the homeowners were not informed. In the letter that assessor Cronin sent, he talked about being fair and transparent. This whole process was the opposite of transparent. The Assessor tried to slip these changes into the tax bills without informing anyone. I understand that

you're discussing Correction of Error

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Petitions today, but there were no Correction of Error Petitions submitted for the 842 changes that they made. Those changes were made back in June. They had plenty of time to submit these petitions to inform the homeowners to allow for some feedback as to whether they were actually able to make these adjustments.

If my property was adjusted in error, because there were no changes, then we have no clue that the 842 were actually done correctly. If that's the case, then that means the rolls are still wrong. The tax bills are still wrong. And my feeling is that we should reverse the 842, set the base exemption back to what it was originally and make the TPP that 40% that it was supposed to be originally.

I guess I'm out of time, but this whole thing was handled very, very poorly.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Levada

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Felder.

MS. FELDER: Hi, friends, legislators and community, I'm Levada Felder. We were here a couple of months ago, June 27, to seek assistance for Eager to Serve the organization of which I am the founder and now transitioning to a new role as board member, volunteer and professional fundraiser.

My initial concern was regarding the inconsistencies with the payment procedures in the Housing Department of Nassau County, DSS, the Homeless Services Department. We have provided a copy of an 18 page report provided to the Commission of DCIS in April 2020 and receipt of the document was acknowledged and some of you had the privilege to receive.

An example of the details of the document would be as follows:

We would bill -- this is an example -- DSS \$20,000 in January, we would bill DSS again \$20,000 in February, we would bill DSS again \$20,000 in March, and then

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in April we still had to bill DSS \$20,000. But in April we may get a check for \$15,000. Out of the \$15,000, \$5,000 maybe for some of the people in January. The other \$5,000 may be for some of the people in February. The other \$5,000 may be for some of the people in March, but not maybe the same people.

And then the time consuming for reconciliation and the like causes a lot of hardship for the organization, which is described in the 18 page report, along with solutions. Instead of addressing the matter, according to the social service law, we received a letter two years later regarding the termination of the operations of the shelter in April 2020, which I misinterpreted because of the date.

Nevertheless, the action is unlawful and, therefore, is in litigation. See Eager to Serve versus Nassau County ETAL #605664/2022 Supreme Court, Nassau County.

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This is being said because during our research because the matter is still outstanding, we found that the person who's responsible for the shelter invoice practice is actually out of title (buzzer) Do you want me to continue or stop?

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Your time to speak is as up. Do you want to just sum up or to your point?

MS. FELDER: Okay, I'll sum it up. The billing for Nassau County Homeless Shelters is over \$4 million per month; therefore, \$48 million per year. My opinion is that the qualifications for a Welfare Examiner Supervisor II is very different from someone who oversees an accounts payable budget for \$48 million annually. I think that a person with a financial business and/or accounting background has the knowledge base to know that paying the actual amount of an invoice and or indicating a reference to when the balance or why the full amount

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Thank you, Richard.

Barbara Epstein.

MS. EPSTEIN: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. My name is Barbara Epstein, and I am a member of the League of Women Voters of Nassau County.

The League is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influence public policy through education and advocacy.

I'm here to discuss the upcoming presentation of the map or maps for

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redistricting of the Nassau County 19 legislative districts. Mr. Nicolello, you chair the Rules Committee and are the presiding officer of this legislative body. We are asking for you to have multiple hearings around the county after the map or maps are presented, and before you vote on either of the maps or one of your own.

These districts will affect the residents of Nassau County for the next ten years. Right now, there are eight communities that have three or more legislators representing them. This needs to change.

Please be transparent and do what the Suffolk County Legislature did and come together to a in a bipartisan manner and put transparency and bipartisanship above pure politics. They created four minority/majority districts. I believe you can do better. We'll hope that you will keep this in mind when deciding on a map. Thank you.

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LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Thank you, Mrs. Epstein.

Kevin McKenna. Mr. McKenna, your time is running. It doesn't matter. I called you up about 30 seconds ago, so.

MR. MCKENNA: Kevin McKenna, Syosset, New York. It's amazing that you'll spend one hour giving out very well-deserved rewards, but you'll only give residents three minutes to speak and you try to cut people short.

You're being handed right now a copy of what's posted on your Nassau County website. And I'm going to show the public right now exactly what it says. It says that if the contracts go through the Rules Committee, if approved, issues are placed on the calendar of the Nassau County Legislative Body at full session where it's voted on by all 19 Nassau County legislators. I'd like to know why our County Executive Bruce Blakeman is violating Nassau County rules and signing contracts that are not approved by all 19

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Nassau County legislators? I'd like to know the answer to that question, Mr. Nicolello.

You were just given a copy of what's posted on your website. You're supposed to represent the taxpayers in Nassau County. You're supposed to look out for them. Why are you violating exactly what it says on the Nassau County website? It's a fair question, and I think all the taxpayers deserve an answer.

And I'd also like to know, Mr. Kevan Abrahams, Minority Leader, I'd like to know why you're allowing the Legislative Majority to violate Nassau County's rules. It says it right on the website. You gave out a contract to the Dover Group a few months ago. It did not go before all 19 Nassau County legislators. Why not? It says it right on your website. Would anybody like to respond?

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: You need to spend more time looking at the website because the website clearly indicates the

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contracts go to the Rules Committee and are approved at --

MR. MCKENNA: And I just gave you a copy of what it says on your website, Mr. Nicolello. It says it right on your website.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: You've given me a part of what it says on the website. Yes. There are items that go on before Committees and go to the Full Legislature. But with respect to contracts, they go to the Rules Committee. The Rules Committee approves them and they're approved. They don't go to the Full Legislature. I've told you this multiple times.

MR. MCKENNA: It says it right on your website. It's supposed to be voted on by all 19. It says it right on your website. Let me move on.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: I told you multiple times, but apparently, you don't understand it.

MR. MCKENNA: Let me move on. And

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unfortunately, unfortunately -- you have a lot of lawsuits that you're settling today in your calendar, and unfortunately, you're going to burden the taxpayers with another one soon.

I want to put you on notice that your Nassau County Commissioner of Health, Mrs. Gelman, received an e-mail almost two weeks ago regarding a serious health-related matter in Nassau County (buzzer). And I'm going to provide you with a copy of that letter. I've actually e-mailed it all to you. And I want you all to know you're representatives of the public.

Next speaker is Melinda Camastro.

MS. CAMASTRO: Good afternoon. I'm a

resident of East Meadow for 28 years. I

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really don't know where to begin. I'd like to thank all our police officers for the fine job that they do under the horrendous circumstances that they're given.

There are so many things that I want to address in three minutes. I don't know where to start, but my main problem and I feel bad after going up after this fine young lady who's advocating for the homeless in Eisenhower Park, a park which I travel through regularly, we have a horrendous problem with the homeless situation there. You guys have a festival of lights coming in a couple of weeks with families that are going to be visiting and the bathrooms are owned by them. They sleep in there, they urinate in them, they live in the parks. I guess everybody needs somewhere to live, but the two just don't really go. Recently, I had the opportunity of one homeless person, and I know he's homeless because I see him all the time with his

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bottles -- you know, I stop at the light and he's got his penis in his hand urinating on the wall. I'm scarred. I can't. I can't unsee it. But why should I have to?

My family is grown. I'm the wife of a first responder of 9/11 who thankfully is still healthy. I'm the mother of a Suffolk County police officer. My heart is in my chest every single day. It makes me sick that we have to live, all of us, the way we do. Our children are unsafe. They were muzzled for two years and now as a state, we're going to potentially be forcing vaccinations on them, which parents don't want. So you guys are going to have a mass exodus of home schoolers or people that are just leaving the state because we're not going to put up with what has happened going forward. So if Kathy Hochul is elected, we're going to have a big problem because you as a county are going to suffer the consequences even more than we already

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are of a Democrat leadership.

So the laws need to be changed at the top. I know we only can do so much. I still believe in my local government as much as they haven't been by our side meant much of the time.

Kids need a safe environment. You know, the drug situation has touched most of us. I don't think there's anyone that can honestly say that Fentanyl hasn't touched their life in one way, shape or another. I lost my niece to it at the age of 32 in Rhode Island, another really liberal state which just wants to give drug use freedom.

The deli on my corner, which my son used to work at. Now when you go in there, there's rolling paper, there are bongs. I refuse to send my grandson into my corner deli -- Meadow Dairy in East Meadow, which used to be a family deli. Now it's just a drug spot for everybody else. Across the street, they shut down the shop last week because the guy was

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selling Special K, the same store that potentially was selling it to this guy that smashed 25 car windshields on my corner in East Meadow only two months ago to walk free the next day with an ankle bracelet. And he walks my neighborhood with an ankle bracelet. He sits on my corner. I'm afraid.

The taxes are through the roof. I'm here because my core is here. I moved here from the city to raise my family. My family's here. We can't afford the taxes in this county, but I don't want to leave my children. I don't want to see my grandchildren not grow up. But this, this, the taxes, the crime, the homelessness, just everything is out of control (buzzer). And it's really make it an unhappy place to be. So how is that fair? How is that fair? My husband is 61. He still has to go to work every day after putting in his term at the police department, seeing all that so that we could eat because our taxes are out of

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control. And that's my biggest chunk is my taxes. I don't even have kids in the school, the school that are now bringing in transgender librarians. I mean, everything's out of control. My three minutes is up. Thank you. Stay safe, everybody. And please think of our children. Our children, our future. They're two years behind in their education. Please think about that when it's time --

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Next speaker. Pamela Hughes?

MS. HUGHES: Hi, ladies and gentlemen. Thank you so much for your time. I'm here with families. Anonymous. Sorry, I'm the crier in the group.

About six and a half years ago, my son went from high honors, was going to get a full ride to Duke, but he was introduced to drugs. It started with pot, went to cocaine, I don't know what else. He was arrested.

He was able, because of my health

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insurance, he was able to go to

California for dual diagnosis treatment

for four months and longer if necessary.

We happen to have been very lucky because

my insurance company paid for it. But in

our support groups, there are parents

whose who their children are sent to

Nassau County Medical Center or sent to

other treatment facilities and once the

insurance runs out, the family can't pay,

they're just kicked to the side to fend

for themselves. I think it's absurd.

Because my son didn't deserve to get

anything better than their children. And

it breaks my heart when I when in the

rooms and I hear this and I feel why was

I worthy? Why was my son worthy?

He did ultimately go to prison and came back and I'm glad to say, six and a half years later, he's perfectly clean.

He will have a problem for the rest of

his life getting a job and whatever. But

I'm glad he pays some kind of

consequences other than prison and other

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than, you know, every other problem he's having. But he's clean. I can't say that for some of our other members. And it's sad for me because I feel lucky when they should be just as lucky.

The money that's coming to the County from the opioid case, it needs to go to places where there's dual diagnosis. Like I said, my son had a psychological anxiety issue and he also had a drug problem and where he went was able to help him with both and give him the tools he needed. By letting one of our kids go into a facility that just kicks them out like a revolving door, they're not giving them the tools to survive. As a family's anonymous group, we have to do all the research. We have to find what we can do to make things happen. And I just would like to see some of that money to please go for something better. Thank you.

> LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Lisa Castro. MS. CASTRO: Yes, I was supporting

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my my family's anonymous member and we are guests. I'd like to thank you for hearing us. We're actually guests of Miss Whitton, who invited us to speak on the behalf of Families Anonymous.

We are a support group that's in the forefront of this drug addiction epidemic. We are the parents of our children who we see suffering the effects of opioid addiction, heroin addiction, you name it. It could be alcoholism, could be anything. And it affects everybody. There is no race, creed, religion, sex or economic background that substance abuse does not hit and it affects all of us.

So we've been asked to come and talk about the types of programs that would be beneficial for the money from the settlement to go towards. So we had a lot of ideas. We met with Ms. Whitton and we talked about the insurance industry, we talked about rehab programs, we talked about having reserve funds available for

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families, we talked about having medical hospital care, we talked about job training, we talked about crisis management, and we talked about education for public and private schools in our in our area.

We're just hoping that we can be advocates for change. And this is the first time that our group has ever spoken in public like this. We're a private, anonymous group. We meet every Wednesday come rain, sleet or shine, and we help each other through the trauma of dealing with our drug addicted loved ones.

We're hoping that we can have some better accountability for the money that's going to be spent on this issue, on health care, and for the many recovery areas that are open to us. We need more avenues. We need help from our government for resources and we thank you for hearing us. And we're hoping that the money will be put towards good use for addicted people. Thank you.

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LEGISLATOR WALKER: I just want to thank you, ladies, for being here today. I do know some of the members in your group. The opioid problem and the addiction problem we have in this county and throughout Long Island, really throughout our country, is absolutely awful. I've been to too many wakes and funerals for young people from my community and from outside of my community. And, you know, I knew these kids. I knew these kids as good students, great sports advocates, drama, music; again, wonderful families. We truly do have to do everything we can to fight this, and it's going to take all of us to fight it together.

So I just want to thank each and every one of you for being here today. And you spoke beautifully. I know you said you've never done this before, but you spoke beautifully. So thank you very much.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Just just

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want to let you know that on today's

calendar, the first item is a

supplemental appropriation of \$15 million

from the Opioid Litigation Settlement

Fund, which will go again to treatment,

prevention, etc., of substance abuse.

This is the first of a number of

different items in which that money is

going to be spent for those purposes. And

just so it's clear that the Legislature

actually created that fund when the

monies were coming in from the

settlements. We created the fund because

we didn't want the settlement monies to

go into the General Fund and just be

spent for general purposes. So it was

created so that those monies would be

directed to attacking the substance abuse

problem and now that will be starting

with this legislative agenda.

Legislator Deriggi-Whitton.

LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: I also

want to thank you for coming today. You

really did a beautiful job and I attended

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your meeting about a month ago, and I brought a neighbor of mine who is struggling. And you were so warm and welcoming to her. She's a way out of the country. But when she comes back, she's going to join you. And you gave her hope and you gave her support and I'll always be grateful for that.

I agree with the Presiding Officer that we're happy that today we're allocating \$15 million. We have \$70 million. And I think we're going to get more. I think it'll be over \$100 million by the time we're done. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for us to finally be able to make the real changes that have to happen. And your input, there's no better, because you know firsthand of what is needed and your requests are not going on deaf ears. We will all up here promise to follow up and make sure that the money is allocated correctly and it's allocated for programs. And we understand even a 28 day program is just not enough.

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We need real, real solid programming. And this money is the first time that we've had an opportunity to provide it. So I thank you. I'm so proud of you. I'm so glad that you came today. And we'll keep working together.

Rose, thank you. I know this is from your district. It's an incredible, incredible group that they have. And I look forward to continuing my relationship with you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Dorothy Buscemi.

MS. BUSCEMI: Good afternoon. I'm also here with the ladies that spoke prior. We never have come to the public before, but this insidious disease, the scourge that has created mayhem in our county, and of course our country, has pulled us out of the shadows. And this is the first time where it seems like the legislature is going to have a big impact on the funds that have been won to fight opioid and substance abuse issues within

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the county.

So we're here today to say, please. Think about substance abuse and the people that are impacted as a communal problem, because it is. It is every street, every corner that you turn. And we are losing people daily, good citizens. I looked at the beautiful young people that stood up here earlier, and I thought, I remember when all our kids were in dance and sports and had all kinds of promise before they got involved in drugs. And I would like to say that we are from the mindset of treatment based. There is no real cure, and as long as there's demand, there'll be supply and that will have to be unraveled and it'll take a long time.

But with the funds that are coming our way now, we're asking you to think about treatment. Treatment is the only way to first handle the people who are so impacted right now. Putting up billboards for the new buzzword harm

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reduction, we don't see that as an avenue that's going to help us get through this. Harm reduction is giving them almost an avenue to continue amongst the way they're living. We need treatment, treatment facilities to help them overcome their addictions, get through detoxing and hopefully sober living homes that are county funded.

This is a great deal of money and we hear that there's going to be more. And we're asking you to seriously look at it from a treatment vantage point. And if you need help, we're here to help let you know where treatment is needed. Mostly it's fighting big insurance who says 28 days is enough? I can tell you 28 days will never get you straight, clean, and sober. So thank you again for listening. And I hope we're invited back again. And have a great day.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Okay. Thank you. Lesley Culp.

MS. CULP: Good afternoon and thank

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you for the opportunity to speak. I am also with the Families Anonymous group. I

have a 26 year old son. I've been on a

six year journey with him for heroin

addiction. I'm happy to report he is

clean and sober 2 to 3 years now. But I  $\,$ 

will tell you that he had to go to rehab

more than once, and 28 days does not cut

it. He had the opportunity to go into a

program where he spent 14 months in a

therapeutic community with the adequate

counseling and care to get him on the

road to recovery. Okay. So it is

definitely overwhelming.

We question ourselves, did we do something wrong with our children? No, we didn't do anything wrong with our children. There's too many people out there that want bad things for our children because they can make money off of it. And that has to stop.

What we've done here is you've all probably received a letter that was drafted by us and sent to all the

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legislators, and I just want to hit some punch lines on this. We definitely have ideas where the funds should be used:

The funds have to be used to provide more drug rehab facilities with longer terms of stay; 28 days is definitely not cutting it. They're barely detoxed at 28 days. Their brain is still not functioning properly;

We also need funds to provide dual diagnosis. Because what you see in most of these kids, they have a depression issue or a self-esteem issue that causes them to go and self-medicate themselves with these drugs, whether it be Xanax, heroin, cocaine, you know, it's terrible;

We also need more state certified sober homes that as these young adults progress through, they can go somewhere and hopefully not be put back in their home where they go back and see the same people because that's that doesn't help;

They're also should be more funding for minimum specialized hospital care

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with resources and options.

One of the big things that helped my son was he received the Vivitrol shot. After he was clean for a couple of years, he had a slight slip and he came and I said, let's go to the doctor and get the Vivitrol shot. The shot is something that is given once a month. It blocks the receptors in your brain that crave the heroin, because I don't know if you realize, but, you know, the first time you try heroin, it's great; cocaine, it's great. After the first time, it's no longer a choice. You need it to survive. You need it to live. You need it to function.

These shots can be very expensive. The Vivitrol has been approved since 2010 and it costs \$1,500 a shot. There's another shot out now since 2017, that's Sublocade and that's \$1,800 dollars per shot (buzzer). Again, we were fortunate. Our health insurance covered this for him and he was on it for almost 18 months.

The other thing is, you know, I would think it would be much easier to give these people the shots because, otherwise, just put them on methadone and they can stay on methadone forever. They sometimes have no desire to get off of it because they're still getting high.

They're not in recovery when they're on

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: I'm going to ask you to please sum up, Ms. Culp.

MS. CULP: Right.

methadone.

The final thing I have here is that no one should be treated or disrespected when asking for help. So there needs to be funding to educate staff. And I'm including hospital staff, because I can tell you right now that my granddaughter, unfortunately, was the product of two heroin addicts. She was born addicted to methadone. And I have to tell you, when we found out she was pregnant, it was terrible because I took her to Northshore University Hospital because she could not

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stop throwing up. And the doctors there pretty much ignored her and said she needed to be in the pediatric section. And she was 22, 23 years old.

I saw this and I went to the nurse and I said, Listen, I don't care who you are. You're a human being. You deserve to be respected and taken care of. Doesn't matter if you're a drug addict or what. You need the attention. P.S., she got a very nice doctor, came over, an hour later, you're pregnant. That's what the problem is. We're lucky. We have a beautiful, beautiful little granddaughter.

So we're just here because we're interested. We keep hearing about this money. We're interested in what it's going to be used for, who's going to control it. I'm very happy to hear that it's not going into the General Fund. That was one of the questions I asked the legislator Whitton when we met with her. But I'd like to see more information on

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who's going to control this money.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: We have an item that's coming up. We have several more slips and then we'll do a Consent Calendar and we'll bring that item up.

MS. CULP: Is there going to be a committee forum to determine how this money is spent or?

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: I believe the County Executive has done a Request For Expressions of Interest. So they're still soliciting proposals from whoever has a program, a worthy program that needs funding. So.

MS. CULP: Well, I think it would be appropriate to maybe talk to some of the people who are actually living this, as opposed to some of the people who are who are doing this because, yes, they make money on it or whatever. But I think it would be a good idea if you just consider speaking to the people who are in the trenches and dealing with it on a daily basis.

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LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: You're 100%

right to your left. To your right Over

there is Chris Leimone. He's the County

Executive's representative here. So I

would ask that you give them your

information. Obviously, Legislator

Diriggi-Whitton has been in touch. So

it's important also that the

administration has your information. They

can reach out to you.

MS. CULP: Thank you. Thank you for

your time.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Mimi

Pierre-Johnson.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Good afternoon

and thank you for letting me approach you

today.

I want to talk specifically about

Elmont and Valley Stream when it comes to

redistricting. And I'd like if you can

give me an answer in reference to the

next step with the commission. I don't

want to talk about Democrats, Republican,

but on the Commission right now, the

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Republicans seems to have something that's different than what what we thought that was going to happen and I just like some clarification.

The reason that we are having all of these redistricting hearings is so that the public can tell the Commission what we would like to see our districts. And then they would draw a map and we would discuss it further and then they would give you the map that we've all given our testimonies and then you would vote on it. But it seems that it's just a meeting for us to speak, but not actual maps that will be drawn.

So on the 26th, the Commission will be in Elmont and I don't think there will be a map, but I think there should be a map because if you don't do it this way, by the time it comes to this body, we're starting all over again. And you've allocated funds for this bipartisan commission to work together to draw a map so that the public can see the map,

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discuss the map, and before you vote on it so that you know exactly that the maps are fair and there is transparency, how the maps, how the Commission came to that, and that is not happening.

So I want to ask you, what is the next step of the Commission? Because we don't want to again, in Elmont on the 26th, talk about how we don't want to be cracked. We don't want to be packed. Right? We want to see a map. That would be the good thing, the fair thing to do on the 26th, to have at least a draft map so that we can look at it. So will that happen? And I still have 54 seconds.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: I cannot speak for the commission. It is an independent entity I'm not aware of when--

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Can you stop the clock? Because I'm not done.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Then I'm not answering your question. Continue with the time. You have a little bit more

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time, because I was speaking. You get a little extra.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Thank you for reclaiming my time.

I do realize that this is a waste of your time, our time as the public. You know why? It's just a checking off of the box that you have a so called bipartisan Commission because it's not working together. Right? And when we talk about that, we want our districts to be fair, that simply means that we want someone that represents us in our district. Right? So that our votes, our voice matter. In Elmont and Valley Stream in 2013 (buzzer), we were not given fair maps. And if you look at the maps, you'll see we have to go through Rosedale, the marshes, and then make a left to go back into Nassau County on Legislative three. And you know what happened on the State and the in and the Congressional.

So what we're simply asking is transparency as to what the next step is.

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And Mr. Nicolello, you just said that you do not speak for the Commission, but if you watched because I know you were not there in the meetings, if you watch what they say, they put it back on you. don't talk about and I'm referring to the Republican side. They don't say we have the right. They don't say we will draw the maps. They don't say anything that gives them any kind of power. They always put it back on you. The Legislative Body will vote. The Legislative Body will draw the maps. We're simply going to advise them. So it is a waste of money that you've already allocated to them. And secondly, it's a waste of our time,

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Okay. Well, thank you for your comments on this.

because now we're going to have to start

all over again with our testimony, and

all we're asking for is fair maps, and

it's not happening.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: You know, I have been on this quest of believing that

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our elected officials, regardless if you represent me or not, it's fair for us to participate in our civic duties.

Since 2005, living in Nassau County, I still have that hope. When I became an American citizen, do you know who gave me the American flag and the Nassau County flag? Right here he presented to me. It was John Ciotti, a Republican. When I first spoke in front of this Body, which three of them are no longer here with us, but we are still we are still living in the decisions that they made, right? It was here that I spoke about being fair to my community and this is how I have now, Legislator Solages. Here it is. Ten years later. My daughter has left kindergarten, has gotten married, and we are still fighting the same thing. So don't dismiss a constituent when they come here because the decisions that you make -- Rose Walker was there. I don't know if you remember me. I begged for a fair map.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Ms. Johnson,

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it's three minutes. It's double that.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Hold on, you gave a young lady extra time. You took away 54 seconds of mine. So please allow me to allow me to finish.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: You're well beyond that. I just asking you to please sum up the rules apply to one; they apply to all.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: And you don't do that for all.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: All right, then. It you don't want to finish, they we're moving on.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Listen. What I'm saying to you is, your constituents, whether you are directly my representative or not, you should listen to the people. Because when you don't listen to the people, sooner or later it affects you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Thank you, Ms. Johnson.

I really appreciate it's about the process and the process must be fair and we must have notes as to how these maps look like before they were approved of so the public has a full contribution in this process. But thank you for being here and I appreciate your comments.

MS. PIERRE-JOHNSON: Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Okay. Ms.

Mereday.

MS. MEREDAY: Before my clock starts, I want to ask the question with regard to the information that was in Newsday about the change or the correction for the tax assessment rolls that was supposed to be addressed today. There's no documents to support that. Again, for the public to have that information. So I don't know if that's going to an emergency issue. It was in Newsday this week about an error that County Executive Blakeman acknowledged, and it was said that that

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was going to be something on the agenda for today.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: It will be on the agenda. We're going to have Committee Meetings and then the Full Legislature. Yes.

MS. MEREDAY: Well, would there be a copy available for the public? Those of us that are here, those of us who come regularly to try to monitor what's going on, I'm not just showing up or coming out of the shadow because of millions of dollars that folks may think are going into their community, which probably will not. At least it won't go into my community because we haven't seen it yet.

The redistricting process, we already know it's going to court. So I'm not going to waste too much time for that. You know, when you're in violation of both State and Federal law, it becomes clear. The divisiveness on the Committee is clear. It's evidenced, it's streamed, it's there.

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I'm here with regard to my issues with the budget, not to mention the lack

of qualified funding for the temporary

aid in needy families. New York State is

among those and the trickle down that

comes into Nassau County, it's still not

going with the Temporary Aid Needy

Families (TANF). It's on record,

research: Less than 30% in New York

State goes to the actual families, the

needy families who are aware of that. So

we may look at what's happening in

Mississippi and the tragedy with the

water issue in Jackson, Mississippi, and

how connected people like Brett Favre are

able to get monies diverted for their

personal interests. New York State is not

that far away with regard to that lack

and that disparity in that inequitable

distribution.

For those who wanted to know about a facility, it's always interesting when folks want to come and say, we need more facilities, we need more this, we need

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more that. But then when it comes time for having it in their neighborhood, it's a NIMBY issue. We have a facility, county run Nassau University Medical Center, plenty of empty space that could be utilized for a variety of services. had a methadone clinic there. They probably still do. I have a strong background from a family connection with regard to those who are in social work, those who were alcoholism treatment counselors. So I'm aware of that.

We also have a veteran services. They're hard working. Before somebody says, I'm knocking what they're doing, they don't have enough resources, staff or support to do all the work that they need to do for our returning veterans and their families who are struggling. When we run around at parades and say we've got close to 50,000 veterans, and if we count Suffolk County, we got close to 100,000 veterans, one of the largest veteran contingents in the Northeast, but

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we have a Veteran Services Agency that is still underserved and underfunded.

We've got a PAC bill that was just passed. I brought it to this Body six months ago to give the opportunity to say, let's get those funds. There are now scammers that are out there trying to reach out to our veterans who have suffered for decades with the burn pit. Did this Legislative Body step up and do anything, offer \$0.10 to address that issue, to provide those resources? No.

We have police officers who are still looking for their resources in a contract. I had to sit here for a couple of hours and wax poetically on this side with regard to bail reform, but I didn't hear anybody talking about the gun issue that's still rampant in this state. Let's address that.

Crossing guards. I don't know what happened to the crossing guard in Legislator Deriggi-Whitton's area, but if we want to talk about how we can support

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the crossing guards, give them some benefits. You can keep it at the \$25, but give them some benefits. They used to have it, Legislator Ferretti, just so you know about that (buzzer).

But again, we need to upgrade our resources in general. Let's stop leaving Nassau University Medical Center as the partisan pit that it has been for decades. We can address many of the issues. Fund Nassau Community College with the programs and services so that we can provide more proactive resources for our veterans, our communities and other residents and we can move towards being the type of county that all of us can feel represented in. Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Thank you. Jerry Kornbluth from Nassau Community College.

MR. KORNBLUTH: Good afternoon, everyone. I'm here today representing Nassau Community College and Interim President Maria Conzatti thanking you for

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your support of the Adjunct Faculty Association contract.

The adjuncts play an important role at Nassau Community College and we value everything they do. And more importantly, we want to thank you for your support and commitment to Nassau Community College.

We provide to the residents in Nassau County a strong educational experience, as well as giving students a an education that is low cost. And we provide many opportunities so that they can get out there, graduate, get a job, and be part of the economic fabric of Nassau County. So, again, we want to thank you for all your support.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Thank you, Jerry.

MR. GROSS: Yes, sir. Just wanted to extend the appreciation of the Board of Trustees of the college, similar to what Jerry indicated, and to remind the Legislature that this contract is fully

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funded with college funds. There's no funds that come out of the County. So we go back to Item 1, which is Ordinance 64. This is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriation ordinance in connection with the Department of Human Services. Motion by Deputy Presiding Officer Kopel, seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams.

This is the item with respect to the opioid settlement funds. Anyone here from the administration to speak on this?

MS. NEVIN: Good afternoon. I'm Jill Nevin, commissioner of the Department of Human Services. Today, we are asking for you to approve the appropriation of the

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opioid settlement funds.

The breakdown of how we plan on using it over four years; it's \$60 million over four years:

- It's going to be \$2 million a year to NUMC for the expansion of the detox program.
- There is going to be \$12 and a half million for a Request For Expressions of Interest that covers the four areas legislated: Prevention, treatment, recovery and supports.
- \$60,000 per year for five community based organizations that I want to note all have dual licensors. I know our group here today had a concern about covering the mental health aspect along with the substance use.
- \$180,000 per year for Mercy Hospital.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Do we have any questions from the Legislators? Legislator Mule.

> LEGISLATGOR MULE: Thank you,

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Presiding Officer. Ms. Nevin, I have a couple of questions. I understand that that an RFEI is going out, and that's based on what responses you receive, that's how things will be determined as to who gets the money; is that correct?

MS. NEVIN: Correct. It's similar as an RFP process. Okay.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: And can you tell us how that's being advertised so that it gets beyond our normal --

MS. NEVIN: Sure. It was announced on Friday, September 23rd. It was posted in the Newsday announcement section. It's on the Nassau County bid board. We reached out to our contacts and community providers to let them know an announcements been made. We've also been in touch with the President of the Council of Superintendents so that all the school districts are made aware and they could collaborate with community providers or themselves, respond to it.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Thank you. And

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then who will make the decisions about who gets the money?

MS. NEVIN: There's going to be a Selection Committee formed. Just like a usual county RFP process, there will be a Selection Committee.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: All right. And are there criteria already set for how those decisions are going to be made?

MS. NEVIN: Not just yet. We're in the process of working on that.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: And will clinical decisions be included in that process so that it's being made based on what are proven treatment programs?

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Yeah, we'll have individuals and most of the programs in there are evidence-based. So there is a science to it, it's not just going to be randomly decided.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Okay. And then once the awards are made, I'm wondering what safeguards are being put into place to make sure that the money that's

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awarded actually goes toward an expansion of services. Because what I want to know is -- let's just use NUMC for an example. They're getting \$2 million to, as you said, to expand their treatment program. What safeguards is the County putting into place to make sure that NUMC doesn't just then take \$2 million out of

its current treatment program and put it

elsewhere?

MS. NEVIN: I have assigned actually somebody from my office as the oversight person specifically for these opioid funds. It's going to be the program liaison that's going to be treated just like our current program liaisons do for our current contracts. But he's going to be specifically tasked with overseeing any money spent on the opioid funds and to make sure that everybody's working within the committed boundaries.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: So will there be regular reporting from the agencies?

MS. NEVIN: Yes.

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LEGISLATGOR MULE: And are there rules set in place so that what I just described to you cannot happen?

MS. NEVIN: Yeah. We will come up with within the contracts, things will be contracted out. We will have a specific set of rules on how reporting is going to take place and very specifically spell out how the moneys are going to be used.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Okay. So I'm requesting that you very specifically put into place in the contracts that they cannot take money that is currently in their program and transfer it elsewhere because they might have shortfalls in other places and that this is additional money.

MS. NEVIN: Absolutely. Absolutely. I agree.

LEGISLATGOR MULE: Thank you.

LEGISLATOR NICOLLELO: Legislator Ford.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Good afternoon.

Sorry. So far with since you've issued

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the RFI, have you received numerous responses?

MS. NEVIN: Responses aren't due until November 21st, but we have received Letters of Intent. The Letter of Intent due date was October 10th. It's not a mandate. It's not required, but it's just a courtesy. And so far we have 18 Letters of Intent that have been submitted.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Who would actually comprise the committee that would select the recipients and award the monetary amounts? I mean, I don't need names, but I just --

MS. NEVIN: We're looking for people with a background in behavioral health, whether that be substance use, mental health.

LEGISLATOR FORD: All right. Also, the agencies, if they didn't send in a Letter of Intent, they still have an opportunity because you have up until November 21st?

MS. NEVIN: Absolutely. The Letter

of Intent was not required. It was just asked as a courtesy.

LEGISLATOR FORD: And I know that you've advertised it. Have you reached a lot of the population? Because I know that some people weren't aware of it.

MS. NEVIN: Yeah. Well, like I said to Legislator Mule, we did our standard Newsday announcement. We have it on the bid board. We reached out to our contacts within mental health chemical dependency. We also collaborated with the President of the Council of Nassau County Superintendents to make sure that the school districts are informed that something's out there and encourage them to go look at it.

LEGISLATOR FORD: All right. But I understand, though, because the school districts are not necessarily eligible for the funding they would have to partner with --

MS. NEVIN: They could. They could respond. You know, I don't know if they

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have the resources to respond, we encourage them that they could collaborate with a community provider or they could very well respond on their own.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I received something from Dr. Wilansky that said that they would have to go with an agency.

MS. NEVIN: The RFEI, for the school aspect of it speaks about collaborating with a community provider. The community provider have the resources built within to be able to implement such programs in the schools.

LEGISLATOR FORD: All right. So I'm going to make sure that my school districts -- because I have the link if I need to have it again, maybe you could send it.

MS. NEVIN: Absolutely, just reach out.
