AN ORDINANCE MAKING CERTAIN DETERMINATIONS PURSUANT TO THE STATE ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW ACT AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU TO EXECUTE AN INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT (THE “IMA”) BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AND THE VILLAGE OF FREEPORT AUTHORIZING THE TRANSFER OF COW MEADOW PARK AND PRESERVE (“COW MEADOW”) IN THE VILLAGE OF FREEPORT, TOWN OF HEMPSTEAD, COUNTY OF NASSAU, NEW YORK

WHEREAS, Nassau County (the “County”) acquired Cow Meadow by two condemnations: Index No. 3138/64, title vested 4/17/64 (Acquired were Lots 4, 5, 117) and (previously 119), Block G, Section 62); and Index No. 6507/64, title vested 7/13/64 (Acquired was Lot 109, Block G, Section 62);

WHEREAS, Cow Meadow is currently used as a county park, providing such activities as a ball field, basketball and tennis courts, multi-use fields, a children’s activity center, a boat and kayak launch area, nature walks and picnic areas. Cow Meadow contains marine wetlands, including a salt marsh, mud flat and tidal creek habitats. Cow Meadow is home to more than 150 varieties of birds and more than a dozen mammal species;

WHEREAS, Cow Meadow is being transferred (the “Transfer”) to the Village of Freeport (the “Village”). The Village will maintain Cow Meadow as a public park and/or recreation area with County residents being provided the same use status as Village residents. The transfer will enable the consolidation of services, improving efficiency, creating new recreational opportunities for county and village residents. The County and Village believe this transfer is in the best interest of the taxpayers of their respective municipalities.

WHEREAS, the Village intends to improve Cow Meadow through capital improvements, such as installing additional ballfields and rehabilitating the marina, thereby offering additional recreational opportunities for County and Village residents;

WHEREAS, the New York State legislation, Chapter Bill 463 of 2021, authorizing the transfer of Cow Meadow to the Village was signed by the Governor on October 8, 2021: and

WHEREAS, the proposed action, the approval of by the IMA between the County and the Village, is Type I action with a negative declaration pursuant to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”), as recommended by the Nassau County Planning Commission to the Nassau County Legislature as lead agency and as such will have no significant environmental impact and does not require further environmental review.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the County Executive be and is hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the County of Nassau, the Intermunicipal Agreement between the County of Nassau, and the Village of Freeport, transferring title of Cow Meadow to the Village, and to execute any ancillary documents and instruments necessary to effectuate the Transfer.

SECTION 2. That it is hereby determined pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. Section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that the proposed Transfer does not have a significant effect on the environment and no further review is required.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, the County of Nassau (the “County”) did heretofore acquire title to this property; and

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Charter §105 provides that no real property of the County shall be alienated except by ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Legislature finds that there is a need for affordable and mixed-income housing; and

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Legislature further finds that the provision of affordable and mixed-income housing constitutes a valid public purpose and is a proper exercise of local police power; and

WHEREAS, MHANY PREEPORT LLC has requested that the County of Nassau convey to it the aforesaid parcel and has made an offer of One Million Six hundred Thousand (\$1,600,000.00) Dollars, pursuant to a certain Contract of Sale (the “Contract”) by and between the County of Nassau and MHANYFREEPORT, LLC, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Clerk of the Nassau Cou8nty Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the Contract requires that the Purchaser provide affordable housing pursuant to the Contract; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 1611 of the Nassau County Charter and acting in am advisory capacity to the Nassau county Legislature, the Nassau County Planning Commission has reviewed the proposed action and recommended that it be classified as an “Unlisted Action” pursuant to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) and has further reviewed the Environmental Assessment Form (“EAF”) for the proposed action and recommends that the Nassau County Legislature upon its review of the EAF and any supporting documentation, if any, determine that the evidence before it indicates that the proposed action will have no significant environmental impact and does not require further environmental review; and

WHEREAS, the Nassau County Planning Commission, acting in an advisory capacity to the Nassau County Legislature, passed a resolution regarding the proposed action, a copy of such resolution being attached hereto as Appendix A and incorporated herein, recommending that the Nassau County Legislature conclude that no further environmental review or action is required on such proposed action.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDANED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the County Executive be and she is hereby authorized to accept the offer of purchase of MHANY FREEPORT, LLC in the sum of One Million Six Hundred Thousand (\$1,600,000.00) Dollars for said premises described as Section 55, Block 348, Lots 65, 74, 75 & 107 and Section 55, Block 349, Lots 224-226 on the Land and Tax Map of the County of Nassau subject to all of the terms and conditions as outlined in the contract of sale.

(collectively, “the Allergan Defendants”) pursuant to the County Law, the County Government Law of Nassau County, and the Nassau County Administrative Code; and

WHEREAS, the said recommendation is that the County Legislature adopt a resolution declaring that an emergency exists in Nassau County the nature of which is to take immediate action upon the aforesaid resolution; now, therefore be it

RESOLUTION NO. 215-K- 2021

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ACTING COUNTY ATTORNEY TO COMPROMISE AND SETTLE THE CLAIMS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AGAINST ALLERGAN FINANCE, LLC (F/K/A ACTAVIS, INC., WHICH, IN TURN, WAS F/K/A WATSON PHARMACEUTICALS, INC.), ALLERGAN LIMITED (F/K/A ALLERGAN PLC, WHICH, IN TURN, WAS F/K/A ACTAVIS PLC) AND ABBVIE INC. (COLLECTIVELY, “THE ALLERGAN DEFENDANTS”) PURSUANT TO THE COUNTY LAW, THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY, AND THE NASSAU COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE.

WHEREAS, the County of Nassau filed an action captioned *County of Nassau v. Purdue Pharma L.P., et al.*, Index No. 605477/2017 (Sup. Ct. Nassau Cty.) against various opioid manufacturers and distributors, including, but not limited to Allergan Finance, LLC, Allergan Limited, and AbbVie Inc. (collectively, “the Allergan Defendants”), in an effort to hold them responsible for their role in creating the opioid epidemic; and

WHEREAS, the action subsequently was transferred to Suffolk County and coordinated with other actions commenced by governmental entities in the coordinated New York opioid litigation captioned *In Re Opioid Litigation*, Index No. 400000/2017 (Sup. Ct., Suffolk Cty.); and

WHEREAS, the County of Nassau, the County of Suffolk and the State of New York (“Plaintiffs”) have reached a settlement agreement with the Allergan Defendants whereby the Allergan Defendants agreed to make payments totaling \$200,000,000 to the Plaintiffs, including two separate payments to Nassau County (\$2,646,000.00, with no deduction for attorneys’ fees or costs, and \$27,142,857.14 which is subject to deduction of costs and expenses, common benefit assessment, and attorneys’ fees (25%)) in full settlement of all claims that Plaintiffs have brought or could have brought against the Allergan Defendants in the aforementioned actions; and

WHEREAS, the Acting Nassau County Attorney has caused an investigation and analysis to be made of the claims and as a result thereof recommends that the claims be settled in accordance with the terms of the aforementioned settlement agreement; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Acting Nassau County Attorney be and is hereby authorized and directed to settle the claims in accordance with the settlement agreement as indicated above; and be it further

RESOLVED, that it is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. Section 0101 *et seq.* and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau

County, that this settlement is a “Type II” Action within the meaning of Section 617.5(c)(26) of 6 N.Y.C.R.R. and, accordingly, is of a class of actions which do not have a significant effect on the environment; and no further review is required.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 103-2021 passed by the County Legislature fixes the tax rates and levies the taxes for the 12-month fiscal year of 2022; and

WHEREAS, the substance of Ordinance No. 103-2021 needs to be updated and, as such, requires a new ordinance amending it; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 195-B-2021, adopted by this Nassau County Legislature on September 27, 2021, there have been included in the proceedings of the said Legislature, statements of the total assessed valuations of the properties situated in the County, the three towns, two cities and special districts within the County of Nassau for the 2022 fiscal year for County; County Fire Prevention, Safety, Communication and Education Fund; County Police Headquarters Fund; County Police District Fund; Nassau Community College Fund; County Environmental Bond Fund; Nassau County Sewer and Storm Water Resources District Fund; County Disputed Assessment Fund; Town; Part Town; Town Highway; Town Special District; and other lawful purposes, and the town budgets of the Towns of Hempstead, North

Hempstead and Oyster Bay for the year 2022 including the lists of Special Districts as contained therein and the amounts certified by the Town Board of each of the said towns to be raised and levied for Town General Fund, Town General Fund-Part Town, Town Highway, Town Special District and other lawful purposes, and the amounts of unpaid water charges in arrears in the respective water districts and Town Sidewalk and Curb assessments to be levied against certain properties in the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, and Oyster Bay will be caused to be printed in the proceedings of the Nassau County Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature has, by Chapter 383 of the Laws of 2002, as amended, authorized the Nassau County Legislature to provide for abatement from increases in the County general property tax rate for eligible senior citizens and the tax rate as set forth herein is calculated in consideration of such abatement; and

WHEREAS, Appropriation Ordinance No. 102-2021 for the fiscal year 2022 has been adopted by the Nassau County Legislature for the conduct of the County Government of Nassau County for the 2022 fiscal year, and such Appropriation Ordinance constitutes the Appropriation Ordinance for the 2022 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 302 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County is required to adopt a budget for a twelve-month fiscal year commencing on January 1, 2022, and terminating on December 31, 2022, and to levy taxes in accordance with said 2022 fiscal year budget and year, and to cause real property taxes to be assessed, collected and paid in order to fund County governmental operations for said 2022 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the County accordingly is required to adopt an ordinance for the levy of taxes in accordance with Appropriation Ordinance No. 102-2021; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 306 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, the County Legislature of the County of Nassau is required to levy County, Town and Special District taxes for the ensuing year and the Legislature is also required to levy the unpaid water charges in arrears which have been filed by the Town Boards of the respective towns; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 12-4.1 of the Nassau County Administrative Code, the Nassau County Legislature is required to levy the unpaid town sidewalk and curb assessments and other lawful town charges; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1262 of the Tax Law of the State of New York, the Nassau County Legislature is required to allocate revenues from certain sales taxes imposed within the County of Nassau, outside of the City of Long Beach, and for purposes of ascertaining

the full valuations of the properties in the area of the County outside the said City of Long Beach so as to make such allocation, may determine the equalization rates to be applicable in such areas; and

WHEREAS, Article 18 of the Real Property Tax Law of the State of New York requires that property must be assigned to one of four classes for the purpose of taxation. The four classes are as follows:

Class One - One-, two- and three-family homes and such other property as included in the definition of class one set forth in subdivision one of section 1802 of the Real Property Tax Law.

Class Two- All other residential properties, such as apartments, co-ops, and condominiums, but not hotels, inns and motels.

Class Three - Public utility properties.

Class Four - All other property not defined in classes one through three.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU THAT ORDINANCE NO. 103-2021 IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

The Clerk of the Town of Oyster Bay, having indicated that it will be filing with the Nassau County Legislature a copy of the Town Budget of the Town of Oyster Bay for the year 2022 adopted by the Town Board of said Town on October 26, 2021, (the original of which is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Town of Oyster Bay) and the amount specified therein having been appropriated by the Town Board to be raised by tax for Town purposes for the year 2022, this Nassau County Legislature does hereby finally fix and determine that the sum of \$59,180,496.14 shall be raised and levied on the properties situated within the Town of Oyster Bay for Town purposes for the year 2022, and that the tax rate on properties within the Town of Oyster Bay for Town purposes for the year 2022, and that the tax rate on properties within the said Town of Oyster Bay for the year 2022 for Town purposes is hereby fixed and determined to be Class One \$113.339, Class Two \$20.103, Class Three \$28.673, Class Four \$17.817 on each \$100 of assessed valuation of properties.

§ 14. The assessed valuations of the Special Districts in the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead, and Oyster Bay for the year 2022 having been included in the proceedings of the Nassau County Legislature, together with the lists of such Special Districts necessary for the payment of expenses during the year 2022 of each of the Special Districts and the amounts of money necessary therefore having been appropriated by the Town Boards for such purposes, the said sums so appropriated by the Town Boards are hereby determined to be raised and levied on the properties in the Town situated within each of said Special Districts is hereby finally fixed and determined to be the tax rate set opposite each respective amount so appropriated and more particularly shown on the following lists of Special Districts for the Towns of Hempstead, North Hempstead and Oyster Bay:

§ 25. Taxes and assessments are hereby levied and shall be collected for the purposes for which the aforesaid appropriations have been made and which this Legislature has ordained shall be raised and levied, and that all of said taxes and assessments be collected from the several persons and upon the properties named and described in the assessment roll on file in the Office of the Assessor for the County of Nassau, and the County Executive, or in her absence or inability to act, the Presiding Officer of the Legislature, and the Clerk of this Legislature are hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the County of Nassau consolidated tax warrants addressed to the Receivers of Taxes of the several towns and cities within the County of Nassau, to wit: the Town of Hempstead, Town of North Hempstead, Town

4 MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum

6 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We have a
7 couple of items on the main calendar and an
8 addendum. Since we have an addendum, we need
9 a motion to suspend the rules. Moved by
10 Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded by
11 Legislator Schaefer. All in favor of
12 suspending the rules signify by saying aye.
13 Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

14 We have three items. They are
15 contracts. I will call them all together and
16 then we will vote on them all together unless
17 they need to be separated.

18 B-29 is a resolution authorizing
19 the county executive to execute a contract
20 amendment between the county and Posillico
21 Civil, Inc.

22 E-188 is a resolution authorizing
23 the county executive to execute a personal
24 services agreement between the county and
25 Vincentlette Law Firm.

1 Rules - 12-13-21

2 And A-66 of 2021, a resolution
3 authorizing the director of Nassau County
4 Office of Purchasing to award and execute a
5 contract between the county and Thimgan and
6 Associates.

7 Those items are moved by Minority
8 Leader Abrahams. Seconded by Deputy Presiding
9 Officer Kopel.

10 First contract is a public works
11 contract and it's B-29.

12 MS. HODAK: Jane Hodak, Nassau
13 County Department of Public Works. This is an
14 amendment to an emergency contract with
15 Posillico. Posillico did emergency work for
16 the county immediately after Hurricane Sandy.
17 The contract is being amended so that they may
18 be fully compensated for the costs of
19 performing those services. And what the
20 amendment does is it allows for the payment of
21 sales tax that they incurred on consumable
22 items.

23 Normally when a contractor,
24 normally when we do contract work a contractor
25 submits a bid. With that bid they estimate

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2 the unit of consumable items that they will
3 need. Garbage bags, rags absorbent pads,
4 disinfectant and things like that and that's
5 included in the bid. Because this was an
6 emergency contract in which it was done
7 totally on T and M, time and materials, the
8 bid was not prepared.

9 So now we are amending the contract
10 to include the sales tax because that --
11 normally that's not something that would come
12 before the comptroller in a voucher for
13 payment because it's included in the bid and
14 sales tax on material that's incorporated into
15 the construction is excluded and we use forms
16 that we pass on to vendors to do that.

17 This is basically -- the purpose of
18 the contract was to, of course, pay them in
19 full for all of the services and work that
20 they provided. This will allow for a
21 clarification to make it clear that they
22 should be paid for the sales tax on those
23 consumable items of which, given the nature of
24 the work they were doing, was considerable.

25 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any

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2 questions? Legislator Rhoads.

3 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Super Storm
4 Sandy was in 2012. So we're talking about
5 nine years ago?

6 MS. HODAK: Right.

7 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Why now?

8 MS. HODAK: Because we were
9 trying to work it out with the comptroller and
10 with the vendor for a period of time. Then,
11 quite honestly, I think it may have been
12 missed by some individuals to be addressed.
13 But we would like to, of course, compensate
14 the vendor for the outlay of money for the
15 purpose of performing the contract work.

16 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: What's the
17 dollar amount that we're talking about? Since
18 we must know what the finite amount is.

19 MS. HODAK: It's about \$30,000.

20 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Thank you.

21 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
22 Schaefer.

23 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Hi. Quick
24 question. Do you know exactly where the work
25 was done? Was it throughout Nassau County?

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2 Certain sites?

3 MS. HODAK: No, no. It was at
4 the Bay Park plant. It was at the flooded
5 facility.

6 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Just
7 there?

8 MS. HODAK: Yes.

9 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
10 questions? Thank you Jane. Before you leave
11 Jane.

12 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Sorry about
13 that. If the county had purchased the
14 materials itself isn't the county exempt from
15 sales tax?

16 MS. HODAK: The county is exempt
17 for materials that -- you mean like the rags
18 and the things like that? Like if we
19 purchased rags and things?

20 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Right.

21 MS. HODAK: I don't really know
22 but the vendor itself is not excluded from
23 sales tax when it utilizes those types of
24 materials in the performance of its work. So,
25 that's an amount of money that they expend and

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2 normally include in their bid price here.

3 We're just trying to correct this contract so
4 it follows the normal course of compensation
5 to the vendors.

6 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Okay. Thank
7 you.

8 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone
9 else?

10 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Can
11 I ask a question?

12 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Yes.

13 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Is
14 there any outstanding contracts from this
15 time?

16 MS. HODAK: There's still a lot
17 of remedial work ongoing at the Bay Park
18 facility. So, in general, this was emergency
19 work done immediately after the impacts of the
20 storm to remedy the plant. But there's still
21 a lot of remedial work ongoing at the facility
22 right now.

23 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: But
24 is there -- this was nine years ago. Do we
25 know if there's any contracts in this state

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2 that we're still like pending from years ago?

3 MS. HODAK: I'm having a little
4 trouble hearing you.

5 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: Are
6 we aware of any other contracts that are in
7 this situation that are still pending?

8 MS. HODAK: No.

9 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Delia, do
10 you have any other questions?

11 LEGISLATOR DERIGGI-WHITTON: No.
12 Thank you.

13 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
14 questions? Thanks again Jane.

15 Next contract is with the county
16 attorney's office. Item 188 2021 with the
17 Vincelette law firm.

18 MS. LOCURTO: Good afternoon.
19 Lisa LoCurto from the county attorney's
20 office. This is a special counsel contract to
21 retain counsel to assist the county attorney's
22 office in trying a tax certiorari matter. If
23 there are any questions.

24 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
25 questions?

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2 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Why do you
3 need special counsel for this?

4 MS. LOCURTO: This is a high
5 value property that has a subject sale. It's
6 a complicated trial and we wanted to use the
7 assistance of special counsel whose tried
8 similar cases in upstate New York with this
9 large mass of land that's vacant and is very
10 difficult to value.

11 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: The county
12 attorney's office does not have people with
13 the requisite experience and knowledge?

14 MS. LOCURTO: There was a
15 decision to have counsel with extensive
16 experience who had tried a similar case like
17 this.

18 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Lisa, but that
19 didn't really answer the question. I asked
20 the county attorney doesn't have anyone
21 in-house who can --

22 MS. LOCURTO: We wanted special
23 counsel with a specialized knowledge of tax
24 certiorari proceedings and who would be best
25 able to represent the county at trial.

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2 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I think
3 his question was what was it about this case
4 that required someone to go outside the
5 office? What specifically about this?

6 MS. LOCURTO: This is a very high
7 profile property. It's unusual to have 97
8 acres that are undeveloped. It does have a
9 massive estate on it. However, there is very
10 little vacant land in Nassau County. So, the
11 question is, do you value it in its use and
12 condition? That's going to be the key, main
13 issue that's going to be at trial and it is
14 going to impose a very difficult legal
15 question for valuation before a supreme court
16 judge.

17 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
18 questions? Legislator Drucker.

19 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you
20 Presiding Officer.

21 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Actually,
22 I'll let you ask but you're not on the
23 committee.

24 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I'm
25 subbing.

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2 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: You are?

3 Okay.

4 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Are there
5 cases involving undeveloped vacant land with a
6 structure on it that the county attorney does
7 in fact try before the supreme court? Like
8 where do you draw the line?

9 MS. LOCURTO: This is a very
10 unique property.

11 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: What makes
12 it unique?

13 MS. LOCURTO: It's unusual to
14 have basically a mansion with 97 acres of
15 undeveloped land. It's very unusual. 95
16 percent of property in Nassau County has some
17 type of improvement on it. There's very few
18 acreage or vacant land. Any of those with
19 large vacant land are either parks or
20 tax-exempt because they're part of tax exempt
21 entities such as the hospital or the jail
22 facility or county government buildings. So
23 this is an extremely unique type property.

24 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: But surely
25 the legal arguments to be made in a case like

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2 this are not novel. You have experienced,
3 qualified attorneys who try tax certiorari
4 cases all the time. If it involves 97 acres
5 or ten acres does it change the legal
6 arguments that need to be made?

7 MS. LOCURTO: The strategy was to
8 pick a counsel that they believe will be best
9 able to defend the assessor's market value
10 placed on the property.

11 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: So you're
12 stating for the record that there's not one
13 attorney in the county attorney's office that
14 has the skill or the competence to handle a
15 case like this?

16 MS. LOCURTO: I'm not saying that
17 at all legislator and I think that would be
18 very unfair to say to not only the tax
19 certiorari attorneys that practice in that
20 area and also the other attorneys in our
21 office. There was a determination to make a
22 trial strategy to put in a counsel that has
23 tried this in other counties with similar
24 issues for unique type property.

25 You can disagree with the trial

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2 strategy, that's fine, but we in the county
3 attorney's office made the decision to pick
4 this particular counsel to make the best
5 argument and to defend the assessment.
6 There's a potential here for a very large
7 refund and it is incumbent upon us to do
8 everything in our power to make sure that the
9 taxpayers are best represented.

10 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: And I'm
11 looking to save taxpayers as much money as we
12 can too. I'm just wondering how that decision
13 is made, your strategy, how do you arrive at
14 that particular strategy?

15 MS. LOCURTO: It was in
16 consultation with the acting assessor, the
17 Assessment Review Commission. Because this
18 spans over -- it goes back to the '12-13 tax
19 year so we have over 11 tax years at issue and
20 it is very difficult to value a property over
21 that given span of time.

22 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Is there
23 something you want to add?

24 MS. LOCURTO: No. I don't think
25 we should discuss more of our litigation trial

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2 strategy in open session. The purpose of this
3 contract, the purpose of my being here is to
4 seek approval for special counsel. If you
5 want to discuss the legal strategy or the
6 competency of the staff that's something
7 different. I would go into executive session
8 if we're going to discuss further the county's
9 legal strategy as to how we're going to defend
10 this case then we should go into executive
11 session.

12 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: You're
13 distorting my words. I'm not looking to
14 discuss the strategy at all. I'm looking to
15 find out the --

16 MS. LOCURTO: Legislator, I'm
17 trying to answer your question but I didn't
18 make that decision.

19 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I understand
20 that. I'm looking to find out how that
21 decision was made not the trial strategy.

22 MS. LOCURTO: The decision was in
23 consultation, I'll repeat myself, we discussed
24 with the county assessor, with the head of the
25 Assessment Review Commission and legal counsel

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2 to determine what it was the best suited
3 counsel to proceed to put together an
4 effective defense. That's how the decision
5 was made.

6 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: So you're
7 not going to answer the question. Thank you.

8 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Is there a
9 panel that we use for tax cert cases?

10 MS. LOCURTO: There is an
11 established panel in the county attorney's
12 office for special counsel. There are few
13 firms that are deemed qualified to handle tax
14 certiorari. As you know, it's a very
15 specialized area of law. And there are few
16 firms that would not pose a conflict of
17 interest. So that's why this firm was
18 selected.

19 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: But it is
20 anticipated that occasionally the county would
21 have to go outside the office to hire a firm
22 to defend the county in a case?

23 MS. LOCURTO: Yes.

24 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
25 Rhoads.

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2 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Ms. LoCurto,
3 would it be fair to say that because of the
4 complexity of the action there may be
5 attorneys in the county attorney's tax
6 certiorari department that are qualified to
7 handle the case but because of the complexity
8 of the case that would be the only case that
9 the would be able to handle? Is one of the
10 strategies going to outside counsel the fact
11 that the number of staff you have and the
12 resources that you have and the fact that
13 that's all they would be able to work on to
14 the detriment of the remaining cases in the
15 portfolio?

16 MS. LOCURTO: Yes.

17 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
18 questions? Thank you Lisa.

19 The last contract before us is with
20 Information Technology and Assessment I
21 guess. A-66 with Thimgan and Associates.

22 MR. JACOVINA: Good afternoon.
23 Joe Jacovina, Deputy Commissioner Information
24 and Technology. A-66, 2021 Thimgan and
25 Associates for Department of Assessment.

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2 This is a renewal contract for
3 three years for the Prognose software
4 providing annual support and maintenance for
5 the residential property value assessment
6 software. This includes modeling training and
7 a mentorship program in assessment.

8 We are asking for approval for
9 \$550,000 for the first year of this contract.
10 This is a sole source contract. I will be
11 happy to answer any questions.

12 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: I understand
13 this has a standard cancellation for
14 convenience clause, right?

15 MR. JACOVINA: I believe it does.

16 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: How is this
17 fee paid? Is it paid as one lump sum
18 annually?

19 MR. JACOVINA: No. It's paid
20 \$550,000 a year for the three-year period.

21 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: That means
22 annually?

23 MR. JACOVINA: Yes, annually.
24 And then there's another 550,000 a year.

25 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: But it's paid

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2 at one shot?

3 MR. JACOVINA: No. We do not pay
4 it in one shot.

5 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: I'm sorry.
6 Each year you pay 550 in one shot or is it a
7 monthly thing or something like that?

8 MR. JACOVINA: We believe it's
9 quarterly.

10 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: If need be, if
11 the new administration say decided to go ahead
12 and cut that off is it cancelable during the
13 year or is this a full year commitment?

14 MR. JACOVINA: That I'm not aware
15 of.

16 MR. MILES: If I recall, the
17 prior contract was opt in by years. I don't
18 think it's something that you can cancel after
19 a quarter. But we'd have to talk to the
20 county attorney's office.

21 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Okay.

22 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: When does
23 the current license or contract expire? Is
24 that at the end of this year?

25 MR. MILES: It just ended I

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2 believe in November.

3 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: And we're
4 told that this software is vital to the
5 operations of the Department of Assessment?

6 MR. MILES: Correct.

7 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Can you
8 briefly go into that for us?

9 MR. MILES: Absolutely. Prognose
10 is a unique software wherein you can input
11 models. So, for example, if there's six or
12 seven models in the county you can input the
13 data into Prognose and it will produce reports
14 for you on a neighborhood or school district
15 scale. We also use it for production of
16 comparable market analyses for SCARs. So, for
17 this past year I believe there were 13,000
18 SCARs that were taken to hearings and we
19 used -- Prognose produced the CMAs to defend
20 the county's value.

21 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
22 questions? Legislator Schaefer.

23 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Quick
24 question. Mr. Miles, if the roll is frozen
25 then are we using Prognose? Do we not need

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2 Prognose? What's the purpose?

3 MR. MILES: I think you should
4 still use Prognose one, especially for SCAR.
5 No matter the status of the roll, whether it's
6 paused or a trended roll or reassessment roll,
7 you still need this program to produce
8 comparable market analyses for court.

9 In terms of a valuation tool, I
10 think no matter what, whether you're paused or
11 you're in a valuation year it's good to know
12 where you are as a status in the county and
13 it's a program that you can use to analyze the
14 circumstances. So, I think it's a tool that
15 would be valuable to the new administration.

16 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: But we
17 wouldn't be adding to it or anything, would
18 we? Say the roll is going to remain frozen
19 for the next year are we are adding anything
20 to it or are we not?

21 MR. MILES: To the program?

22 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Yes. Are
23 we not necessarily updating anything?

24 MR. MILES: You could input
25 data. It will produce values. So, whether

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2 it's of use to the new administration or not
3 it's up to them. But I think it's a good
4 analytical tool to have to see where we're
5 at. And you can utilize the data internally
6 from Adapt and connect it to this software to
7 gauge where your neighborhoods are trending up
8 and down. There's still volatility I would
9 say with the neighborhoods where we are now.
10 But I think it's definitely a useful tool for
11 the new administration to see going forward
12 how Omicron affects the market and if this is
13 the new reality because the market is very
14 high right now or whether it settles down. No
15 matter what the situation is I think it's a
16 valuable tool.

17 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: One more
18 question. What if we don't renew it? What
19 happens to the information? Is it not
20 usable? What happens to the program?

21 MR. MILES: From a valuation
22 standpoint we'd have to create a new program.
23 I don't know where we would be at. I think in
24 terms of SCAR I think we would be scrambling
25 to find a new program to produce comparable

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2 market analyses, and I think you would put the
3 county in a tough position to defend the roll
4 and it could put us in a situation of high
5 refund liability.

6 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Are you
7 typically -- sorry another question --
8 typically utilizing information for SCAR year
9 round?

10 MR. MILES: Yes. Yearly basis.
11 We usually try to use comparable sales closest
12 to the taxable status date. We usually
13 bookend the years. You can use prior to the
14 taxable status date or post the taxable status
15 date but you try to get around that tax year.

16 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: But if it
17 wasn't renewed we just wouldn't be able to new
18 information in? Would we be able to retain
19 what we have there?

20 MR. MILES: We have the data
21 in-house, the sales data, but the way that it
22 produces the analyses we wouldn't be able to
23 replicate it to the extent that this program
24 produces.

25 LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Okay.

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2 Thank you.

3 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
4 Rhoads.

5 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Just one last
6 question. I appreciate your answers so far.
7 I guess the reluctance is with an incoming
8 administration you would like to give them the
9 opportunity to be able to evaluate what's
10 going to work best for their strategy and
11 locking them into a one year, what sounds like
12 at least a one year term and a three-year
13 contract. What happens if we were to delay
14 this a month to give the incoming
15 administration the opportunity to be able to
16 conduct that evaluation?

17 MR. MILES: You know, because of
18 SCAR being close to done I'm not sure if there
19 would really be an impact in terms of SCAR.
20 It would be nice for the new administration to
21 have the ability to look at the program right
22 when they begin to see if they want to start
23 a -- if they want to do a reassessment or a
24 trend. It's up to the new administration.
25 You could delay it. I think it would be

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2 better not to but, you know.

3 LEGISLATOR RHOADS: Thank you.

4 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: You did
5 say that the license or contract had expired,
6 the current contract, right?

7 MR. MILES: Yes. We did produce
8 the CMAs for the end of the month because
9 there are cases calendared to the end of the
10 month. But, you know, you do lose the support
11 then if you want to make changes to the market
12 analysis in the program. So that's something
13 to consider. We are at the tail end of the
14 calendar. That's something to consider in
15 terms of liability. But, you know, I highly
16 recommend the program to the new
17 administration. But it is something that can
18 be delayed but I highly recommend to move
19 forward with the program.

20 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: If we
21 don't vote on it now by the time we go
22 through -- we're looking at the middle of
23 January. You're looking at an entire month.

24 MR. MILES: That's right.

25 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Does that

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2 create a problem?

3 MR. MILES: Not in terms of
4 SCAR. In terms of begin processing for trends
5 or values I think every month is very
6 valuable. The way that the calendar works,
7 when you do valuations you really want to
8 start as soon as those sales come in and, you
9 know, when you do reassessment you like to
10 have your numbers done or a trend or something
11 like that in the fall. So every month you
12 lose I think it's important. I think it's
13 valuable to have every month that you can
14 because of the size of the county. Like I
15 said before, it's incomparable the number of
16 parcels. So, it's tough to start on a good
17 foot if you push this back too long I think.

18 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: A couple
19 of more questions. It was told to us it could
20 be cancelled for convenience. But now there's
21 some sort of representation it would probably
22 be not feasible for an entire year.

23 MR. MILES: Please don't quote me
24 on that. We would have to talk to the county
25 attorney about that. I know the substance. I

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2 know the program. I don't know the details of
3 the contract itself in terms of the options.

4 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: So, the
5 new roll of the Department of Assessment
6 freezing or is it doing trending,
7 reassessment, do you know yet?

8 MR. MILES: Currently we are on
9 pace to pause due to the volatility of the
10 market. But we, you know, do have a contract
11 with Standard Valuations Services and they did
12 provide trends, commercial and residential.
13 That's not to say they can't be inputted. I
14 think that's probably a question for the
15 transition what they want to do. I'd probably
16 recommend closing the year on a pause and
17 probably starting a new just based on the
18 situation right now. But again, that's for
19 the policymakers.

20 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Does
21 Standard Valuations use Prognose?

22 MR. MILES: They use Thimgan
23 Associates as a subcontractor and he would use
24 this program.

25 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: That's

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2 different. Any other questions? All right.
3 Did I have a motion to second on that? I did
4 at the beginning, right. Any public comment
5 on those contracts?

6 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday. I
7 work my way backwards I guess. The most
8 recent one with regard to hearing that it was
9 a sole source contract, I'm just curious as to
10 how that contract was generated? And also, I
11 continue to not hear that any of the vendors
12 that are brought before this body, this
13 county, have any representation as a minority
14 women or veteran-owned business. Again, if
15 we're talking about diversity, inclusion and
16 most importantly equity, since we are in the
17 top five of taxpayers, and I'm sure that
18 creators and entrepreneurs of color who are
19 veterans and also disabled who live and work
20 in this county would like the opportunity to
21 at least access a contract maybe within county
22 government but I've yet to hear that reference
23 mentioned in that.

24 Also, I was concerned about that
25 there was a previous contract for the

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2 payment. I say we have to render those costs
3 from Superstorm Sandy then we have to render
4 those costs. Unfortunately, there was a lot
5 of waste, misappropriation that was a part of
6 the funding and the resource distribution from
7 Superstorm Sandy. So, my concern continues to
8 be the lack of let's just say accountability
9 with regard to the contracts that was
10 administered by the county for that process.
11 And I can only hope that we can do a better
12 job when we get federal funds. I'm not asking
13 for another super storm or natural disaster.
14 But in light of that, I'm hoping that we have
15 learned some lessons as it pertains to
16 contracting opportunities and being more
17 inclusive, diverse and equitable. But I
18 really am concerned again about the sole
19 source process and the delay as far as getting
20 information for contracts that relate to
21 Sandy.

22 And my last question as it pertains
23 to that Bay Park project, it was mentioned
24 that there were other remedial activities
25 going on. I'm hoping that there isn't going

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2 to be a situation where we have double billing
3 because we have the conversion process that is
4 taking place starting at Bay Park going to
5 Cedar Creek. So, a lot of the activities
6 relating to preparing the facility for that
7 will require resource outlay. So, I'm hoping
8 that we're not paying two different
9 contractors for similar work that's involved
10 in that particular project as well as that
11 facility. Thank you.

12 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
13 very much. Any other public comment? If not,
14 I'll call for a vote on these three contracts,
15 B-29, E-188 and A-67. All in favor signify by
16 saying aye. Those opposed? They carry
17 unanimously.

18 Motion to recess by Legislator
19 Drucker, who's new to the committee. Seconded
20 by Legislator Rhoads. All in favor of
21 recessing signify by saying aye. Those
22 opposed? Rules is recessed.

23 (Committee recessed at 3:16 p.m.)

12 service to the people of Nassau as a judge.
13 So, thank you Vinnie.

14 We have been joined by some special
15 guests, friends of yours, who were here at the
16 very beginning including, and I will ask them
17 to come up to speak if they choose to do so,
18 our newly elected county executive Bruce
19 Blakeman. I want to mention my brother there,
20 Roger Corbin, who was one of the originals.
21 John Canny and Judge Darlene Harris. Bruce
22 the floor is yours.

23 MR. BLAKEMAN: Mr. Presiding
24 Officer, members of the legislature, thank you
25 for giving me an opportunity to be with you

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2 today to talk with about my good friend Vinnie
3 Muscarella. And I certainly want to wish
4 Legislator Birnbaum the best of this coming
5 future.

6 I was just with County Executive
7 Laura Curran at the funeral of police officer
8 Nunez, and I can tell you that our police
9 department did a magnificent job and we
10 honored him and his service to our great
11 county and he will always be in our memories.

12 There are some people here today
13 that it's good to see Darlene, your Honor,
14 John Canny and Roger Corbin from the original
15 legislature. And I guess Rich you're the last
16 of the Mohicans. You're the last one standing
17 here.

18 It's great to be here and also to
19 remember those that came before us. Certainly
20 my deputy and my dear friend Peter Schmidt.
21 Judy Jacobs, who was the majority leader, who
22 served with me, who was a great person.
23 Barbara Johnson, a great advocate for her
24 district. And Ed Oppenheimer. They're not
25 with us here anymore but they have left their

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2 mark on this great institution, this
3 legislature.

4 I can tell you this, we were
5 probably not as good as you guys are because
6 you're a lot more sophisticated and smarter
7 than we were, but I can tell you we had a lot
8 more fun in the beginning days of the
9 legislature because we had no act to follow.
10 We kind of made it up as we went along.

11 But let me say this about Vinnie
12 Muscarella. Vinnie has always been a great
13 public servant. He really represented his
14 district in a way that they always had someone
15 here at the legislature that would fight for
16 them.

13 I want to say to each and every one
14 of you in the legislature I really look
15 forward to working with you going forward. I
16 think we can do some really amazing things

19 healthy and prosperous new year to each and
20 every one of you and God bless you all and God
21 bless America. Thank you.

22 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
23 Bruce. Did any of the other originals want to
24 say a few words or no? No obligation. You
25 going to give us a tune John?

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2 MR. CANNY: It's the most
3 wonderful time of the year.

4 Mr. Presiding Officer Nicoletto,
5 thank you so much. Thank you to the
6 legislature for this opportunity to be here
7 today. This is my first appearance in the
8 Nassau County legislature in this millennium.
9 I did appear here in the year of 1003 I should
10 say so it's great to be back here many years
11 later. No, I was here in 1999. It's
12 wonderful to be here today and to talk about
13 Vincent Muscarella.

14 I have a great fondness for the
15 Muscarella family. Paul Muscarella and I went
16 to law school together. May he rest in
17 peace. We became very good friends. I like
18 working with Joe, of course, in the Town of
19 Oyster Bay. Your wonderful family. Very fond
20 of your late mother who was such a special
21 lady. And then we all benefitted from your
22 presence in the inaugural legislature. The
23 wisdom that you brought and the deliberateness
24 that you brought to governmental proceedings
25 and to the deliberations of this legislature

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2 and we have all been enriched by your
3 presence.

4 I think it was Pericles who said
5 that Athens was an education to Greece, and I
6 think that Vincent Muscarella has been an
7 education to the Nassau County Legislature.
8 Congratulations and great success to you on
9 the bench, and I know that you will serve the
10 judiciary and the people of Nassau County in

12 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I believe
13 that's the last time someone quoted Pericles
14 was probably John Canny.

15 MR. CORBIN: Well, it feels kind
16 of funny from this vantage point, but Vinnie,
17 you and I have been good friends from the time
18 I have been here. I remember he invited me to
19 one of his civic association meetings in West
20 Hempstead. And I say to all the legislators
21 go into everybody's district. I remember when
22 I was invited to a temple in Massapequa. The
23 place was filled. They gave me a big standing
24 ovation. I came back to this building and I
25 said to Peter, you better watch out, I may run

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2 against you. He said I'll have your picture
3 on every milk container. I said all right.

4 But Vinnie, it's been a pleasure.
5 You and Richie and Bruce and Darlene and John
6 Cannon we really did a good job. That's what
7 this was all about. I was the only charter
8 member to run for this position and I knew
9 exactly what was in the charter. I know
10 what's in the charter today. I would suggest
11 to all of you read it. It's not boring. Read
12 it. We put a lot of time. We went around the
13 county and we put a lot of time in it.

14 We know that when it comes down to
15 being a legislator we know that it's not easy
16 because you're going to get people pulling at
17 you. You'll get parties pulling at you. You
18 got to do what's right and what's right is
19 Vinnie Muscarella was right. I miss the four
20 that we lost. Barbara Johnson, Judy Jacobs,
21 my man John Ciotti and of course Peter
22 Schmidt. Now we lost four of the originals
23 and it's good to know each other.

24 Go into each other districts. Find
25 out what people are talking about. And that's

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2 what I did. And I was glad that I did it
3 because I was able to meet many of you and get
4 close to you.

5 So, Vinnie, I hope I don't see you
6 in front of the bench. If I do we're going
7 out to lunch. But I think you're going to be
8 a good justice and you're going to be fair.
9 You're fair as a legislator. Doesn't make any
10 difference which party you're in. You're not
11 afraid of nothing.

12 I remember when John Ciotti
13 represented Elmont and I took him to a Baptist
14 church in Elmont, Dr. David Parker, and he had
15 a health meeting and I spoke to the people and
16 they were very receptive to John. I say to
17 you guys do the same thing. Go to each
18 other's district. Find out what the people
19 are saying. Don't stay pigeonholed in your
20 district and deal with just that. Because
21 this is a county. You represent this county.
22 This county has a lot of problems.

23 And I wanted to tell Bruce, you
24 know, when I sat there the first eight months
25 and Richard, you and Vinnie know, I didn't

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2 vote for one tax certiorari. And they looked
3 at me and said are you crazy? I remember
4 Bruce got real mad. I wish he was here to
5 hear this. He got real mad. And he told his
6 caucus vote with Roger. It was something like
7 \$1.2 million tax cert and it was out of
8 Westbury.

9 So, he said vote with him. I voted
10 against it and they did too. So me and Bruce
11 Nyman we looked at each other and said he
12 ain't one of me, he ain't never gave me a
13 penny. Good. He got a phone call right after
14 the meeting and the next meeting it was on and
15 it passed.

16 But I'm just telling you, go in
17 each other's district. Don't be afraid. Go
18 in each other's district. Listen to what
19 people are saying because you represent the
20 whole county and Vinnie represented his
21 district very well. Richard and Denise, all
22 you guys represent your district extremely
23 well and keep representing the district.

24 I don't miss it because -- yeah, I
25 do. Because I got a honey-do list that I got

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2 to deal with every day. Honey do this, honey
3 do that. I said I wish I was back to work.

4 The point is enjoy your time here.
5 It's not going to be forever. But just enjoy
6 your time and do the right thing.

7 Vinnie, congratulations. I wish
8 you well and we will move on. And Richard,
9 I'm looking forward to coming here to say
10 good-bye to my brother because this is not
11 easy. People think, the public thinks this is
12 easy. It's not easy. You got to do a lot of
13 reading. And we did a lot of things here to
14 begin with. Like Bruce Nyman said, when we
15 were building this chamber we were hassling on
16 who was going to sit where and how we were
17 going to sit. We didn't care but we got it
18 going.

19 I say to all of you just keep doing
20 the right thing. It's not going to be an easy
21 task. You're going to have to work with this
22 new county executive. You worked with the
23 last one. She was very good. And then we go
24 from there. We know that this legislature is
25 going to do a great job for the residents of

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2 Nassau County. And we'll go from there.

3 Thank you.

4 Vinnie, thank you for being my
5 friend and thank you and your family and your
6 late mother and your brother, thank you guys.
7 You guys really made me what I am today and I
8 wish you all the best. Like I said, I don't
9 want to see you in front of your bench. I
10 want to see you in a restaurant. Thank you so
11 much Vinnie and best of luck.

12 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
13 Roger.

14 MS. HARRIS: Thank you
15 Mr. Presiding Officer and members of the
16 legislature for having us here today and
17 giving us this opportunity. I'm a woman of
18 very few, short words but I'm so very happy to
19 be here to honor my former colleague, Vincent
20 Muscarella.

21 We served two terms together and it
22 was indeed a pleasure. And I looked to you
23 for guidance because you had that wisdom from
24 being on the assembly and you were always
25 there to help me and to guide very willingly

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2 and I appreciated that. And I know that
3 you're going to be a great asset to the
4 district court, and I congratulate you and
5 wish you the best of luck.

6 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Minority
7 Leader Abrahams.

8 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you
9 Presiding Officer. I wish I could be there in
10 person to see -- I never had the opportunity
11 to meet John Canny but to be able to see Roger
12 and Darlene and Bruce and all of you and
13 obviously wish our good friend Vinnie
14 Muscarella well. I do want to say something
15 about Legislator Birnbaum, but I just wanted
16 to take this opportunity to say something to
17 Vinnie.

18 Vinnie and I have been very good
19 friends. In many cases when the chaos begins
20 we're able to look at each other and have a
21 rational look or a few comments to each other
22 to be able to say it really should be a
23 rational approach and look beyond the
24 politics. Vinnie I'm sorry I never was able
25 to do fantasy baseball with you. We had that

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2 kind of friendship and that kind of inviting
3 thing to the two of us and I'm sorry to see
4 him go.

5 As it's been mentioned, I know he's
6 one of the original 19. Which I guess that
7 just leaves Rich you the last one to be
8 there. But over the years, hearing from Roger
9 and hearing from Darlene and John and Bruce it
10 just goes to show you how things continue to
11 evolve. I just want to continue to express my
12 gratitude to my colleagues and I want to thank
13 Vinnie Muscarella for his service. He's truly
14 a good person, a good family man. I think
15 from that standpoint looking beyond all the
16 politics and looking beyond the Democrats and
17 Republicans and everything else, I think
18 Vinnie put his constituents first. Him now
19 serving in the capacity or soon to be serving
20 in the capacity as a judge he will serve the
21 constituents of Nassau in a different capacity
22 but just as well if not better.

23 Vinnie all the best to you. I wish
24 you nothing but success. Happy holidays,
25 Merry Christmas, Happy new year. God bless

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2 Vinnie.

3 I do want to take this opportunity
4 to thank one of my colleagues in Ellen
5 Birnbaum. Some of you may not have had the
6 pleasure to meet Ellen. She served in the
7 capacity of the legislature probably I would
8 say way after some of the folks that spoke
9 that served in the legislature. But Ellen, I
10 can tell you is probably one of my most
11 detailed oriented legislators. And Roger
12 talked a little bit about how you have to read
13 everything. There's nothing that gets past
14 Ellen Birnbaum. She reads absolutely
15 everything.

16 At times we would be looking at our
17 backups and the backup would be hundreds and
18 hundreds if not a thousand pages of paper and
19 she would be able to recite something on page
20 57, paragraph two, sentence three and what a
21 contract or what a particular legislation
22 said. You don't get that level of dedication
23 of service every single day. I'm sure there
24 are some of us on this partisan legislative
25 body that don't read through everything as per

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2 Legislator Birnbaum. I'm really truly sad to
3 see her go.

4 Because what makes our jobs easier,
5 and I'm sure Rich or even Bruce to some degree
6 and other folks that have served in the
7 capacity of a leader in our caucus, our
8 legislature, what makes our jobs easier is to
9 have informed legislators. And I feel I have
10 that and obviously with Ellen Birnbaum leaving
11 we lose that for one. But I think truly it's
12 going to give her an opportunity with
13 grandchildren here and family I think it's
14 going to give her a new focus. I don't
15 believe she's going to leave the public
16 service. She's going to continue to serve her
17 community. But Ellen has been a truly
18 tremendous asset in a very short time in
19 comparison to Vinnie. She has served as a
20 truly tremendous asset for our body and our
21 legislature and we are better because of Ellen
22 Birnbaum serving in the legislature.

23 So I want to continue to wish her
24 nothing but success as she moves on to her
25 next transition. God bless you Ellen and your

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2 family. Thank you again for your service.

3 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Would any
4 other legislators like to be heard?

5 LEGISLATOR FORD: I've had the
6 pleasure of working with Vinnie Muscarella now
7 for 18 years which I can't believe. Actually,
8 I think, Vinnie, in almost all the time that
9 I've served we always sat next to one another
10 because we were side by side when I first
11 started. When we were in West Street. Roger
12 was on the upper level. We were the lower
13 level legislators. You remember that.

14 And I have to say that yes, what
15 everybody has said about Vinnie. He's an
16 absolutely brilliant individual. Somebody who
17 is very kind and very understanding.
18 Especially for me. When I first got elected
19 and I was ready to tackle the world and I was
20 going to change everything and like just
21 really had a lot of passion in me and you
22 realize that not everything should be said out
23 in public.

24 So, Vinnie said very quietly and
25 very kindly, instead of correcting me or

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2 telling me not to do something in front of our
3 caucus, would always pull me aside and say to
4 me let me explain something to you and he'd
5 tell me if I went out and said this what would
6 be the outcome. He had me think everything
7 through. We were talking about this the other
8 day.

9 I think in that sense he taught me
10 a lot and he also helped me for making a
11 complete fool of myself up on the dais and in
12 public. But I will always be indebted to you
13 for your friendship, your kindness and the
14 understanding that you showed towards me
15 especially when I came in. It was a lively
16 group of legislators on both sides of the
17 aisle.

18 I benefitted from him and Rich
19 actually. They were both steady individuals.
20 And I used to tease Judy Jacobs. We'd go out
21 for lunch and I'd say to her, you know, Judy,
22 I always feel whenever your caucus door opens
23 up it's almost like that cartoon from Bugs
24 Bunny where everybody's in this one big cloud
25 and they're all like fighting and she'd say

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2 yes, she had very, very passionate legislators
3 that worked with her. Roger you were one of
4 them. But it was a lot of fun. It was very,
5 very wonderful times over at West Street.

6 Here we are here in the new
7 headquarters. Vinnie, I'm going to really
8 miss you. I just think you're so well
9 deserved in becoming a judge and I think
10 you'll make a great jurist, and I think
11 there's a lot ahead for you and I thank you
12 for all your years of service.

13 Ellen, I would be remiss not to --
14 I know that you've been here for what six
15 years now? Eight years. See how times fly.
16 Well, we lost a year or two with the
17 pandemic. It's always been a pleasure working
18 with you. And I do have to say that Ellen has
19 one of the nicest fathers that anybody could
20 meet. He is one of my constituents. A true
21 gentleman and always spoke highly of his
22 daughter. And having had this opportunity to
23 work with you and get to go know you I have to
24 wholeheartedly agree with him. I wish you
25 well in whatever you decide to do after this.

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2 Thank you very much for your years of service.

3 LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Well, with all
4 the speakers here I feel like a newbie. I've
5 only been here 12 years. But I just want to
6 very briefly echo some of the things that have
7 been said and that is especially the fact that
8 when I started out 12 years ago I too was
9 ready to conquer the world. And Vinnie's a
10 very calm person. Very laid back. But
11 understands what's going on. Understands the
12 politics and understands more importantly
13 understands people. That was especially
14 valuable. Especially when I started and that
15 hasn't stopped. I'm going to miss that
16 counsel, that wise counsel and the friendship
17 that I've tremendously enjoyed.

18 Ellen, also, you've been a lady. A
19 pleasure to work with. Calling someone a lady
20 is one of my highest compliments. I
21 appreciate having had the opportunity to work
22 with you. Don't be a stranger. Hopefully we
23 will be seeing you around and congratulations
24 for both of you for moving on to bigger and
25 better things hopefully.

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2 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Anyone
3 else want to say anything? Carrie Solages and
4 Legislator Drucker.

5 LEGISLATOR SOLAGES: Good
6 afternoon to everyone. I would like to first
7 thank my colleague Mr. Muscarella for his
8 service. I want to thank you and your
9 family. In fact, you and your family provided
10 inspiration to myself and my family in terms
11 of getting involved in government. Sometimes
12 it takes a family to change the world. I
13 appreciate you and what you've done for
14 Elmont. Thank you again for all of your
15 service. I appreciate you.

16 And of course to my lovely
17 colleague, my neighbor who I will miss, Ellen
18 Birnbaum. As our leader said, she's an
19 incredibly conscientious, detailed person,
20 legislator. She's very active in her
21 community. Truly a great person. I'll miss
22 also discussing fashion with her. One of the
23 best dressed legislators.

24 But furthermore, her value is not
25 superficial. She is truly a caring person. I

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2 enjoyed speaking with her husband, who's also
3 a lawyer. Now I'm going to be sitting next to
4 another lawyer. Can't stop talking. But
5 again, thank you for all of your service.

6 I also would like to say hello to
7 Honorable Judge Harris, who used to be my boss
8 when I was an intern here at the legislature
9 many years ago. Nice to see you.

10 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you
11 Presiding Officer. First, I would like to
12 congratulate Vinnie. I'm going into my sixth
13 year and in all of my time here Vinnie I've
14 always recognized as someone who had true
15 integrity and honesty. We would talk and
16 there were some times there were some issues
17 and we would discuss them almost like I guess
18 fellow lawyers and we'd try to get down to the
19 nitty-gritty of the issue without the
20 politics. I always felt I could talk to
21 Vinnie about that.

22 I've gotten to know Vinnie but I
23 know Vinnie's family really well because his
24 brother Joe and I are very close friends for
25 probably more than 35 years and through Joe

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2 I've gotten to know the whole family. It's a
3 great family. Your public service, your whole
4 family is dedicated to public service. It's
5 really an exemplary family. I'm honored to
6 have known you. I want to thank you also for
7 your service to this legislature and to the
8 communities you represent. I wish you the
9 best of luck as a lawyer. I couldn't think of
10 someone more evenly balanced with integrity
11 and honesty to serve on the bench than you.
12 It would be an honor and a privilege if I
13 would have to go before you and I think many
14 lawyers would feel the same way. I wish you
15 the best of luck on the bench.

16 To my right I am sad to see my
17 friend Ellen Birnbaum go. I have to tell you
18 my first year on this legislature she was
19 invaluable to me because I didn't know what
20 the heck I was doing. But I would reach over
21 to her and she would tell things and give me
22 little tidbits of information and it was
23 invaluable. I'm truly indebted to her. And
24 then through that we developed a friendship.

25 She comes from a great family. She

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2 has a great family. We'd swap photos all the
3 time about our respective families. And what
4 Kevan said about her dedication and her
5 thoroughness in preparing for every session is
6 true. She's been an asset to this legislature
7 and certainly a tremendous asset to our
8 caucus. I'm going to miss her but I wish her
9 the best of luck Ellen.

10 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any other
11 legislators? So, we did get Vinnie a couple
12 of parting gifts.

13 We have another distinguished
14 member of the county family who is retiring at
15 the end of this year as well and it's someone
16 who has served this county and been actually
17 the liaison with this legislature to the
18 health department in many ways. And we are
19 very, very sad to see her leave but appreciate
20 her many, many years of service to the county,
21 to its residents and that's Mary Ellen Laurain
22 who's leaving the health department this
23 coming December 31st. I would like to invite
24 Commissioner Eisenstein to come up and say a
25 few words.

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2 On the way up, I have to tell you I
3 went for my booster shot that you helped me
4 set up the appointment for which the
5 Department of Health, Nassau's Department of
6 Health ran at Nassau Community College.
7 Incredibly well run. Organized. You got
8 right in. Gathered all the information and
9 you were out within 20 minutes or so. But
10 just my compliments on an extraordinary
11 professionally, efficient, well-run
12 operation.

13 DR. EISENSTEIN: Thank you
14 Mr. Presiding Officer and members of the
15 legislature. Great to see you all again. I'm
16 glad you had a great experience. I have an
17 excellent team. It makes the job so much
18 better and easier and everything always looks
19 like it's going perfectly well. That's
20 because my team, including Mary Ellen Laurain,
21 are so strong.

22 Mary Ellen started at the county 32
23 years ago as a public health educator and over
24 the years has picked up role after role
25 especially in the last 15 years as many people

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2 retired and the job responsibilities changed
3 with the rise of social media, Mary Ellen just
4 whatever assignment came up and we needed a
5 professional that would step in, always agreed
6 to take on the job. Never complained about
7 it. She didn't start as a legislative
8 representative. That's one of the jobs she
9 took on. That's a time-consuming, difficult
10 job in the limelight. You have to be ready
11 for questions which are fair and reasonable.
12 The public and legislators deserve that.

13 Mary Ellen has been also our press
14 officer. It's not easy to be the press
15 officer at the health department. Whenever
16 there's a rumor of some health scare or
17 crisis, it could be midnight at Saturday the
18 press is asking her. When there's a
19 thunderstorm on a summer weekend and she has
20 to put out a press release to close a beach
21 because the beach might not be safe that press
22 release can't wait until Monday morning. So
23 Mary Ellen's job, between doing the press and
24 being our liaison to the legislature,
25 preparing our contracts, there's so much that

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2 she does.

3 That's how the health department is
4 so successful. People like Mary Ellen doing
5 the work. But she is one of my closest
6 executive staff advisors. In 2006 Mary Ellen
7 authored one of our national model practice
8 awards, which we're still very grateful for.

9 And I'm a firm believer that
10 everybody is replaceable. Me, anybody. We're
11 all replaceable. But some people are harder
12 to replace than others. And it is not going
13 to be easy to replace Mary Ellen. In fact,
14 we're going to have three people doing the
15 different jobs that Mary Ellen does and that's
16 how important she was to the health
17 department.

18 Mary Ellen's been a good friend, a
19 consummate professional. Every time I see one
20 of you and her name pops up I hear how
21 wonderful she is, and I fully agree with
22 that. And I'm going to miss Mary Ellen as a
23 friend and she's been a great representative
24 and it's tough shoes to fill. So thank you
25 and Mary Ellen thank you.

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2 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Mary Ellen,
3 on behalf of the legislature I just want to
4 thank you for all you have done being here at
5 all of our meetings, taking phone calls,
6 substituting for Dr. Eisenstein when he
7 couldn't be there, especially during COVID
8 times when we had our conference calls, for
9 the so many jobs as Dr. Eisenstein explained
10 that you do. That you really worked 24-7 and
11 we cannot thank you enough for that.

12 Many, obviously us on the
13 legislature, we know our job is kind of 24-7
14 also. But many jobs are kind of a nine to
15 five Monday through Friday. But your's was
16 not like that. When we had questions about
17 the beaches or we had questions about a
18 restaurant or questions about anything you
19 were always there to answer those questions
20 for us. Coming before the leg every leg
21 meeting that isn't always easy either because
22 so many times you were put on the spot but you
23 were always prepared. You always treated us
24 with utmost kindness. Certainly took care of
25 our residents with that same attitude and

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2 demeanor continuously. So, we just thank you
3 so much for that.

4 We will miss you, as Dr. Eisenstein
5 said, some people's shoes are easier to fill
6 but yours will be very hard to fill. To know
7 that three people need to be hired to replace
8 what you do says a lot for what you do. I
9 think for me and for many of us I will truly
10 miss your friendship. I can call you for
11 anything. Just not related to county but
12 other questions that might come up you were
13 always there. I will miss you terribly and I
14 know that's how the rest of us feel.

15 We do have a citation for you
16 signed by every one of the legislators here
17 and we would like to present this to you and
18 also flowers.

19 MS. LAURAIN: Thank you Presiding
20 Officer Nicoletto, Health Chair Walker and the
21 entire legislature. I'm actually very nervous
22 before you right now. I don't know why. I've
23 been doing this for a while. I was born in
24 Nassau County in Legislator Rhoads' district.
25 I was even born at Meadowbrook Hospital. So

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2 it was meant to be. An honor and a privilege
3 to have served Nassau County 32 years all at
4 the health department. I wanted to go into
5 public health at a very young age. I'm not
6 completely going away because I did sign up
7 for the medical reserve corp as a volunteer.
8 So I'm still volunteering at the health
9 department. Thank you.

10 LEGISLATOR WALKER: If you could
11 come up here and join us for a photo and Dr.
12 Eisenstein you're welcome to join us also.

13 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Actually,
14 I just want to thank you as well. This is
15 your last meeting and I'm sure I speak for all
16 of us. You were the very best photographer we
17 had. You have a way of putting people at
18 ease, making people laugh and giving out
19 commands that we had to obey. Which we did.
20 So thank you also Mariela for your service.

21 Legislator Birnbaum would you like
22 to say a few words?

23 LEGISLATOR BIRNBAUM: Thank you
24 Presiding Officer. I just wanted to be brief
25 and say that's it's really been my pleasure

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2 and the honor of a lifetime to have served the
3 county of Nassau, all the residents in the
4 county, my constituents in District 10. I
5 leave proudly. I'm very happy with what we
6 have accomplished over the last eight years.
7 I know there's a lot more work to do. I'm
8 leaving it in good hands and I will miss
9 working with all of you. Thank you so much.

10 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Legislator
11 Muscarella.

12 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Oh boy.
13 First, Rich, you win. Or if you're thinking
14 any other way maybe you don't.

15 Over the last 26 years it's been my
16 privilege to serve the residents of the Eighth
17 Legislative District as well as the residents
18 of Nassau County. I want to thank all of my
19 colleagues. Those who came before me and
20 those who will come after me to dedicate their
21 lives to public service. To all of the
22 residents in the county, this is a great
23 county. Let's never forget that. Let's stick
24 together. We have a lot of work to do and
25 we've done a lot of work.

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2 For me personally over the years,
3 for the 26 years, I think I've been most proud
4 of a couple of bills that we managed to
5 sponsor. One was the first smoking ordinance
6 in the county. And the other was moving the
7 Nassau County Medical Center to a public
8 benefits corp. in order to allow it to
9 continue to serve its public mission of
10 servicing those who perhaps couldn't take care
11 of themselves and couldn't afford other health
12 care.

13 I've learned a lot sitting up here
14 during what sometimes are overly long meetings
15 and that is one of the benefits of being
16 brief. There are those who believe that
17 because I am a quiet person that perhaps I
18 live by the adage that's been attributed to
19 sometimes Mark Twain, sometimes Abraham
20 Lincoln, that it is better to remain silent
21 and be thought of as fool than to speak and
22 remove all doubt.

23 But I say to you that I've tried to
24 understand and live by the following. That we
25 learn more by listening and acting than by

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2 talking. And perhaps that's my message to all
3 the servants in government. That we should
4 listen a little more and maybe talk a little
5 less.

6 I want to extend to all of those
7 staff members who have been behind the scenes
8 sometimes. The clerks, the legislative aids,
9 the financial people. Thank you so much. You
10 make all of us look good. For the counsels,
11 Ed and Chuck and Peter and Chris, you've
12 managed to keep us going in the right
13 direction.

14 You know, it's been said that I
15 come from a family that's been long involved
16 in politics and government service and that's
17 true. And my dad always taught us that public
18 service was a noble and honorable profession
19 and I've always tried to live up to that.

20 I want to leave you with the words
21 of a philosopher, sometimes poet but perhaps
22 the greatest boxer that ever lived. He said
23 the following. Service is the rent you pay
24 for your room here on earth and I believe
25 that. Going forward this legislature has a

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2 great future. I want to congratulate you.
3 God bless you all. God bless this county and
4 God bless America.

5 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: It's very,
6 very nice even though you're quitting after
7 only 26 years. We're also losing another
8 member of the Nassau County family who's going
9 to be retiring this year who, again, many of
10 us have relied upon here at the legislature
11 for helping our constituents moving along
12 projects and generally just doing the best we
13 can for our constituents. I also want to
14 congratulate Brian Schneider, who is our
15 deputy county executive for public works and
16 spent many, many years in the public works
17 department. Thank you Brian for your
18 service. I don't know if you also wanted to
19 say a few words.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Thank you
21 Presiding Officer. I promise I'll be brief.
22 I promise also I'm not going to sing.

23 So, yes, I can confirm that I'm
24 going to be retiring at the end of the year.
25 I wanted to go on record to thank all my

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2 colleagues and my coworkers not only in DPW
3 and parks but all those across the numerous
4 departments in the county that I have worked
5 with over my 33 and a half years. Many of
6 them are still sitting here from those first
7 days of the county legislature and even the
8 Board of Supervisors meetings.

9 I'm turning the page on this
10 chapter of my career and I'm not really sure
11 where my path will lead. But I'm hopeful to
12 remain involved in the important initiatives
13 related to water resources and environment in
14 Nassau County which has been a passion of
15 mine.

16 I also obviously wanted to thank
17 the members of this legislature, their staffs,
18 especially the Majority and Minority counsels
19 who I worked with closely over the years. And
20 also thanks to the clerk of the legislature
21 and his staff for their valued assistance to
22 myself and also the departments that I
23 represented over the years.

24 I strive to be professional,
25 respectful and informed in my dealings with

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2 this body and hopefully that has showed. And
3 I wish you all nothing but good health and
4 success going forward. And thank you again
5 for the opportunity to serve not only as the
6 deputy county executive for the last four
7 years but all across my career as a member of
8 the Department of Public Works. Thank you
9 all.

10 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: There are
11 many, many projects in this county that have
12 been completed and will be completed in the
13 next few years that owe their completion to
14 the guidance of Brian and I think ultimately
15 when he looks at his body of work I think you
16 can be very proud of things that you
17 accomplished here for the county and the
18 county's accomplished. Thank you.

19 Let's move on to the public comment
20 portion of our meeting and we have two slips
21 in right now. One is for, appropriately
22 enough, Neil Lewis from the Sustainable
23 Institute at Molloy and also a member of the
24 charter revision commission way back when.

25 MR. LEWIS: Good afternoon county

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2 legislature. Neil Lewis. I'm with the Molloy
3 College Sustainability Institute. I feel a
4 little at a lost to have this opportunity to
5 stand in front of the legislature and speak
6 it's been so long.

7 It's a good thing. You may, if you
8 have a great memory, you may recall I was here
9 two years ago. It was also the last meeting
10 of the year. We were working on getting the
11 Open C PACE, Commercial Pace financing program
12 approved in Nassau County. And I had come
13 back to you about it a couple of times. So it
14 was a little bit embarrassing because the bill
15 had to be redone and it's was all redone at
16 the last minute and the presiding officer and
17 his team did a deep dive and they were very
18 satisfied by all the facts. And even though
19 we were late, you guys waived the emergency
20 rule and fortunately got it in.

21 So the program kicked in but you
22 kind of can't talk about something until the
23 first project actually gets approved. I'm
24 here today -- of course there was a long delay
25 with everything because of the pandemic. But

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2 as we end the year 2021 we do now see posted
3 on the website the first two projects in
4 Nassau County.

5 Very quickly, let me back up about
6 what this is, the C PACE program, and I don't
7 have the specifics, so I can't tell you which
8 legislative district the two projects are in.
9 I just know they're in Nassau County. And I
10 would expect we would know the rest in about
11 two weeks or so.

12 It appears normally what they do is
13 the financing institution puts out a press
14 release that will say the name of the company
15 that actually got the financing. But right
16 now we just know that it's two projects. One
17 for \$1.5 million and one for \$985,000. These
18 are two significant development projects
19 generating revenue in the county of Nassau
20 that would not be possible but for the program
21 that this legislature unanimously approved a
22 couple of years ago. I wanted to put that on
23 the record.

24 I have a handout that explains all
25 this.

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2 So the idea with C PACE
3 financing -- so PACE stands for Publicly
4 Assessed Clean Energy financing. And it only
5 applies to clean energy projects. And the way
6 that the state legislature did it was they
7 created a not-for-profit which every county
8 that approves it has a seat on the
9 not-for-profit. That entity has to approve
10 the projects to make sure that they're truly
11 projects that are valid from a clean energy
12 perspective.

13 Then what is done is the key is
14 that many businesses can be persuaded to do a
15 clean energy project but they hesitate because
16 there's still a loan involved and businesses
17 don't like taking out new debt onto their
18 record.

19 So this program really treats it
20 more like a sewer improvement at a building.
21 So it's treated like a fee or a tax. That's
22 why it's called assessment. So there's a lien
23 put on the property that basically makes it so
24 that the bank knows that they're definitely
25 going to get paid because the benefit for this

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2 project is going to stay at the building for
3 many years and benefit whoever is running the
4 building.

5 So, this idea, which has been
6 around for a couple of years but it took
7 awhile to sort of get it right, is now very
8 kind of -- they worked out the rough edges and
9 the issue is we just got to let the public
10 know about this.

11 This is a high cost area to do
12 business. We all kind of know that. One of
13 the things is that any business that has an
14 old building can renovate their old building
15 using PACE financing. The PACE financing will
16 cover 100 percent of the cost. There's no
17 out-of-pocket to the business. In fact, the
18 financing can be stretched out. And once
19 again, it doesn't really show on their books
20 as a loan because it's more of an investment
21 in the building than their business.

22 These elements make it very viable
23 for people to invest in their buildings in
24 Nassau County. Of course, that's part of what
25 we're talking about here. Both promoting the

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2 agenda of encouraging solar energy and
3 retrofitting old buildings. But a lot things
4 in life all come back to economics and the
5 idea here is to help businesses to be able to
6 reduce their expenses. But in many respects
7 turning their energy bills into revenue.

8 So, the first two projects are both
9 solar projects. And in many respects, when I
10 get the details and you get the details, I
11 suspect that it will be kind of unremarkable
12 because the point is almost any commercial
13 building that has a good roof can take
14 advantage of placing solar on it and utilizing
15 this funding mechanism to generate revenue
16 essentially on day one.

17 Just to finish on this point, they
18 can stretch out the payments for 20 years.
19 But it may only take about seven years to get
20 to break even. That means essentially they're
21 generating revenue from day one. No
22 out-of-pocket expense. Sort of off their
23 balance sheets. And the bottom line is we
24 want to get these kinds of projects going and
25 we believe this financing can hopefully get

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2 this there.

3 Big part of my message as we look
4 to 2022 is to just encourage efforts to make
5 people better aware that this is program is
6 available in Nassau County. Like I said, I've
7 been trying to say that for a while but until
8 you have the first projects it doesn't feel
9 real. But now we do. Hopefully, and this is
10 something that may be some of the legislators
11 here would like to help get the word out
12 because it is a program that I think you
13 should all be proud of helping to set up here
14 in Nassau County.

15 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
16 Neil.

17 MR. LEWIS: Thank you so much.

18 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Meta
19 Mereday.

20 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday.
21 Since there's only two speakers do I get all
22 of the time at this point? Just thought I'd
23 ask. It's December. It's my month. So I
24 figure if I don't ask.

25 I'm going to put out my wish list

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2 and I think I will try to accommodate I think
3 one of the earlier speakers who wished for
4 shorter meetings. They won't get too
5 commentary from me because again this is birth
6 month. So, as much as I don't mind hanging
7 out with you guys once in awhile this month
8 isn't it.

9 I do want to wish a fond farewell
10 for those legislators who are passing on.
11 Thank you for taking the time to listen to
12 me. As if you had a choice. But I don't get
13 too much time. But I wish you all the best in
14 your future endeavors.

15 In the time that I do have I do
16 want to put out, again, my overall Christmas
17 wish list. At the last meeting one of my
18 wishes was kind of safe and inclusive drivable
19 roads for all residents and taxpayers. But my
20 primary focus here has always has been for
21 true inclusion as far as contracting and
22 support services for our veterans and for
23 communities of color and those who are
24 otherwise disadvantaged. I've yet to see, as
25 we're going into 2022, any real documented

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2 figures out of Nassau County for all the
3 billions that we have in our budget that we
4 are truly being inclusive.

5 I find it inclusive sometimes means
6 that you're doing somebody a favor for work
7 that they have not done. People of color,
8 veterans, minorities, those with disabilities
9 have contributed greatly to this economy and
10 to this country. So they shouldn't have to
11 ask for a percentage for something when they
12 represent a larger percentage and have done a
13 great deal of the work for this county and for
14 this community.

15 But, if that's the way it has to be
16 then someone has to be up here to ask, demand
17 and advocate for it. So, I'm hoping, I'm
18 hopeful, December is a time for hope and a
19 season for peace and calm. So, I'm asking for
20 it in a calm and peaceful type of platform so
21 that we can look at doing this a lot better in
22 2022.

23 We don't even follow the state
24 mandate for at least 30 percent in minority
25 and women business contracting for state and

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2 federal dollars. We can even start there.
3 But I'm hoping that the county would set an
4 example. Let's set an example for a change.
5 Let's not follow behind someone else. Let's
6 not try to run up after there's a lawsuit and
7 then there's a decision that forces you to do
8 what you should do for just the sake of
9 decency as well as for being above board and
10 honorable.

11 So looking at that, let's talk
12 about the contracting. Let's look at support
13 services overall for minority businesses.
14 That's all businesses that are not considered
15 majority business who continue to get very few
16 opportunities and limited resources. I know
17 during this past year or so there was sort of
18 a division so to speak on all four cultural
19 awareness and everyone has their voice,
20 everyone should have their voice. But I think
21 it's important to realize at the end of the
22 day that people of color are still continually
23 underserved in this county. We need to do
24 something about that collectively. Not just
25 the one month that you celebrate anybody's

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2 heritage or culture. They need more, expect
3 more and deserve more than that.

4 Better transportation. Let's talk
5 about that.

6 We have an issue. We have a glut
7 in terms of health resources and those who
8 have health needs in Nassau County. We need
9 to address that. Particularly in an north and
10 southerly situation. So we need to address
11 that again. My wish is that we look at better
12 options for transportation models for us to
13 address that.

14 Lastly, Nassau County University
15 Medical Center. I'm hoping that we can look
16 at it not as a cash cow, not as a place where
17 we can drop our friends and relatives who may
18 lose a job who may lose a job depending on who
19 wins the election. But let's look at how we
20 can reinforce that to become a model,
21 particularly for our veterans. We have a
22 hard-working facility and group over there
23 that services our veterans. But there's a lot
24 of space over there that can be used for
25 housing. That can be used for work. That can

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2 be used for training and support services for
3 our veterans and for our seniors and, again,
4 for people with health needs. Let's address
5 that. Let's do a better job at that.

6 And I agree that we should be able
7 to work better, work more effectively, work
8 more calmly to solve the many problems that we
9 have not only in this country but in this
10 county. I'm pledging, I'm standing here
11 before you to pledge what I can do. But I
12 cannot do it alone. I'm not standing here, I
13 don't come here at the times I can come with
14 other things that I need to do as well to just
15 rant just for whatever. Because I'm not a
16 fool. I don't get enough time to even address
17 how I feel about those types of comments. But
18 I think we can start now. We can work
19 together. Thank you.

20 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank you
21 Meta. Is there any other public comment?
22 Hearing none, we'll go right into the calendar
23 for the legislature. We have the main
24 calendar and then a emergency agenda and after
25 the legislature we will have a brief Rules

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2 Committee meeting.

3 The legislative calendar has many
4 items that went through committees. All of
5 which went through committees a couple of
6 weeks ago. But many of these items, almost
7 all of them, it's been agreed upon by the
8 Minority and Majority that they may be passed
9 today without any further debate or
10 discussion. I'm going to call the consent
11 calendar.

12 Item one, Ordinance 117. Two,
13 Ordinance 118. Three, Ordinance 119. Four,
14 Ordinance 120. Five, Ordinance 121. Six,
15 Ordinance 122. Seven, Ordinance 123. Eight,
16 Ordinance 124. Nine, Ordinance 125. Ten,
17 Ordinance 126. 11, Ordinance 127. 12,
18 Ordinance 128. 13, Ordinance 129. 14,
19 Ordinance 130. 15, Ordinance 131. 16,
20 Ordinance 132. 17, Ordinance 133. 18,
21 Ordinance 134. 19, Ordinance 135. 20,
22 Ordinance 136. 21, Ordinance 137. 22,
23 Ordinance 138. 23, Ordinance 139. 24,
24 Resolution 209. 25, Resolution 210. 26
25 Resolution 211. 27, Resolution 212. 28,

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2 Resolution 213. And 30, Resolution 215.

3 Motion by Deputy Presiding Officer
4 Kopel. Seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams.
5 Any debate or discussion? Any public --
6 actually there's no public comment on the
7 items. All those in favor signify by saying
8 aye. Opposed? Actually, there's no public
9 comment on the items but if you wanted to add
10 something.

11 MS. MEREDAY: I just had a quick
12 question with regard to Ordinance 117 number
13 one. As far as the transfer. In fact, is
14 this being transferred to the Village of
15 Freeport?

16 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: This is a
17 transfer of Cow Meadow Park to the Village of
18 Freeport, yes.

19 MS. MEREDAY: Within that
20 transfer are there any provisions with regard
21 to the preserve itself or is this just an open
22 transfer and they can pretty much do whatever
23 they want with it and not protect the
24 integrity of the preserve?

25 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: It's a

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2 park property. They'd have to go through the
3 legislature of the state first for approval.
4 So there's no actually preserved part of that
5 as opposed to park property. But they will
6 have to maintain the property for park
7 purposes in perpetuity.

8 MS. MEREDAY: I just wanted to
9 make sure there's no change in the perpetuity
10 clause as it pertains to the preserve.

11 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: No. It's
12 a park.

13 MS. MEREDAY: Thank you.

14 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: All those
15 in favor signify by saying aye. Those
16 opposed? Carries unanimously.

17 29, Resolution 214 is a resolution
18 to amend Resolution 387 of 2008 as last
19 amended by Resolution 157 of 2020 to designate
20 newspapers to publish and identify the real
21 property listed by school district number, on
22 which real estate tax liens are subject to
23 sale by the county treasurer for unpaid
24 taxes.

25 Motion by Legislator Walker.

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2 Seconded by Legislator Birnbaum. Any debate
3 or discussion? All in favor? No debate or
4 discussion but we do have an amendment to this
5 item. We need an amendment which will state
6 that the Five Towns Jewish Home and Freeport
7 Herald are added as designated papers and the
8 Freeport-Baldwin Leader is removed as a
9 designated paper.

10 Moved by Legislator Kopel.

11 Seconded by Legislator McKevitt. Any debate
12 or discussion on the amendment? All in favor
13 of the amendment signify by saying aye. Those
14 opposed? Amendment passes unanimously.

15 Now we have to vote on the item as
16 amended. All in favor of the item as amended
17 signify by saying aye. Those opposed? Carries
18 unanimously.

19 That concludes the main legislative
20 calendar. We have a number of emergencies.
21 I'm going to call them in general together.
22 With the consent of the Minority, I'm going to
23 waive the readings of each and every one of
24 these items. From 421, 422 -- actually 421,
25 422, 423, 424, 425, 426, 427, 428, 429.

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2 These are emergency resolutions to
3 authorize the assessor of the county of Nassau
4 to extend on the annual assessment roll of the
5 county of Nassau for the year 2022 for the
6 Town of Hempstead and the Town of Oyster Bay
7 amounts assessed by the town boards of the
8 towns for construction or reconstruction of
9 sidewalks, as well as for survey and/or
10 demolition and/or securing unsafe premises
11 and/or clearing costs pursuant to the town
12 law.

13 We need a motion to establish the
14 emergency. Moved by Legislator Drucker.
15 Seconded by Legislator Mule. All in favor of
16 establishing the emergency signify by saying
17 aye. Those opposed? The emergency is
18 established.

19 If the Minority will agree, I will
20 waive rereading those motions of the
21 resolutions. Just call out the item numbers.
22 421, 422, 423, 424, 425, 426, 427, 428 and
23 429. Motion by Legislator Kennedy. Seconded
24 by Legislator Schaefer. Any debate or
25 discussion on these items? I see you standing

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2 there.

3 MR. MILES: Deputy Assessor
4 Robert Miles. These are your yearly sidewalk,
5 litter and dangerous building resolutions from
6 the towns.

7 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any debate
8 or discussion? Actually, there's no public
9 comment on this part of the calendar. All in
10 favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed?
11 Carries unanimously.

12 Item 430 of 2021. We need an
13 emergency to establish a resolution to
14 authorize the county assessor and/or the
15 county treasury and/or the receivers of taxes
16 of the Town of Hempstead to wholly exempt
17 certain real properties situated in various
18 school districts.

19 Motion to establish the emergency?
20 Moved by Legislator DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded
21 by Legislator Walker. Any debate or
22 discussion on whether to establish the
23 emergency? Hearing none, all in favor of
24 establishing the emergency signify by saying
25 aye. Those opposed? Motion is established.

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2 430, again, it's a resolution to
3 authorize the county assessor and/or the
4 county treasurer and/or the receivers of taxes
5 of the Town of Hempstead to wholly exempt
6 certain real properties in various school
7 districts.

8 Moved by Legislator Muscarella.

9 Seconded by Legislator Ford. Any debate or
10 discussion? All in favor signify by saying
11 aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

12 We have two last items on this
13 calendar. One is awaiting attorneys who will
14 be making a presentation of a settlement.

15 At this time I will call 433 of
16 2021. It's an ordinance amending Ordinance
17 103 fixing the tax rates in levying taxes for
18 the 12 month 2022 fiscal year beginning
19 January 1, 2022 and ending December 31, 2022
20 upon taxable properties within the towns and
21 cities of the county of Nassau.

22 Moved by Deputy Presiding Officer
23 Kopel Seconded by Minority Leader Abrahams
24 Andy do you want to?

25 MR. PERSICH: Good afternoon.

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2 Andy Persich, Office of Management and
3 Budget. This is just the annual tax warrant
4 that we go through at this final meeting.
5 It's levying the taxes for all districts and
6 special districts in the county on behalf of
7 everybody. It's a procedural thing that we
8 usually do at this time of year.

9 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Thank
10 you. We didn't vote on the emergency. All in
11 favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed?
12 The emergency is established.

13 Now as to the item, which is 433 of
14 2021. Moved by Legislator Mule. Seconded by
15 Legislator Lafazan. Any debate or discussion
16 on this item? All in favor signify by saying
17 aye. Those opposed? Carries unanimously.

18 I'm going to be putting the
19 legislative meeting into recess until those
20 attorneys arrive.

21 So, Meta, did you have a comment
22 that you wanted to give?

23 MS. MEREDAY: Yes. Thank you
24 Presiding Officer. I just wanted to, again,
25 just for clarity, particularly for the public,

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2 in terms of how this information, particularly
3 for emergencies, gets translated or
4 transmitted to public for at least any type of
5 review or discussion? I can understand if
6 literally if you just got it before the
7 meeting. But again, this does impact
8 residents.

9 And particularly, my question as it
10 pertains to the roads, I just wanted to know
11 is that just a general allotment that's going
12 to the towns or are there specific roads that
13 needed this emergency presented now to be
14 fixed? Particularly since in the Town of
15 Hempstead there are significant issues with
16 regard to challenges as far as roads getting
17 fixed. I can talk to this gentleman in side
18 bar. But, again, that is a pressing concern
19 for many residents to have that issue
20 addressed.

21 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Robert, do
22 you think you can respond to that? I believe
23 these items relate to specific roads. It's
24 not general road improvements in the towns.

25 MS. MEREDAY: Would I be able to

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2 get a copy of that list as far as those
3 roads?

4 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Yes.

5 MS. MEREDAY: Great. Thank you.

6 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Just to
7 your earlier point, the reason the were on by
8 emergency is they came to us at the very last
9 minute. Especially the tax levy always comes
10 to us at the very last minute which is why it
11 comes by emergency. Thank you.

12 (Meeting recessed at 2:34 p.m.)

13 (Meeting reconvened at 3:16 p.m.)

14 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We can
15 jump back to the emergency calendar. I don't
16 know if the administration we're ready to go
17 on that one? The settlement? Okay.

18 Item 432 of 2021, a resolution
19 authorizing the acting county attorney to
20 compromise and settle the claims of the county
21 of Nassau against Allegiant Finance L.L.C.

22 Motion to establish the emergency
23 by Legislator Rhoads. Seconded by Legislator
24 Ford. Why don't we see if we can get all the
25 legislators back here.

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2 All in favor of establishing the
3 emergency signify by saying aye. Those
4 opposed? The emergency is established.

5 Now I'm going to call the item 432
6 of 2021. A resolution authorizing the acting
7 county attorney to compromise and settle the
8 claims of the county against Allegiant Finance
9 L.L.C.

10 Moved by Legislator Mule. Seconded
11 by Legislator McKeivitt. Now the item is
12 before us. Brian.

13 MR. LIBERT: Brian Libert, deputy
14 county attorney. With regard to this item I
15 have also with me Sal Badala of counsel Napoli
16 Shkolnik and he's ready to make a presentation
17 to you in executive session relative to this
18 item, if necessary.

19 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: I don't
20 know that executive session is necessary. I
21 think to the extent that you have information
22 that's public knowledge I think that would be
23 useful to the committee.

24 MR. LIBERT: I'm sure that
25 Mr. Badala can prepare a very brief

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2 presentation that would cover anything that
3 the committee might like to know.

4 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: We've had
5 extensive executive sessions on the opioid
6 litigation. We are fully familiar with it.
7 We have the papers in support. So, if you
8 want to provide us with a brief summary.

9 MR. BADALA: First, I just want
10 to apologize for being late. We were just
11 finishing closing arguments today. So the
12 jury will be getting instructions in the
13 morning, probably around 11 o'clock in the
14 morning, and then we will be waiting on
15 deliberations this week.

16 With this settlement there are two
17 families of defendants left. Tetha family and
18 the Ander family. But this settlement results
19 in a total of a little of over \$29 million to
20 Nassau County. Some of it's actually paid
21 this week and then the rest of it would be
22 paid in about 120 days. Then once we find out
23 a verdict we will obviously report that right
24 away in the next week or two.

25 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: What's the

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2 total amount of the settlements with this one
3 included?

4 MR. BADALA: Actually, I should
5 also update you on something as well. When we
6 did the big three settlement, big three
7 distributors and Johnson and Johnson, all of
8 the counties that signed on New York State is
9 the first one to get all of the litigating
10 subdivisions signed on. That means that all
11 of the counties get the 100 percent. Which
12 means because everyone participated those
13 defendants pay out the total amount. I don't
14 have the exact number of the total settlements
15 but it's well over \$100 million at this point.

16 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Any
17 questions for counsel? No? Thank you very
18 much and we appreciate you making your way
19 back over after closing arguments.

20 MR. BADALA: Thank you. It's
21 been a six month trial but I think it's all
22 worth it. Second longest jury trial I think
23 in New York.

24 LEGISLATOR NICOLELLO: Wow. Any
25 discussion among the legislators? All in

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2 favor signify by saying aye. Those opposed?
3 Carries unanimously.
4 We need a motion to adjourn.
5 Legislator Walker. Legislator Schaefer
6 seconds. All in favor of adjourning signify
7 by saying. Wish everyone happy holidays,
8 Merry Christmas and happy healthy new year.
9 (Meeting adjourned at 3:21 p.m.)
